the condition. Grass tetany is a condition of low blood magnesium.

The condition occurs most commonly in adult cows, especially those that are lactating and have been on wheat or lush grass pasture for two weeks or more. It also occurs in steers grazing wheat, especially when they are exposed to cold changeble weather or other sources of stress.

Grass tetany is caused by a metabolic disturbance, not a magnesium deficiency in the plant.

There are two forms of the disease. Animals with it may be grazing, then he throwsup his head, bellows, runs in a blind manner, fall and undergoes severe paddling convulsions. Death usually occurs in a few hours. In the less acute form, which is more common, theanimal is ill at ease, walks with a stiff gate, urinates frequently, vpertensive to tou or sound, a hard rapid heart beat is characteristic and many will fight. The condition may progress to the convulsive stage in 1 to 3 days.

The occurance of grass tetany can be greatly reduced by supplying supplemental magnesium at the rate of 2 ounces of magnesium oxide per head per day. Cows can come down with grass tetany for 2-3 weeks fter they are removed from the wheat. Continuing magnesium supplement for two weeks is good management.

A loose supplement is usually preferrable to a block both from a standpoint of cost and consumption. One formula for a magnesium supplement is 25% salt, 25% dicalcium phosph te, 25% magnesium oxide and 25% dried molasses. Ground grain sorghum may be substituted for the dried molasses.

Allowing the cattle access to hay or dry pasture cas also help reduce the occurance of the condition.



Despite feedlot losses high feed costs, and large supplies of feeder calves, some faint ays of hope are beginning to appear in the cattle industry.

The slaughter of yearling cattle and cows has gone up sharply in secent weeks.



Top O' Texas CowBelle President Mrs. Richard Brown, Pampa Reporter Mrs. Jim Greene, and Wheeler Reporter Mrs. Tom Christner met with the Farm Bureau in a four-county Farm Bureau meeting at the Black Gold Restaurant in Pampa on Nov. 20, 1974. The meeting was called to acquaint the Farm Bureau members with the Farm Bureau Gift Certificates and to co-ordinate efforts between Farm Bureau and CowBelles in this area. Organization Man of Area 1, Mr. Roy Custer of Amarillo, explained that the Farm Bureau Gift Certificates will cover meat (beef, etc.), poultry, and dairy products. TAP, Texas Agricultural Products, is printing the certificaties and promotional material. TAP will also distribute this material to grocery stores. Farm Vureau members are to help promote these certificates. Ideas and suggestions on the promotion of the CowBelles

Beef Gift Certificates and the Farm Bureau Gift Certificates were exchanged. Another meeting of the Wheeler CowBelles was scheduled for Nov. 25,

1974at 7:30 p.m. at the Production Credit Assn. building in Wheeler. This meeting is to co-ordinate efforts in the sale of the gift certificates of the Cow-Belles and the Farm Bureau. It is also to allow any ladies who are interested in the promotion of beef to join Cowbelles.

Efforts are now underway to provide Beef Gift Certificates through the First National Bank of Wheeler. When this is accomplished, the certificates may be redeemed anywhere in the U. S. Several banks in Texas already have them available.

Please remember to get your reservations in by Nov. 29, 1974 to Mrs. Tom Christner, Box 522, Wheeler, Texas for the December meeting at Canadian, Texas. It is at 12:00 no on at the First United Methodist Church. Reservations are \$3.75. We urge every lady who is interested in the promotion of beef to join us in CowBelles.

There will probably be about 4.8 million non-fed steers and heifers slaughtered this year, which will greatly reduce supplies of carried-over feeders.

Calf slaughter should be 26 percent greater than last year, which will also help reduce the supply of feeder animals.

At the same time, retailers are moving this younger beef in increasing quantities, using such fancy names as "baby beef, young beef, thrifty

beef and junior beef." The increase in cow slaughter indicates some breaking up of breeding herds, which is probably the only eal solution to the overall beef problem.

There is also relief in sight for feedlots. If fed steers continue to increase in price and if feedlot marketings continue at a low level, feedlots should finally show some profits in the coming weeks.

Another good indication for an improved beef situation is the fact that imports of beef and veal into the U. S. during August were down 29 percent from last year. Also, imports of cattle from Mexico were down 47 percent and Canadian cattle imports were down 87 percent.

All these factors are positive in effect, but the real results may not be felt until late 1975 or early 1976.

an expanding business. Historically, sugar has always had a small profit margin, and investors are not anxious to put their money into sugar mills and refin ries when other investments promise greater financial returns, she ex-

plained. "This, along with tripled building costs, does not suggest any immediate increase in the building of sugar mills and refinery facilities."

"Another deterrent to building new facilities is the uncertainty of the supply of aw product. The largest pa t of our sugar comes from sugarcane, with nearly one-third of our domestic supply produced in Hawaii, Louisiana, Florida, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands," she said.

Sugarcane production has decreased about 10 per cent in the last decade. Expansion of sugarcane production is not a speedy process as it takes nearly

two years for sugarcane to get into commercial production.

With the holiday season upon us, we usually look forward to holiday treats and candies. But prices being what they are the homemaker may want to cut down on the use of sugar and find ways to substitute syrups in various desserts.

Substitute honey, molasses, sorghum and other syrups for sugar in your favorite baked goods. T conversion for one cup of sugar is as follows: Use one cup of honey reducing the liquid 4 cup for each cup of honey used. If molasses or sorghum is used for one cup of sugo use 11/2 cups molasses or sorghum and reduce the liquid 4 cup for each cut of molasses or sorghum used. Two cups of coin syr up can be subitituted for one cup of sugar if the liquid is reduced to 4 fo each cup of corn syrup




Pastor and family
