## MUSTANGS RIP LEFORS 25-20 IN OPENER

David Britt fighting back from a 13-0 deficit, Wheeler's Mustangs defeated the favored Lefors Pirates 25-20 last night in the '74 opener for both clubs before a capacity crowd at Johnson Field in perfect ball weather. The Pirates had the young Mustangs on the ropes and seemed to have things going their way until midway of the second quarter when the Mustangs got on board with sophomore Don Brown's 5 yard sprint and left end that cut the margin to seven. Brown, who was inserted at the starting role at leftback with an injury Don Chapman, coolly engineered coach Jim Robinson's charges throughout the game and his five yard punt to paydirt capped a 67 yard drive in just five plays. Jerry Tidwell returned the kickoff following the Pirates second TD 23 yards out to Mustangs 33. Dave Masick slipped off runs of 18 and 9 to put the pigskin at Mustang Newsletter

the Pirate 40. Tidwell broke for 19 yards at left tackle before Kent Ware got 11 on a pitch-out at right end for a first down on the 10. Lefors drew five yards for a personal foul and then Brown went over untouched on the first play from the five. The extra point boot by Jim Verden was good but the Mustangs were offside and on the next try, the kick was to the left of the uprights. Wheeler drove to the Pirate 25 following the opening kickoff but the drive fizzled out and the Pirates took over on their 30. Aided by a personal fine against the Mustangs, the Pirates quickly moved downfield to the Wheeler 21 where Bill McIlhany stopped the drive with a fumble recovery. Lefors got the ball back just three plays later when Phil White intercepted a Brown pass on the Mustang 43. Nine plays later the Pirates were in the end zone with Barney Sawyer breaking through his right guard from 10 yards out. A big 21

yard gain on a pass from White to Greg Beck on fourth down put the ball on the 10. Beck's kick for the extra point was wide to the right and Lefors had a 6-0 lead with four seconds remaining in the first quarter. Beck kicked off and Ware bobbled the ball at the five and finally fell on the loose ball at the one and this set the stage for the big break that gave the Pirates the ball deep in the Mustangs territory. Wheeler couldn't get the first down and Verden's fourth down boot sailed out of bounds just four yards upfield and the Pirates were in business on the 14. Swayer lost one but Rick Jennings found lots of running room off his right end and dashed 15 yards to put the visitors up by 13 after Beck booted the one pointer. The Mustangs appeared to be out of it as this point but to their credit, they fought back and got back in the game with the 67 yard drive. Time was running out in

the half when the Mustangs launched their second touchdown march that was set up by a fumble recovery at the Pirates 49. Brown got five up the middle on first down and then Dan Helton broke loose around the Pirates right end but was hauled down on the 25. Wheeler punched out a first down on the 14 on two runs by Ware and one by Massick but drew 15 for clipping. After an incomplete pass, Helton found a gap at right tackle and cutback to his left and playing his blockers with precision, made a beautiful run to put the Mustangs one back. An attempted run for the go ahead points was no good and the Mustangs just trailed by one at halftime. Lefors was forced to kick on their first possession on the final half and Tidwell nearly broke loose on the punt return but was hauled down after a 29 yard scamper to the Mustang 44. Garnering just three yards, the Mustangs booted the ball back to the Pirates at the Lefors 20. Lefors went to the airways on first down and Helton intercepted on the Pirate 45 and returned 11 to the 34. Ware rammed 12 big yards

to the 22 and a first down. He got another two before Brown passed to David Paterson for five more. Four plays later, Ware took a pitch and circled right end from seven yards out. A bad snap failed the extra point kick and the Mustangs had their first lead, 18-13 with 3:35 remaining in the third stanza. Lefors was not to be outdone and drove to the Mustang 8 where they fired up horses stopped the drive. Wheeler's fourth touchdown and the one that proved to be the margin, came midway of the final quarter. Tidwell gave the Mustangs good field position with a 23 yard punt return to the Pirate 48 after picking up the ball in hoset of white shirted Pirates. On first down from the 48 Brown found his split end Robert Wills, running free in the Pirate secondary and hit him with a perfect pass and Wills raced to paydirt but the play was wiped out as the Mustangs were offside. Undaunted, Brown came back two plays later with the same pass and once more Wills was open and the Mustangs wide receiver gathered the ball in and outraced the Pirates to the end zone to complete the 51 yard scoring play. Verden booted his first extra point of the game and the Mustangs had a 25-13 margin with 7:02 to play. An exchange of punts gave the visitors the ball at their 24 with a little over three minutes remaining. Jennings got great blocking on a sweep of the Mustangs right end and there was no catching him after he headed up the sideline although Ware made a valiant effort to haul him down at the Mustang 15. Beck narrowed the

margin to the final 25-20 score as he split the uprights but the Mustangs just weren't about to lose this game after their effort of fighting back and taking the lead. Wheeler ran out the clock and the Mustangs had their first win of the young season and had averaged the 7-6 loss to the Pirates in '73.

