## FFA RODEO SLATED FRIDAY, SATURDAY



The second annual Wheeler High School Rodeo sponsored by the Wheeler FFA Chapter will be this Friday and Saturday nights at 8:00 P.M. at the Wheeler Roping Club Arena.

This year the Rodeo will be a Tri-State High School Rodeo Association approved show. The Tri-State High School Rodeo Association is made up of approximately 30 high school rodeo clubs in Texas, Oklahoma, and New Mexico. The Tri-State is operated in much the same way as the R. C. A. for professional cowboys and the N.I.R.A. for college contestants. Members can contest at any of the 18 approved high school rodeos during the 1973-74 school year and earn points toward the championship in each rodeo event.

The top 15 contestants in each of the events will be allowed to compete in the Tri-State finals to be held in Amarillo next June. It will be carried on an Amarillo TV Station, live from the fair grounds.

The Wheeler FFA Rodeo is the first point show for the 1974 Championship and should have a lot of good contestants. The rodeo events include; Bareback Bronc Riding, Bull Roping, Calf Roping, Ribbon Roping, Team Roping, and Chute Dogging for the boys and Barrel Racing, Pole Bending, Goat Tying, and Steer Riding for the girls.

## Wheeler County Rural Accidents

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated six accidents on rural highways in Wheeler County during the month of May, according to Sergeant J. L. Dalrymple, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and three persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first five months of 1973 shows a total of 64 accidents resulting in one person killed and 30 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of Public Safety Region for May, 1973 shows a total of 550 accidents resulting in 21 persons killed and 318 to May, 1972 with 517 accidents resulting in 25 persons killed and 329 persons injured. This was 33 more accidents, 4 less fatalities, and 11 less injured in 1973 at the same period of time.

The 21 traffic deaths for the month of May, 1973 occurred in the following counties: Gray 5; Lubbock, 4; Bailey and Hartley, 2 each; Castro, Knox, Montague, Palo Pinto, Randall, Swisher, Wise and Young, one each.

## Breath Of Life Campaign Chrm.

Reverend Ross Dunn has been named chairman of the Breath of Life Campaign to fight children's lung diseases according to Frank Scott, president of the North Texas Chapter, National Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation.

Rev. Dunn of Wheeler, Texas, will lead Wheeler volunteers in raising funds to support research and care programs for children affected by lung-damaging diseases like cystic fibrosis, severe asthma, chronic bronchitis, bronchiectasis, and a condition called "child hood emphysema".

Cystic fibrosis, an incurable genetic disease, is inherited when both parents carry the recessive gene for C/F. It is believed that one in twenty persons or 10 million Americans may carry the C/F gene, usually without knowing it. Current research funded by the National Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation is seeking a practical test to identify these carriers.

Because of improved therapy and constant research many C/F patients are living beyond infancy to their teens and into young adulthood. That same kind of therapy is relieving and often curing children suffering from other respiratory afflictions whose symptoms resemble those of C/F.

"Most people don't realize that there are six million children in the U. S. affected by pulmonary illness," said Rev. Dunn. "For some of these children, breathing is not the natural function we, who are lucky, take for granted."

The Breath of Life Campaign supports not only research but over 100 C/F Centers for diagnosis and treatment across the country.

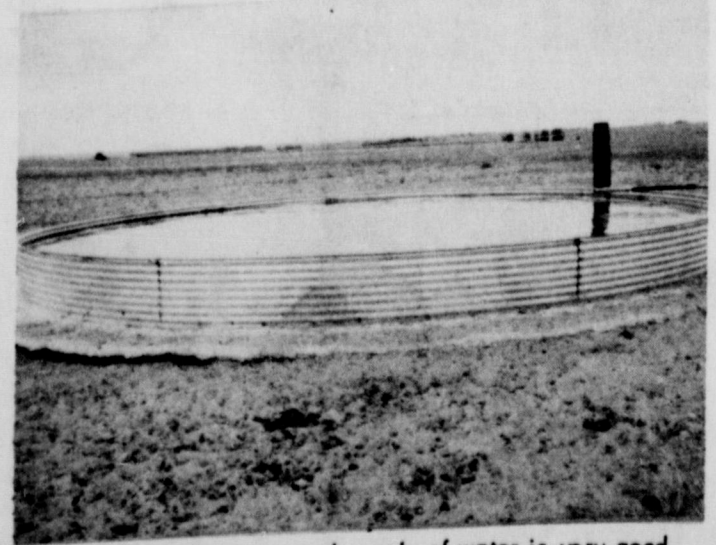
Please find enclosed a letter to renew my subscription for your paper by the Times very especially the Allison and the letters of Mr. [Name].

Home food preservation is nearly in full swing! Food may be canned or frozen, but did you know there are two methods of canning? There is the pressure cooker method and the water-bath method. The water-bath method is used for processing fruits and tomatoes which have high acid content and is done using a pan with a lid and rack. The rack is used to hold the jars off the bottom of the cooker. The pan is large enough to cover the jars with one to two inches of water, so that the jars are surrounded with boiling water. The lid is used to help retain the heat. The acid

in some fruits and vegetables helps prevent the growth of some bacteria which is the reason the water-bath process can be used. However, low acid fruits and vegetables must be canned using the pressure cooker. Some bacteria are highly resistant to heat, which makes it necessary for them to be destroyed by high heat. This is accomplished with the pressure cooker.

What are foods processed by these methods? The water bath is used for such foods as peaches, plums, and tomatoes. The pressure cooker is used for such foods as beets, peas, corn, beans, greens and okra.

When you buy meat and poultry products, such as beef stew and chicken pie, remember this. If there is a picture of the product on the label, it must truly represent the product in side. This holds true for all meat and poultry products inspected by the U.S. Department of Agriculture or state meat inspection services.
