MARKER TO BE ERRECTED

The official Texas Historical Grave Marker for Capt. G.W. Arrington, a historically significant law officer of Wheeler County, has arrived from the foundry and will be erected Sept. 4, 1967, announced Mrs. Grady W. Harris of Wheeler, chairman of the Wheeler County Historical Survey Committee.

The marker will be placed at the gravesite in Mobeetie Cemetery on the southside of Old Mobeetie.

This marker is one of a series that will record the brave deeds of Texas' most gallant lawmen from the days of the Republic to the present. The markers are sponsored through the Texas Historical Foundation by a grant given by the Texas Law Enforcement and Youth Development Foundation. THF is the private affiliate of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee.

Inscriptions on the markers commemorate Texas Law Enforcement officers who have been killed in line of duty and or who have contributed to the development of Texas and its history, such as Texas Rangers, sheriffs and marshals.

The inscription on the Arrington marker reads:
Capt. G.W. Arrington (1844-1923)
Born in Maine; Daring Scout in Colonel John Mosby's command during Civil War. Moved to Texas in 1867;

Do Not Set yourself up as an example of perfection. This is very difficult to do 24 hours a day. You will find that you'll get along better with your children if you let them know that Mom and Dad can err too.

Remember that each child needs two parents. Present a united front. Never join sides with your youngster against your mate. This will create emotional conflict between you and your mate.

Spend some time with your children. Too many times parents do not know their children because they don't devote enough time to them.

The more experiences you have with your children, the more effective parents you can be.

Discipline your child with firmness and reason. Don't let your anger throw you off balance. If they know you are fair, you will not lose their respect or their love.

Inge's Cake
4 cups flour
1/2 cups sugar

4 egg yolks
1 reasp. baking powder
1 grated lemon peel
1 can peach (separate the juice from peaches)

1 T. cornstarch
Cream the margarine, add sugar and egg yolks. Mix well.

Add baking powder and grated lemon peel.

Add flour, mix but do not over-mix.

Spread in pan and bake 20 minutes in 350 degrees chill the crust.

Stir together one cup juice and cornstarch and cook until clear and thick and cool.

Place peaches over the crust and pour over thick juice and chill.

This is also good served hot instead of chilling.

Texas 1966 Traffic Costs

Texas 1966 traffic cost soars to an all time high.

There were 524,972 traffic accidents, an increase of 53,984 over 1965. There was a record of 3,406 human lives lost in traffic accidents, an increase of 378 over 1965.

Another 208,310 were sent to doctors and hospitals, an increase of 22,248 over 1965, some of these injured being maimed for life. Some 890,000 automobiles were damaged or demolished. The economic loss came to an astounding figure of \$557,414,000, an increase of \$59,327,000 over 1965.

Wheeler County's contribution to the 1966 Texas traffic cost was 6 killed, 74 injured and an estimated property damage of \$113,535.00.

If the 3,406 dead traffic victims were stacked in a pile, the dimensions would be about 3.7 miles in length or 1.1 miles in width or .5 of a mile in height. The dimensions of the some 890,000 damaged or demolished vehicles would be about 2,907 miles in length or 1,113 miles in width, or 852 miles in height. The dimensions for the 208,310 injured would be about 227 miles in length or 66 miles in width or 33 miles in height.

dollar bills, then a layer of five hundred dollar bills and on top of these eight layers of paper money dump 8,806 tons of silver dollars, this would represent the economic loss in Texas for the year 1966.

The \$557,414 estimated loss would have bought 10,000 homes at \$20,000 each; 10,000 refrigerators at \$400 each; 10,000 cooking ranges at \$350 each; 10,000 TV sets at \$350 each; 10,000 dishwashers at \$300 each; 10,000 automobiles at \$3,000 each; 10,000 central air conditioning units at \$1,400

each and furnished the balance of each of the 10,000 households with a bank account of \$29,941.

If the problem is serious today, what about tomorrow? The state will continue to grow. The population will increase, which means more drivers and automobiles on more miles driven. If the present problem continues, by Texas by 1975 there will be 1,000,000 traffic accidents resulting in 7,000 persons killed, 500,000 persons injured and an estimated property damage of over \$1,000,000,000.



All this summer I have seen beautiful delicious peaches throughout Wheeler County. Mrs. Leon Fillingim from Wheeler gave me a sack of peaches that were picked from her trees. They were so good. There are so many ways to eat them, but I found a favorite of mine is as follows:

Peach Praline Pie
1 1/2 T. quick cooking tapioca
2/3 - 3/4 cup sugar
4 cups sliced peaches
1 t. lemon juice
pastry for one crust, 9" pie
Combine tapioca, sugar, peaches and lemon juice. Roll pastry 1/8" thick. Line a 9" pie pan. Trim pastry 1" larger than pan and fold edge to form a standing rim. Flute or shape as desired. Sprinkle a third of praline crumb topping over bottom of pie shell. Fill with peach mixture and sprinkle with remaining topping. Bake at 425 degrees F. for 45 minutes or until syrup boils in heavy bubbles that do not burst. Serve warm. Vanilla ice cream on top of warm pie is great!