**MUSTANGS IDLE THIS WEEK; JUNIOR VARSITY HOSTS VALLEY**  
The Wheeler Mustangs take the week off from completion this Friday but have been busy in preparations for their next contest against the tough Canadian Wildcats. The Mustangs JV is in action again this week so fans of Wheeler football won't be without action on the gridiron. Valley's Patriots, who dropped into Class B competition this year, send their junior varsity squad to Wheeler Thursday and will give battle to the Mustangs JV on Nicholson Field at 6 p.m. The enthusiastic Wheeler junior varsity, comprised of freshmen and sophomore come out of their win over Lefors with only one casualty. Jeff Davis injured a knee and his availability for the Valley game is uncertain. Fan support is vital in the success of all athletic teams and the fans are urged to come out and watch and support these young men who represent Wheeler on the gridiron.

**JV Mustangs Blank Lefors 14-0**  
Not to be outdone by their teammates of the varsity, the JV Mustangs thoroughly whipped the Lefors Pirates JV last Saturday morning in Lefors and won via a shut-out, 14-0. The junior varsity parlayed an 80 yard drive for their first TD and a short 11 yard spurt into their two touchdown victory. The JV's were impressive with their hard hitting in the game with Darrell Gaines getting perhaps the most crushing tackle of the game. Gaines slammed into a Pirate on a punt reception in the fourth quarter and it was a shot heard all over the gridiron. Lefors had two threats to the Mustangs end zone, one to the 11 in the first half and the other to the Wheeler 18 in the last half, stopped by the aroused Mustang defense. The Pirates recovered a loose ball on the Wheeler 38 early in the first quarter but came up a yard shy on a fourth down at the Wheeler 11. The Pirate made two of the three first downs they got in the game on this drive and one of them was via a pass interference call. Wheeler dove 80 yards for their initial TD of the game with Mike Izard, JV tailback, getting the drive underway with a 19 yard

Citizens of Wheeler and the surrounding area are being asked to assist the City Police by correcting some of the driving habits which have been practiced over the past several years.  
Keith Miller, Chief of Police has observed local drivers and lists three of the most practiced violations.  
Angle Parking: In backing from a parking space, it is illegal to back across the middle of the street and travel in the opposite direction.  
Driving to left of center: Drivers have been observed pulling onto the left lane of traffic and traveling some distance or parking on the left hand side to the street. This needs to be corrected particularly on the three highways in Wheeler; tourists are not aware of our driving habits. The parking offense can be observed at the Post Office and City Office.  
Rolling to a Stop: Wheeler is plagued with the age old problem of rolling stops. The law states you should stop at or behind the stop sign and then proceed with caution. Please observe these laws - make the observance of traffic laws a matter of pride for Wheeler.

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## Services Held For Sam Hale, Sr.

Funeral services for Samuel Douglas Hale, Sr., 77 a member of the Panhandle Sports Hall of Fame who was named to the honor for his major league baseball batting record was at 3 p.m. Sunday in the First Baptist Church at Wheeler.

Burial was in Wheeler Cemetery by Wright Funeral Home.

Mr. Hale died Friday afternoon in Parkview Hospital at Wheeler after a long illness.

He was inducted into the Panhandle Sports Hall of Fame in 1966 for his .302 batting average compiled through 10 major league baseball seasons.

Mr. Hale made big news in 1922 when Connie Mack paid the Detroit Tigers \$75,000 to get Hale on the Philadelphia Athletics.

Mack's money for third baseman Hale proved to be a good investment as he hit above .300 in four of his seven years in Philadelphia. In 1930 he went to the St. Louis Browns for his final major league year. He batted .274 for the Browns.

His major league debut at Detroit in 1920 was a good one. He was called in as a

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pinch hitter for the pitcher who already had two strikes called on him. There were two men on base. He hit the first pitch to home off scoreboard.

For several years Mr. Hale played in the high minor leagues, which included Midland in the Texas-New Mexico League.

While playing baseball took up golf and turned to this field when he ended baseball career. He was as a professional or game keeper at Phillips, Shamrock and Memphis. He retired in 1964 and moved to Wheeler in 1967.

He was a native in G. Rose.

Survivors include three sons, Sam Jr. of Amarillo, Tommy of Hobbs, N.M., and Richard Max of Floydada, two daughters, Mrs. Carol Bolton of Beatrice, Neb., and Mrs. Jack Harris of Floydada; a sister Mrs. Velma Martin of Wheeler; four brothers, Pruitt of Slaton; Francis of Childersburg, Pa.; and a number of grandchildren.

