

#### KING'S KOMMENTS

By Don King - CEA

The squash bug is one of the most difficult pests to control in the home garden. This insect attacks the leaves of squash plants, causing them to wilt and die. Small plants may be killed, as may larger plants which are heavily infested.

The adult squash bugs are about 5/8 in. length, brownish-black and flatbacked. Nymphs are from 3/16 to 1/2 inch long with off-white bodies and black legs. The adult squash bug

overwinters in all kinds of sheltered areas and begins to show up on squash plants about the time small squash are apparent from blooms on the plant. Mating then occurs and the female squash bug begins laying eggs on the underside of the leaves. These eggs are yellowishbrown to dark brown, about



and congregate under the leaves or on the stems of squash. When either the nymphs or adults are crushed They give off a disagreeable odor. Both nymphs and adults feed by sucking sap from the plant.

Careful and frequent inspection of squash plants should be made. Adult squash bugs and eggs should be removed and destroyed when they begin to appear on the plants. When it becomes impossible to keep up with the number of squash bugs by destroying the adults and eggs, insecticides should be applied as needed to obtain control. Carbaryl (Sevin), malathion

or diazinon might be used to control this pest. There is no preharvest interval for squash sprayed with carbaryl. Squash sprayed with diazinon should not be harvested until day after app lication. Information on the label on the insecticide container should be checked at the store before the insecticide is purchsed to make sure it is labeled for the control of squash bugs. Instuctions should be followed closely when mixing and applying the insecticide, using proper safety precaut-

Results of a recent summary of soil samples tested for pasture fertilization indicates that pasture soils are usually lower in native fertility than cropland soils. Nearly all pasture soils

need ni trogen to enhance forage growth and quality. Nitrogen also improves drought tolerance and water efficiency. Phosphorus is needed on

most Texas pasture soils; however, the need for potassium are highest in the eastern part of Texas.

The main reason for low fertility pasture soils is that many pastures are going on abandoned cropland. When cropland soils become infertile or unprobable for cultivation, the tendency is to turn the soils into permanent pasture. Also, pasture soils may have limited warer holding capacity. Your Choice