PRALINE CRUMB TOPPING
1/2 cup brown sugar, firmly packed
1/4 cup flour
3 T. butter or margarine
1/4 cup chopped pecans
Combine sugar, flour and butter until crumbs are size of large peas. Add pecans.

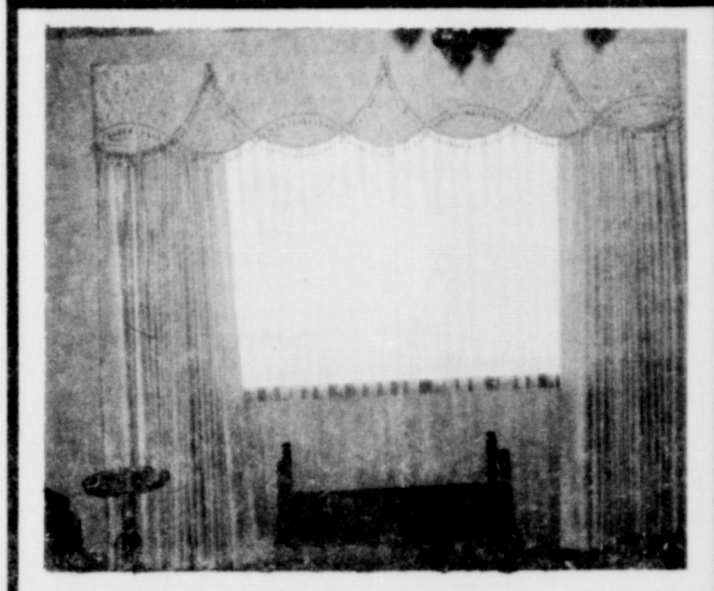

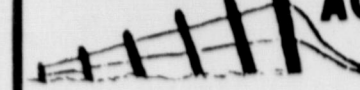

Prepare that wheat land! A lot of wheat lands in good shape now for planting in September. Buying good seed germination tested and free of weed seed is the best investment to be made. You'll need to put at least 30 pounds of nitrogen.

Tascosa, Caddo, Scout, Warrior and Sturdy are their first choice varieties because of their yielding ability, high quality and good storm resistance. Sturdy is a new short stature wheat recommended for growing under irrigation. It's not recommended for dryland wheat production as it may be too short to cut satisfactorily. Parker (Kansas) Guide and Scout 66 (Nebraska) and Triumph 64 (Oklahoma) are varieties that are from other states and are satisfactory for growing in our area.

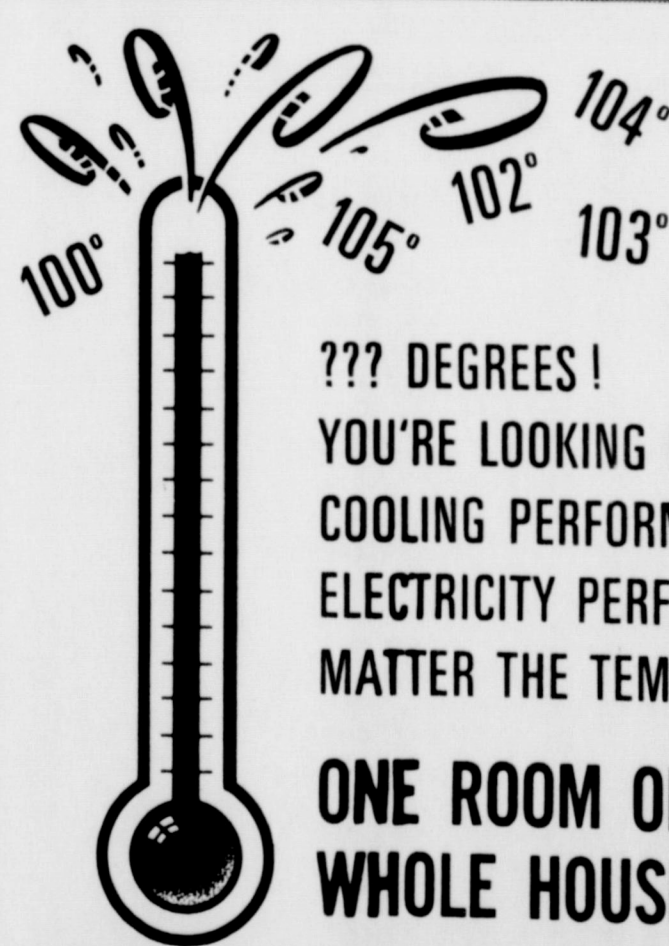

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 17 proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, so as to authorize an increase in the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board to Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; and providing for a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 49-b. By virtue of prior Amendments to this Constitution, there has been created a governmental agency of the State of Texas performing governmental duties which has been designated the Veterans' Land Board. Said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified in all of the prior Constitutional Amendments except as modified herein. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office and two (2) citizens of the State of Texas, one (1) of whom shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and one (1) of whom shall be well versed in finances. One (1) such citizen member shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, be appointed biennially by the Governor to serve for a term of four (4) years; but the members serving on said Board on the date of adoption hereof shall complete the terms to which they were appointed. In the event of the resignation or death of any such citizen member, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to serve for the unexpired portion of the term to which the deceased or resigning member had been appointed. The compensation for said citizen members shall be as is now or may hereafter be fixed by the Legislature; and each shall make bond in such amount as is now or may hereafter be prescribed by the Legislature.