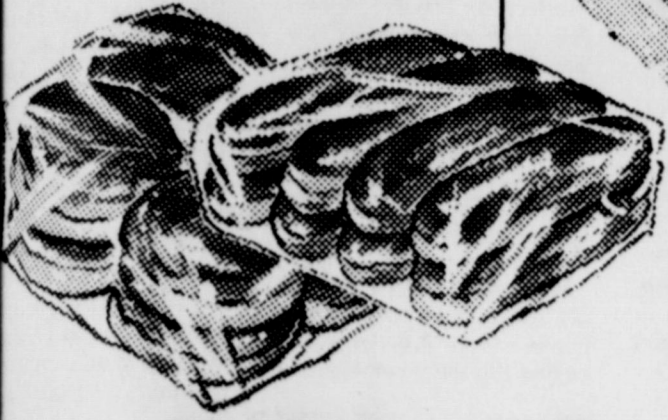

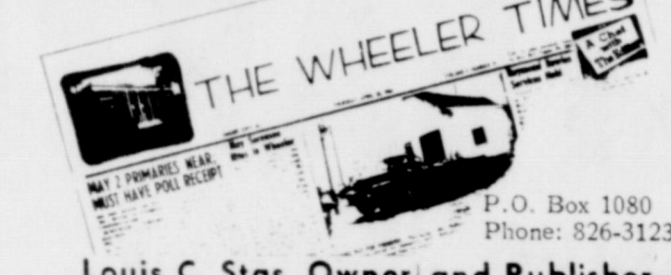

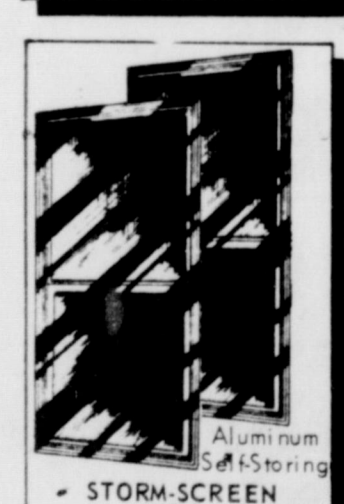

# Panhandle Home To Lots Of Ducks

The Texas panhandle may look dry and dusty to most folks, but to a large population of ducks, its home.  
 A brood production survey was run in early July by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Dept. and an accurate estimation of waterfowl production has been initiated.  
 "We use a system of transect lines for estimating brood production", Bob West, Texas Parks and Wildlife waterfowl biologist said today in Canyon.  
 "I have observed along these transect lines over one thousand broods of waterfowl with a average of five ducklings in each brood", he continued.  
 Among the species spotted by West are mallard, pintail, cinnamon, blue-winged teal, ruddy, red-head ducks. Also, coots are prevalent on nearly every lake.  
 This survey will furnish much needed data to as to the yearly fluctuation of waterfowl numbers, nests, and a year-to-year census for the state and federal regulating agencies.  
 Periodic droughts and sporadic rains will affect the nesting of hens although late rains this summer will allow broods to mature before the annual early teal season in Sept. Many of the early mal-

**Excessive Government Spending**  
 Excessive government spending is accorded the chief blame for the current inflationary cycle by independent business enterprises.  
 This is showing up strongly in the continuous survey of the National Federation of Independent Business. These surveys also reveal that a majority of the business establishments report constantly eroding profits even though churning more dollars through the cash register.  
 But while excessive government spending largely by the administrative branch of government such as foreign aid programs, and proliferating bureau employment is charged with the major cause of inflation, Congressional actions are also showing up as a contributory factor.  
 The NFIB survey asks what impact consumer laws already enacted have had on operation. These laws are the so-called "Truth in Lending Act" and the "Truth in Labeling and Packaging." The question is asked if these laws have increased the cost of doing business.  
 Of all respondents, now totaling in excess of 75,000 19.2 per cent report these laws as they are administered have increased their costs of operations.  
 However, this raw figure does not reflect the true picture, as for example, only 10.5 per cent of the professional respondents reply in the affirmative.  
 But among the respondents engaged in financial services which include many small community banks finance companies and similar operations, 55.7 per cent report these laws have increased their costs.  
 In addition 23.2 per cent of the retailer respondents report increased costs due to these laws as well as 22.4 per cent of the respondents who are agriculturally oriented.  
 The extra costs reported are largely due to regulations written off the legislation which require greater expense in paperwork, reports and other overhead expenses involved.  
 Because of the highly, and often unfavorable competitive position of small business, these costs are usually absorbed while the big corporate operators merely pass on these increased costs.  
 In a credit saturated economy probably the key figure in these NFIB findings is the fact that 55.7 per cent of the independent financial firms find these laws involve extra costs.  
 While these smaller financial institutions are not a factor when it comes to setting the prime rate on which all interest business and consumers is based, it seems a safe assumption that when big corporate financial houses set their prime rates these costs are included.  
 Many respondents to the NFIB surveys volunteer comments which strongly question the wisdom of pushing for expansion of so called social laws until the back of inflation is

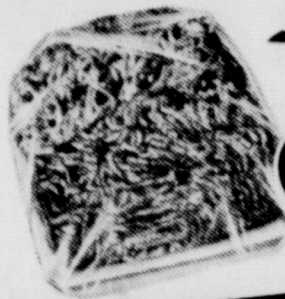
