Lefors drew five yards for a personal foul and then Brown went over untouched on the first play from the five. The extra point boot by Jim Verden was good but the Mustangs were offside and on the next

try, the kick was to the left of the uprights. Wheeler drove to the Pirate 25 following the opening kickoff but the drive fizzled out and the Pirates took over on their 30.

Aided by a personal fine against the Mustanas, the Pirates quickly moved downfield to the Wheeler 21 where Bill Mcllhany stopped the drive with a fumble re-

Brown pass on the Mustang 43. Nine plays later the Pirates were in the end zone with Barney Saw yer breaking through his right guard from 10 yards out. A big 21

yard ga iner on a pass from White to Greg Beck on fourth down put the ball on the 10.

Beck's kick for the extra point was wide to the right and Lefors had a 6-0 lead with four seconds remaining in the first quarter.

Beck kicked off and Ware bobbled the ball at the five and finally fell on the loose ball at the one and this set the stage for the big break that gave the Pirates the ball deep in the Mustanas

territory. Wheeler couldn't get the first down and Verden's

fourth down boot sailed out of bounds just four yards upfield and the Pirates were in business on the 14.

Swayer lost one but Rick Jennings found lots of running room off his right end and dashed 15 yards to put the visitors up by 13 after Beck booted the one point-

The Mustan as appeared to be out of it as this point but to their credit, they fought back and got back in the game with the 67 yard drive. Time was running out in

the half when the Mustangs launched their second touch down march that was set up by a fumble recovery at the Pirates 49.

Lefors was forced to kick on their first possession on the final half and Tidwell nearly broke loose on the punt return but was hauled down after a 29 yard scamper to the Mustang 44.

Garnering just three yards, the Mustangs booted the ball back to the Pirates at the Lefors 20. Lefors went to the airways on first down and Helton intercepted on the Pirate 45 and returned

to the 22 and a first down. He got another two before Brown passed to David Patterson for five more. Four

plays later, Ware took a pitch and circled right end from seven yards out. A bad snap foiled the extra point kick and the Mustangs had their first lead, 18-13 with 3:35 remaining in the third stanza.

Lefors was not to be outdone and drove to the Mustang 8 where they fired up hores stopped the drive. Wheeler's fourth touchdown and the one that proved to be the margin, came midway of the final quarter. Tidwell gave the Mustangs good field position with a 23 yard punt return to the Pirate 48 after picking up the ball in hoset of white shirted Pirates.



When both units are completed andon the line, the SPS system generation capability will be increased to almost 3-million kilowatts, with the coal-fired units representing 22% of the total.

The turbine-geneator for the 1978 unit will be made by Westinghouse and the boiler by Combustion Engineering, Inc. and these manufacturers have assured SPS that the equir ment will be available.



Panhandle Sports Hall of Fame in 1966 for his .302 batting average compiled through 10 major league base ball seasons.


Mr. Hale made big news in 1922 when Connie Mack paid the Detroit Tigers \$75,000 to get Hale on the Philadephia Athletics.

Panhandle Home To Lots Of Ducks

Francis is her helper.

The Texas panhandle may look dry and dusty to most folks, but to a large population of ducks, its nome.

A brood production survey was run in early July by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Dept. and an accurate estimation of waterfowl production has been initated.

"We use a system of transect lines for estimating brood production", Bob West, Texas Parks and Wildlife waterfolw biologist said today in Canyon.

"I have observed along these transect lines over one thousand broods of waterfowl with a verage of five ducklings in each brood", he continued.

Among the species spotted by West are mallard, pintail, cinnamon, bluewinged teal, ruddy, redhead ducks. Also, coots are prevelant on nearly every lake.

This survey will furnish much needed da ta as to the yearly fluxuation of waterfowl numbers, nests, and a year-to-year census for the state and federal regulating agencies. Periodic droughts and sporadic rains will affect the nesting of hens al-



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

Excessive government spending is accorded the chief blame for the current inflationary cycle by independent business enterto J T Coulson 6-14-74 NE1/4 pri ses. This is showing up strong ly in the contincous survey of the National Federation of Independent Business.

These surveys also reveal that a majority of the business establishments report constanly eroding profits even though churning more dollars through the cash register. But while excessive

government spending largely by the administrative branch of government such as foreigh aid programs, and proliferating bureau employment is charg ed with the major cause of inflation, Congressional actions are also showing up as a contributory factor.

The NFIB survey asks what impact consumer laws already enacted have had on operation. These laws are the so-called "Truth in Lending Act" and the "Truth in Lableing and Packaging." The question is asked if these laws have increased the cost of doing business.

Of all respondents, now totaling in excess of 75,000 19.2 per cent report theses laws as they are administered have increased their costs of operations. However, this raw figure does not reflect the true picture, as for example, only 10.5 per cent of the professional respondents reply in the affirmative. But among the respondents engaged in fiinancial services which include many small community banks finance companies and similar operations, 55.7 per cent report these laws have increased their costs. In addition 23.2 per cent of the retailer respondents report increased costs due to these laws as well as 22.4 per cent of the respondents who are agriculturally orien ted.





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The extra costs reported are largely due to regulations written off the legislation which require greater expense in paperwork, reports and other overhead expenses involved. Becauce of the highly,

and often unfavorable competitive position of small business, these costs are usually absorbed while the big corporate operators merely pass on these increased costs. In a credit saturated

economy probably the key figure in these NFIB findings is the fact that 55.7 per cent of the independent financial firms find these laws involve extra costs. While these smaller financial institutions are not a factor when it comes to setting the rrime rate on

which all interest tobusines and consumers is based, it seems a safe assumption that when big corporate financial houses set heir prime rates these costs are included.

Many respondents to the NFIB surveys volunteer comments which strongly question the wisdom of pushing for expansion of so called soc ial laws until he back of inflation is




