HOMECOMING ACTIVITIES CORONATION SCHEDULED AT 7:00

Homecoming activities for Friday begin with an assembly, followed by a parade and rally on the square at 10:00 a'clock. The coronation of the homecoming queen will be at 7:30. The Wheeler-McLean High School Homecoming Council is sponsoring the Homecoming Activities on Friday, Oct. 25. The coronation assembly will be at 7:00 a'clock in the High School gymnasium. The Homecoming Queen Contestants nominated by the students will be presented to the five Senior Mustangs. The nominees are Joanie Shonda Johnson, Joanne Ford, Shelly Smith, Lynn Marshall, and Jana Lynn Marshall. The candidates will be crowned by Don Chapman, Wallace, Raymond Kent Ware and Paterson. After the coronation, each girl will give a speech. The council has asked three students to participate in the assembly by speaking to the student body, teachers

and guests. Invited to address the group are Kim Dutton, class of '73; Richard Wallace, class of '65, and Dunk Porter, class of '65. Master of ceremonies will be Bill McIlhenny, vice president of the Student Council.

The Homecoming Parade and Pep Rally will begin at 2:15 Friday afternoon. The parade will be led by the Wheeler Mustang Band and will proceed from the School to Texas Street and gather at the southwest corner of the square. A number of classes and organizations of the school will enter floats and the spirit stick will be presented at the rally.

The Wheeler Band Boosters will sponsor a chili supper in the cafeteria. The coronation of the Homecoming Queen chosen by the Mustangs will be on Nicholson Field at 7:00 p.m. The Mustang Band and the Pep Squad will join the Senior Mustangs in presenting the nominees and the coronation of the queen. Fans are urged to come early enough for these activities.

The Wheeler-McLean football game beginning at 7:30 P.M.

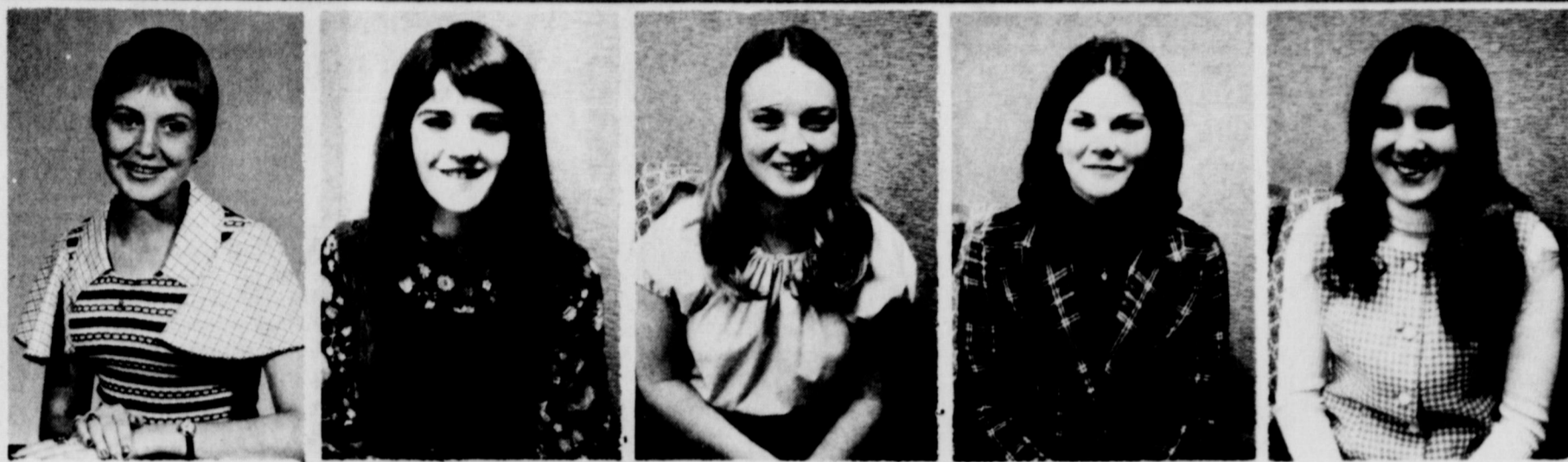

IRISH VICTIM OF MUSTANGS 14-12

Jim Verden propelled two kicks through the uprights and by virtue of these one pointers, the Wheeler Mustangs prevailed over the Shamrock Irish last Friday night 14-12 on Nicholson Field before a near capacity crowd.

It was a sweet victory for the Mustangs over their ancient rivals from south of the river and the Mustangs had to come from behind and also stave off a final thrust by the Irish to achieve the win.

Trailing 12-7 the Mustangs drove 80 yards in just five plays the second time they had the ball in the last half for a touchdown and made the two point margin stand up.

A fumble recovery by Kent Ware at the Shamrock 43 on the second play of the game gave the gold

clad Mustangs the early momentum.

Using a varied running attack, the Mustangs moved downfield to the Shamrock 19 and had a first down at that point.

Ware picked up four on a stab at right tackle but Don Brown was dropped for a yard loss on second down and the Mustangs went

to the air twice but to no avail and Shamrock took over on the 16.

Wheeler set up shop at the Irish 14 when Shamrock fumbled on first down and the Mustangs recovered.

Ware picked up four on a sweep around his left end and then gauged out five more off right guard before Brown kept for a

couple and a first and goal at the three.

Brown got it all on first down on a keeper to the right side and dove into the end zone at the flag.

Verden's PAT kick was true and the Mustangs had a 7 point bulge at 5:14.

A freakish bounce on a punt by Verden on the first play of the second quarter

gave the Irish good field position at the Wheeler 42.

The kick hit on the Shamrock 45 and bounced off and through Mustangs and Irish back to the Wheeler 45. Bill McIlhenny appeared to have the loose ball in his grasp but it squirmed away and Shamrock recovered on the 42.

On third down, Ray Vinyard passed to Robbie Reeder at the Mustang 7 but the going got tough before the Irish got their touchdown on fourth down from the one. Vinyard sneaked it over for the Irish at 8:23 but hopes for a tie

at this point were dashed when Verden came roaring through and blocked Larry Dyer's attempted kick.

Shamrock got their chance for the go ahead touchdown and they took advantage of it on the Mustangs possession after the first Irish TD.

Reeder intercepted a Brown pass near midfield and returned the pigskin to the Wheeler 38 to set the stage for the 8 play drive to paydirt.

Shamrock scored their first touchdown on fourth down and a big fourth down play kept their drive alive

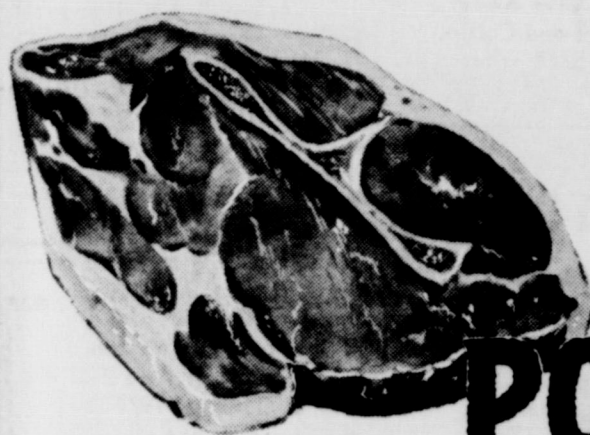
