

All this summer I have seen beautiful delicious peaches throughout Wheeler County. Mrs. Leon Fillingim from Wheeler gave me a sack of peaches that were picked from her trees. They were so good. There are so many ways to eat them, but I found a favorite of mine is as follows.

Peach Praline Pie 1/2 T. quick cooking tapioco 2/3 - 3/4 cup sugar 4 cups sliced peaches 1 t. lemon juice pastry for one crust, 9" pie

Combine tapioca, sugar, peaches and lemon juice. Roll pastry 1/8" thick. Line a 9" pie pan. Trim pastry 1" larger than pan and fold edge to form a standing rim. Flute or shape as desired. Sprinkle a third of praline crumb topp ing over bottom of pie shell. Fill with peach mixture and sprinkle with remaining topping. Bake at 425 degrees F. for 45 minutes or until sytrup boils in heavy bubbles that do not burst. Serve warm. Vanilla ice cream on top of warm pie is great!