"The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall act as Chairman of said Board and shall be the administrator of the Veterans' Land Program under such terms and restrictions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law. In the absence or illness of said Commissioner, the Chief Clerk of the General Land Office shall be the Acting Chairman of said Board with the same duties and powers that said Commissioner would have if present.

"The Veterans' Land Board may provide for, issue and sell not to exceed Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund, Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) of which have heretofore been issued and sold. Such bonds or obligations shall be sold for not less than

interest on the bonds heretofore and hereafter issued by said Board shall be paid out of the moneys of said Fund in conformance with the Constitutional provisions authorizing such bonds; but the moneys of said Fund which are not immediately committed to the payment of principal and interest on such bonds, the purchase of lands as herein provided, or the payment of expenses as herein provided may be invested in bonds or obligations of the United States until such funds are needed for such purposes.

"All moneys comprising a part of said Fund and not expended for the purposes herein provided shall be a part of said Fund until there are sufficient moneys therein to retire fully all of the bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board, at which time all such moneys remaining in said Fund, except such portion thereof as may be necessary to retire all such bonds which portion shall be set aside and retained in said Fund for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law. All moneys becoming a part of said Fund hereafter shall likewise be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund.

"When a Division of said Fund (each Division consisting of the moneys attributable to the bonds issued and sold pursuant to a single Constitutional authorization and the lands purchased therewith) contains sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division, the moneys thereof, except such portion as may be needed to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division which portion shall be set aside and remain a part of said Division for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, may be used for the purpose of paying the principal and interest thereon, together with the expenses herein authorized, of any other bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board. Such use shall be a matter for the discretion and direction of said Board; but there may be no such use of any such moneys contrary to the rights of any holder of any of the bonds issued and sold by said Board or violative of any contract to which said Board is a party.

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by said Board for the purpose of purchasing lands situated in the State of Texas owned by the United States or any governmental agency thereof, owned by the Texas Prison System or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas, or owned by any person, firm, or corporation. All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of said Fund. Such lands heretofore or hereafter purchased and comprising a part of said Fund are hereby declared to be held for a governmental purpose, although the individual purchasers thereof shall be subject to taxation to the same extent and in the same manner as are purchasers of lands dedicated to the Permanent Free Public School

fund. The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by said Board in such quantities, on such terms, at such prices, at such rates of interest and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law to veterans who served not less than ninety (90) continuous days in the United States armed forces from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, and who, upon the date of filing his or her application to purchase any such land is a citizen of the United States, is a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, and has not been dishonorably discharged from any branch of the Armed Forces above-named and who at the time of his or her enlistment, induction, commissioning, or drafting was a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, or who has resided in Texas at least five (5) years prior to the date of filing his or her application. The foregoing notwithstanding, any lands in the Veterans' Land Fund which have been first offered for sale to veterans and which have not been sold may be sold or resold to such purchasers, in such quantities, and on such terms, at such prices and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund, to the extent of the moneys attributable to any bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board, as is now or may hereafter be provided by law, for the purpose of paying the expenses of surveying, monumenting, road construction, legal fees, recordation fees, advertising and other like costs necessary or incidental to the purchase and sale, or resale, of any lands purchased with any of the moneys attributable to such additional bonds, such expenses to be added to the price of such lands when sold, or resold, by said Board; for the purpose of paying the expenses of issuing, selling, and delivering any such additional bonds; and for the purpose of meeting the interest or principal due or to become due on any such additional bonds.

"All of the moneys attributable to any series of bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board (a series of bonds being all of the bonds issued and sold in a single transaction as a single installment of bonds) may be used for the purchase of lands as herein provided, for a period ending eight (8) years after the date of sale of such series of bonds; provided, however, that so much of such moneys may be necessary to pay interest on bonds heretofore issued and sold shall be set aside for that purpose in accordance with the resolution adopted by said Board authorizing the issuance and sale of such series of bonds. After such eight (8) year period, all of such moneys shall be set aside for the retirement of any bonds hereafter issued and sold and to pay interest thereon, together with any expenses as provided herein, in accordance with the resolution or resolutions authorizing the issuance and sale of such additional bonds, until there are sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds heretofore issued and sold, at which time all such moneys remaining a part of said Veterans' Land Fund shall be governed as elsewhere provided herein.

"This Amendment being intended only to establish a basic framework and not to be a comprehensive treatment of the Veterans' Land Program, there is hereby reposed in the Legislature full power to implement and effectuate the design and objects of this Amendment, including the power to delegate such duties, responsibilities, functions, and authority to the Veterans' Land Board as it believes necessary.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.

"This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment to extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which amendment would amend Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

"AGAINST the amendment to extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which amendment would amend Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.
