## Popular Area Vet To Practice Here

Fulfilling a wish and desire of stockmen in the Wheeler area for a number of years, one of the Panhandle's most respected and popular veterinarians will soon open practice in Wheeler.

Dr. Tommie Hennard, of Canadian, Texas, met with a large number of Wheeler area citizens last week and announced his decision.

After working for the State of Texas the past two years, Dr. Hennard desired to return to private practice and wanted to remain in the Panhandle.

"When I was in practice in Canadian, I not only had many people from Wheeler County use my clinic but made many friends throughout the area," Dr. Hennard stated.

"With the cattle and all phases of the livestock industry on a continuing upgrade, I feel that this area offers a great opportunity for a veterinarian and my family and I are looking forward to our move to Wheeler."

Prior to selling his practice in Canadian to Dr. Pat Crouch, Dr. Hennard had practiced in Hemphill County for 10 years and had built up one of the largest single vet clinics in the state.

Dr. Hennard is a native of Honey Grove, Texas, and did all of his college work at Texas A&M University. He received his B.S. degree in 1957 and his D.V.M. in

1959. Dr. Hennard and his wife Betty have three daughters and one son. One of their daughters is in college at East Texas State and the other two girls are in school at Canadian.

The Hennards are members of the Presbyterian church.

Several sites are being considered for Dr. Hennard's clinic and until his clinic is built, he will practice out of the former H&H Milling building.

Dr. Hennard will commute from Canadian until he is able to move his family this summer.

In accordance with a House Bill No. 126, passed by the 62nd Legislature, board members were assigned numbers. Persons wishing to file for the board of education selected the position for which they wished to run.

Sixty-six pigs from the entire county area were shown to 4-H and FFA members.

A Durac barrow exhibited by David Patterson of Wheeler FFA won Grand Champion honors. Pritchard's Thriftway of Wheeler and Shamrock purchased the barrow for \$1.05 per pound for David's barrow in the sale for a total purchase price of \$202.65.

Danny Hardcastle, a Wheeler FFA member, showed the Reserve Grand Champion barrow - a Hampshire.

Grand Champion Gilt and Reserve Grand Champion honors were won by Steve Dollar of Allison FFA.

This Hampshire gilt and Reserve White Gilt. The Champion Pen of three was won by the Wheeler FFA chapter and the Showmanship Trophy went to Steve Dollar, Allison FFA.

Over \$4,000 changed hands in the pig sale. The average price was \$115.52 per pig with 55c per pound being the average price.

James Arden of Wheeler was show superintendent and official weigher. 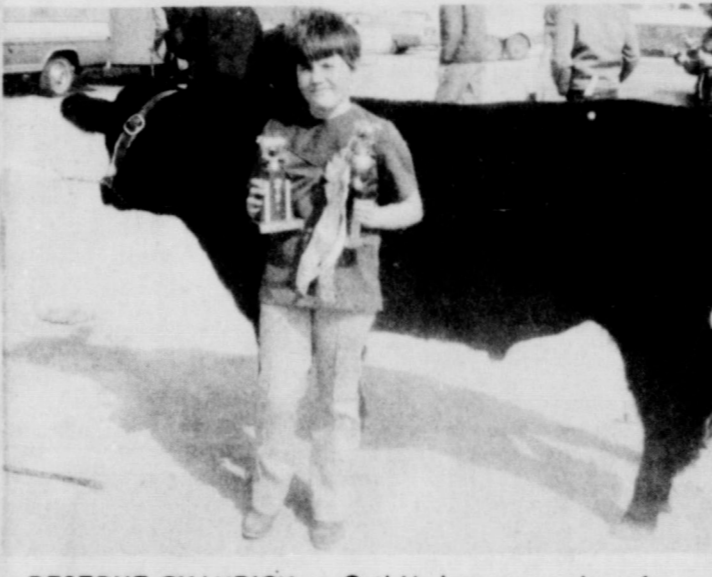

