

Greenbug Control In Wheat: Methyl Parathion, applied by air in a water carrier has given excellent results in controlling the greenbug. Malathion and dimethuate applied as an aerial spray were not effective in greenbug control according to Professor Norris Daniels of the Bushland Research Center. Ultra-lowvol ume control with any of the insecticides was found unsatisfactory in all instances. Insecticides applied with

water using conventional gound equipment gave good

Gardening Tip: Now's a good time to get your garden spot worked up. We've seen a lot of onions and English peas planted recently. A good quality of organic matter in the form of peat moss, compost or manure improves the structure of the soil It's a good idea to put about 4 bushels of organic matter to each 100 square feet of

soil area. Work it into the soil either by spading or plowing but mix it thoroughly. Apply 3-4 pounds of a balan ced fertilizer per 100 square feet. We suggest broadcasting it and then spading or discing it into the soil.




