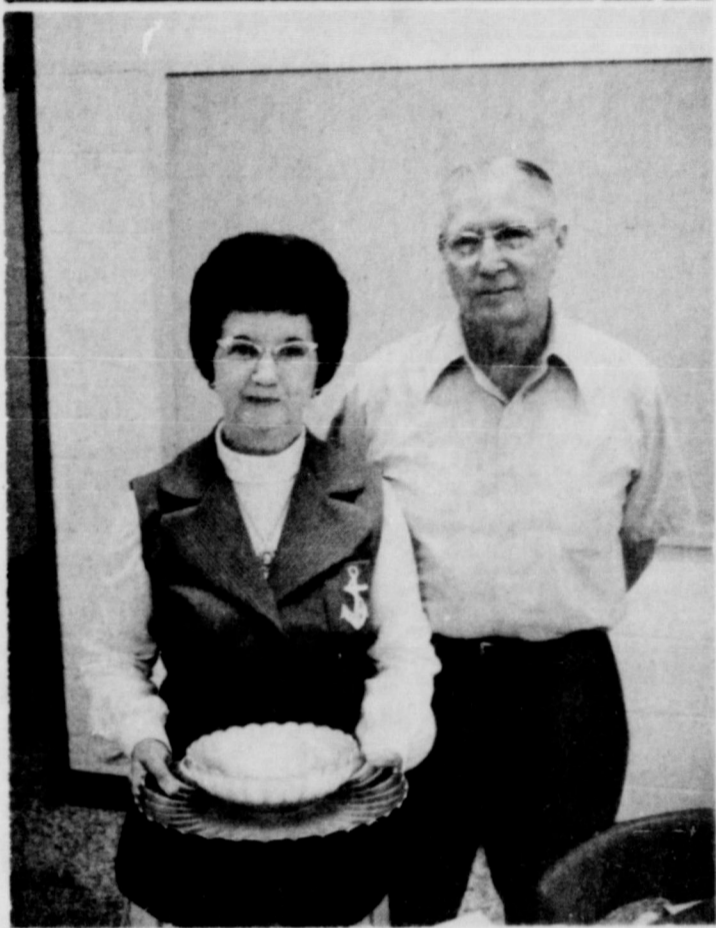

**Traffic Crashes, Deaths Show Increase**

Traffic deaths in Texas for the first four months of 1972 are running three percent higher than last year, according to the Texas Safety Association.

As of April 28, the Texas Department of Public Safety reported that 989 persons had died in traffic crashes in 1972 in Texas.

"That is an increase of 32 traffic deaths over the same period last year," said J.U. Parker, Houston, Texas Safety Association president.

According to the statewide safety organization's leader, traffic accidents and deaths are on the increase on nearly every type of street and highway in the state.

"Communities with less than 2,500 population have seen an 11 percent increase in traffic deaths. Those above that population figure are measuring an eight percent increase in traffic fatalities, indicating a need for organized safety activities in these communities," Parker stated.

In addition, the TSA leader said that the Interstate Highway System and County Roads are also experiencing increases in both accidents and deaths this year.

"The Farm to Market system has had a decrease in the number of accidents, but

there has been an amazing four percent increase in traffic fatalities. Only the U.S. and State Highway systems show a decrease in both accidents and deaths. There has been a three percent decrease in accidents and a five percent decrease in the number killed in traffic accidents on those highways," Parker commented.

The TSA president said these latest DPS statistics, released April 28, focus attention on the need for increased vigilance and observance of safe driving practices by every motorist in the state.

"The vacation and long-weekend driving period is now upon us in Texas. Traffic volume on the streets and highways of the state will begin to increase from now until the end of the summer," said Parker.

"Texas motorists, if they are to stem this tide of ever increasing traffic deaths, need to heed the philosophy of the 'Drive Friendly' program," Parker said.

He also outlined a number of positive steps that can be taken to reduce the possibility of a traffic accident during long-weekend and summer vacation driving.

1. Before starting out on the trip, safety check the car. Check tires for wear and pressure, including the spare; check the brakes, springs, and shock absorbers. Also make sure the battery and exhaust system are in good order.

2. Be sure to have emergency equipment in the car, basic tools, bumper jack,

spare fuses, flashlight and flares, and a first aid kit.

3. Make sure your car is in top mechanical condition.

4. Plan your trip in advance, even if it's just for the weekend.

4. Be alert for unusual traffic conditions, like road construction, and adjust your speed accordingly.

6. Watch out for motorists travelling abnormally slow, unusually fast, or weaving from side to side. Such vehicles may be driven by a drunk driver, as preliminary Texas studies show that 1 out of every 8 cars you meet at night may be driven by a drinking driver.

7. Use your seat belts and require your passengers to do the same.

8. Observe all speed limits and other traffic laws.

"Perhaps the single most important step for the motorist to take," Parker concluded, "is to adopt an attitude of courtesy and friendliness on the highways. Then to put that attitude to work and 'Drive Friendly' in reality."

**Across the Fence**

"It always rains just before it's too late", says Mr. Henry Lee of Briscoe. A lot of cotton farmers who have cotton plants just emerging

hope so. Morris Pillars of Twitty, has some cotton up. So does Norbert Schlegel, west of Shamrock. The Twitty community get three-quarters of an inch last week according to Dick Gierhart.

It's grasshopper time again. This is the time of year when grasshopper nymphs emerge from egg pods in the soil. Plant Protection Division Workers of the Agricultural Research Service say that they counted 8 or more grasshopper per square yard in Wheeler County fields. They are asking for cooperation of ranchers to report concentrations of grasshopper

nymphs to the County Agent, USDA, the State Department of Agriculture and local ranchers usually cooperate to suppress grasshopper population before they endanger livestock forage and our rangeland environment. Department scientists say that serious grasshopper damage to grassland can be avoided this summer .... if grasshopper populations are knocked down now .... before the pests spread out in search for food.