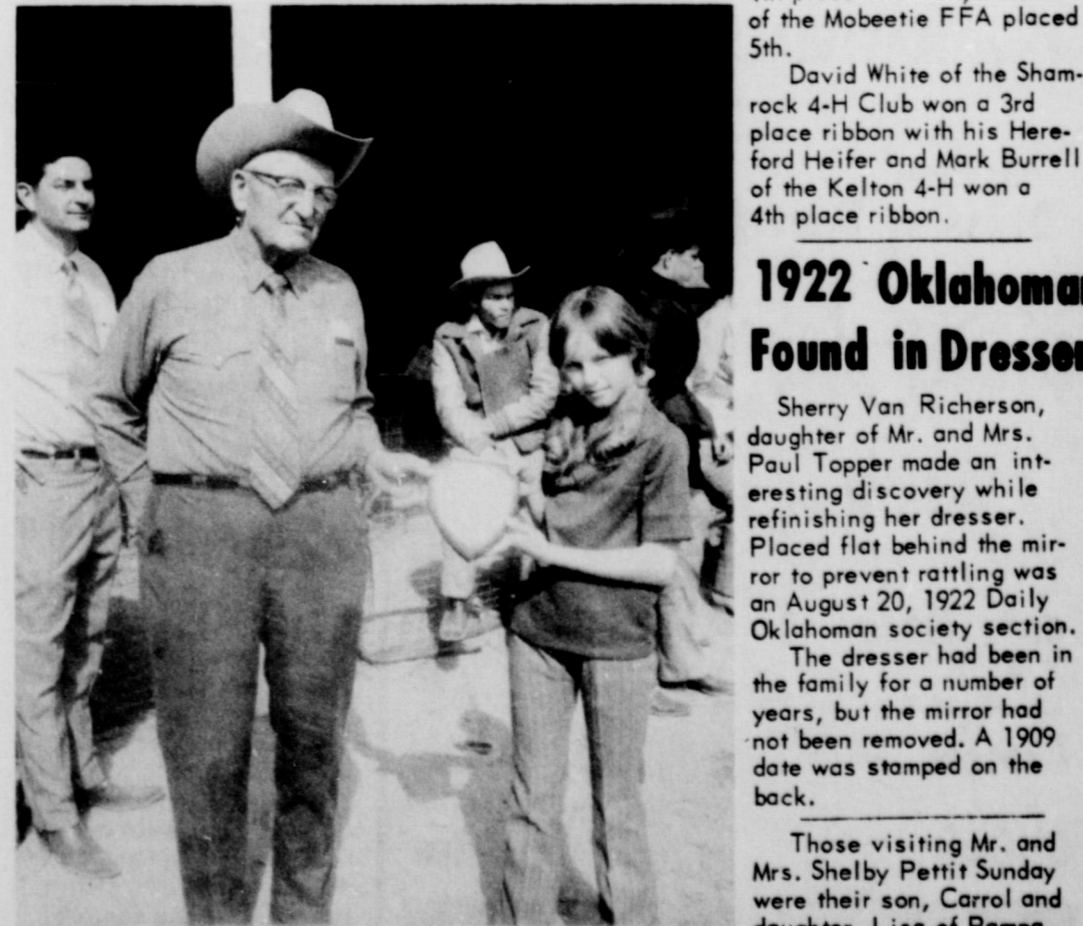

Barnes urges the citizens of Wheeler to either burn the grass around the trash can or place a cover on the can to prevent burning debris from falling or blowing from the can. Barnes further advised against following the fire trucks. Chasing the fire truck is not only dangerous, it is against the law. A long string of cars make it difficult for firemen to get to the fire. At the fire Friday at the Beef Cattle Co. Mill, it was necessary for some of the firemen to walk to the fire from the highway because of all the spectators. Curiosity killed the cat, so let's stop chasing the firetrucks before it is fatal to some of our citizens.

### Fire at Beef Cattle Co. Friday

The Wheeler Fire Department was called to Beef Cattle Company Friday night at 8:35. The firemen worked at the fire for about 2 hours. The feedlot is in the process of adding a new air lift to the mill. A construction crew had been welding in the area of the hay bin and allowed a spark to fall into the ground hay. After smoldering for a period of time, the feed caught fire. An estimated loss of 10 to 12 tons of hay was reported by mill foreman, Lyndon Loyd. The value of the hay was between \$600 and \$800. Besides the scorched point, there was water damage to both whole and rolled milo stored in the bins at the mill. Water was mixed with feed and carried up to the bin before the feed was run out on the ground and watered down.

### Rogers, Moore On Deans' Lists

Frankie Rogers, majoring in History and James Moore, majoring in Anthropology are among more than 2,200 students in the College of Arts and Sciences at Texas Tech University who qualified for the dean's honor list for the fall semester, according to Dean Lawrence L. Graves. To qualify for the honor list, a student must be enrolled in 12 semester hours of courses, excluding pass-fail courses, and have at least a 3.0 grade point average. Texas Tech uses a 4.0 point grading system. The College of Arts and Sciences is one of six colleges and two schools at Texas Tech University, with a total fall enrollment of more than 21,000 students. The others are the colleges of Agricultural Sciences, Business Administration, Education, Engineering and Home Economics and the Graduate School and the School of Law.

### Highway Construction In County

The Texas Highway Commission on March 1st, 1972, approved a \$240 million, two-year program for the development of almost two thousand miles of Texas highways.

The 1973-74 Consolidated Highway Program calls for construction of 1,186 miles of highway facilities and the State's portion of right of way costs on 810 miles.

The program includes both new work and additional finance for work previously authorized.

V. J. McGee, District Engineer of Childress, announced that included in this Consolidated Highway Program are funds in the amount of \$150,000 for the reconstruction of U.S. Hwy 66, in Shamrock, extending from 9.1 Mi. West of West City Limit of Shamrock to 0.7 Mi. East of East City Limit of Shamrock, in Wheeler County, a distance of 1.9 miles. This will include the removal of the center median along U.S. Highway 66 in Shamrock, and the installation of a continuous left-turn lane through this section.

Also included in this program are State funds in the amount of \$33,000 for the purchase of right of way on 75 Highway 83 extending from the Hemphill Co-

county Line, South to State Highway 152 in Wheeler, a distance of 13.0 miles. State funds in the amount of \$3,000 were also approved for the purchase of right of way on U.S. 83, extending from the South City Limit of Shamrock, to the Collingsworth County Line, a distance of 1.0 mile, in Wheeler County. This right of way funds will permit the Highway Department to prepare right of way maps and preliminary plans for the reconstruction of these sections of U.S. Highway 83. Construction funds will be approved on some future highway program, and work on these projects will be under the supervision of O.V. Johnson, Supt. Res. Engr., Wellington, Texas.