Zana Corse, Mobeetie 4-H Club member has selected a steer calf from Wallace Fields Polled Hereford Ranch for the Pampa Top 'O Texas Livestock show next March. Zana is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Doug Corse of Mobeetie. She has had several years of feeding experience.

Lovegrass is still being seeded. Showers should bring it up in a few days. We've assisted several farmers in securing soil test reports for cost-share assistance in seeding the grass.

Folks who have established stands of lovegrass should consider putting out thirty pounds of actual nitrogen on each acre of lovegrass around June 1. Research demonstration work here has shown that you can get a lot of grazing this way. Don't worry too much about moisture. We usually get some this time of year. The cost of the fertilizer is small compared to the results you'll get.

On our observation plots, we've got Renner 1 wegrass and Reneau lovegrass up and growing. With the addition of these two new grasses, we probably have the most complete lovegrass observation plot in this area. Clipping trials are progressing. This last month's growth is so luxuriant we may have trouble mowing it with a lawn mower.

We'll be leaving for the State 4-H Roundup with twelve district winners from our county on Monday, June 5. This is a real learning experience for these young people. Meeting the best 4-H'ers from all over the state and seeing how we stack up against the competition is the real test. The "Young Americans", the district winning Share-the-Fun act coached by Mrs. Evert Smith of Shamrock, received a standing ovation at the Shamrock Booster Club program last week.

Farmers and ranchers with trailers may want to know the equipment requirements and the new regulations affecting Texas farm trailers as outlined by the Texas Department of Public Safety. Drawings and requirements are outlined in some blueprints drawings avail-

able at our office. Come by and get one if you need it.

The stockman searching for low-cost feed may find it in his pasturelands, provided he has kept them free from weeds.

Pastures don't produce as much feed per acre as do the intensively tilled fields producing grain.

But, because pastures do not require the input of labor and machinery as do other crops, they can yield high quality feed at low price.

For every pound of weeds that grows in a pasture, a pound or more of good forage is choked out.

Herbicides are available to control many broad-leaved weeds infesting pastures. In most cases they are cheaper and more effective than mechanical methods. Proper management of livestock to prevent them from grazing pastures too close also helps in controlling weeds.

The herbicides 2, 4-D; 2, 4, 5-T; dicamba and silvex have label of clearance for use in pastures. Use of the materials, as listed on their labels, will meet the requirements established by the Environmental Protection Agency.

2, 4, 5-T and 2, 4-D can be obtained as water soluble amine, oil soluble amine and low volatile ester formulations. Dicamba is usually available in the amine formulation.

We caution users to expect some desired plants to be affected by the treatments. Seedlings of forage grasses and clovers can be injured or killed when 2, 4, 5-T, dicamba or silvex is used. The amount of injury varies according to the time of spraying. The more tender the susceptible plant, the more severe the injury.

Small amounts of herbicides are capable of damaging or killing susceptible plants such as alfalfa, clovers, cotton, grapes, oaks, flowers and ornamentals.

For pastures infested with annual broomweed, cone flower, dock, eastern bitterweed, horse mint, pigweed, cocklebur, ragweed, poorjoe, mustards or any of many weeds the right amount of 2, 4-D at the right time will settle the matter. Brush and weeds can also be controlled with 2, 4, 5-T.

For complete information on controlling weeds in pastures, the County Extension office has copies of several bulletins - "Range Weed Control", "Weed Control in Cultivated Pastures", or "Suggestions for Weed Control with Chemicals".

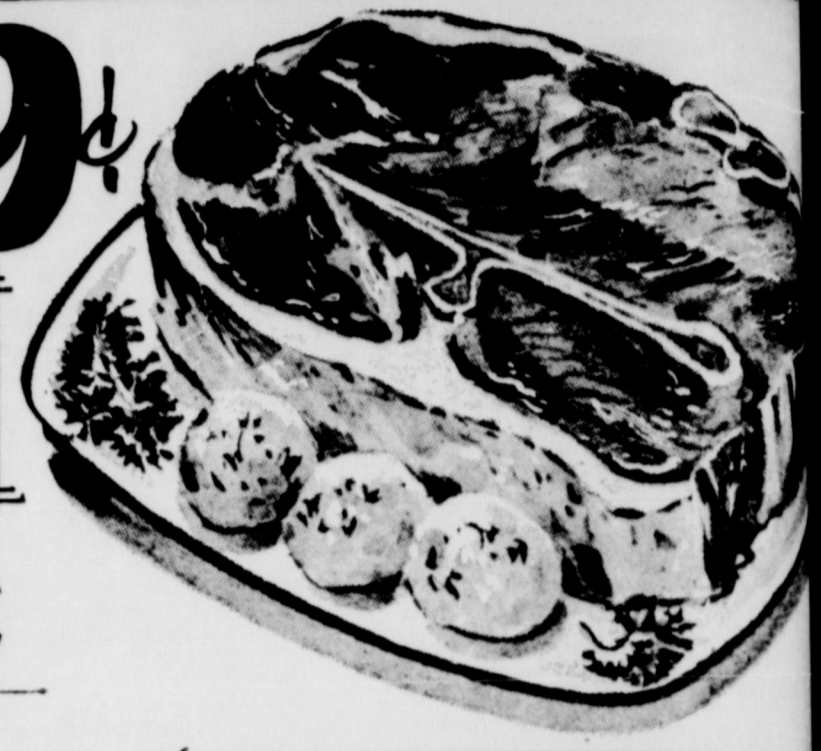
