## THE FAMILY LAWYER

### "Reasonable Wear and Tear"

Because the rent for his apartment was high, Henderson figured he could do pretty much as he pleased with the elegant furnishings. During his occupancy he broke two valuable lamps, lost a costly pitcher and a painting, and spattered the antique furniture with unremovable stains. When the landlord demanded reimbursement for the damage, Henderson said he could not be held liable for "reasonable wear and tear." But a court saw things the landlord's way and ordered Henderson to make good.

If you are renting a house or an apartment, chances are that

somewhere in your lease there is a clause about reasonable wear and tear. This puts common-sense limits on the use you can make of the premises. In other cases, courts have held it wrong when



- 1) a man chopped wood indoors, ripping the wallpaper, splintering the woodwork, and punching holes in the plaster;
- 2) a woman let her bathtub overflow, causing extensive water damage;
- 3) a man, trying to chisel open a stuck window, gouged great

holes in the sill. 4) a couple permitted their pet poodle to soil the living room rug at will. On the other hand, the law recognizes that a certain amount of deterioration—scuffed floors, worn carpets, nicked chairs—can come from normal, everyday use.

Nor is the tenant usually liable for harm done by the elements. Accordingly, in another case, the weathering and weakening of porch railings and outside shutters were held not the tenant's responsibility.

As one judge put it: "Reasonable wear and tear contemplates that deterioration will occur by reason of time and use despite ordinary care. A tenant is not required to renovate the premises at the expiration of his lease."

### Injury Before Birth

Motorists who negligently knock down pedestrians would naturally expect to be held legally liable for the consequences. But suppose the pedestrian is an expectant mother. And suppose, as a result of the accident, her baby is born with some sort of defect. Could the motorist be held liable also for the injury to the child? Traditionally the law refused to grant damages for prenatal injuries. Courts reasoned that until the actual moment of birth, the child was merely a part of its mother, with no independent existence on which to base a claim.



But in recent years the law's viewpoint has changed sharply. Today, almost everywhere, a child is entitled to collect damages for a prenatal injury that was inflicted negligently—at least, if it occurred during the later months of pregnancy. As one court put it: "A child has a legal right to begin life with a sound mind and body."

Of course it is still necessary, in establishing the child's claim, to prove there was a causal connection between the accident and the disability. Consider this case: A baby was born with a deformed foot after his mother had been hurt in an auto collision. But medical experts said there was no reliable way of tracing the deformity to the accident. Accordingly, a court ruled that there were no grounds for holding the other motorist liable.

Assuming that the child does have a legitimate claim, would it make any difference if the mother herself was partly to blame for the accident? That question arose in another auto case, in which the mother's own bad driving—as well as the other motorist's—had contributed to the collision. But a court decided that the mother's negligence should not block her child's claim against the other motorist. The court thought it would be unfair, after giving the child a legal right, to take that right away because of somebody else's error.

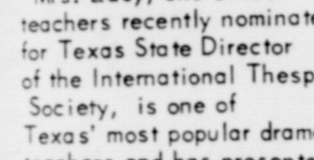
**Accidents in Co. For July '73**  
 The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 13 accidents on rural highways in Wheeler County during the month of July, according to Sergeant J.L. Dalrymple, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area. These crashes resulted in no persons killed and ten persons injured. The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first six months of 1973 shows a total of 83 accidents resulting in one person killed and 43 persons injured. The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for July, 1973 shows a total of 658 accidents resulting in 21 persons killed and 366 persons injured as compared to July, 1972 with 713 accidents resulting in 34 persons killed and 388 persons injured. This was 55 less accidents, 13 less fatalities, and 22 less injured in 1973 at the same period of time. The 21 traffic deaths for the month of July, 1973 occurred in the following counties: Lubbock, Sherman, Wilbarger, three each; Palo Pinto, Parmer, two each; Hockley, Jack, Lamb, Parker, Wise, Hutchinson, Potter, and Oldham, one each.

### Separation Best For Stock Water

The major use of farm ponds in Wheeler County is for livestock water. A good distribution of water will be very beneficial for livestock grazing. When livestock watering places are scarce in a pasture, the animals will not make efficient use of all the forage in the pasture. Some areas will rarely be grazed when they are too far from water while others near the water will be overgrazed. Inefficient grazing of a pasture is lost income to the landowner. For good grazing distribution, water supplies should be located around 1/2 mile apart. One mile is considered the maximum distance cattle will normally graze from a water supply. Farm ponds provide many recreational possibilities as well as livestock water. These may include: fishing, swimming, wildlife habitat, camping area, and aesthetic value. With a little planning farm ponds can be money making projects. Your local Soil Conservation Service will be happy to assist you in locating a good farm pond site. Another good source of livestock water is windmills. However, windmills are only as good as the storage facility used with them. Water storage facilities should be designed to hold a week's supply of water for your cattle herd. This is necessary since windmills occasionally need repair and the wind does not blow every day of the year. Protect your livestock investments by planning adequate water, in good locations for all of your pastures.

## A Letter from Ern

1923 was the wettest fall I ever experienced in Wheeler Co. It was the month of Sept. A little 10 or 11 year old boy, the given name I do not remember, was stark naked and got up the rest of the family. He crawled under a wire netting fence, got into their garden, and started walking on the dirt road. The family lived on a farm close to the Zybach store. So the following morning the whole population, men only, searched for the boy. The fear was the boy probably got to the Camp Co. pasture and all the cattle out of curiosity seeing the naked boy would trample him to death. People horse back, in cars, and on foot were hunting the boy. He had gone nearly to Ranklin, Okla., a distance of 13 miles down the dirt road. It so happened the boy hid a few times when cars came along he said, as he was stark naked. While hiding in a culvert he saw some children playing he told them he wanted some overalls and wanted to go home. He told them where he lived. The community was relieved. So don't never risk walking in your sleep. While I was in the armed force in 1918 and 1919, was a common thing for a soldier to get lice. We called the coodies, if some one got lousy was a joke, of course. On one occasion a fellow in my Remount Squadron had orders to bail all his clothes what do you suppose that fellow done? He boiled shoe leather jacket, cap and blankets. That was his orders. Probably killed the lice, but that was no waste to what happens in army. 'Tis no disgrace to get lousy, but not to get rid of them is.

**Separation Best For Stock Water**  
 The major use of farm ponds in Wheeler County is for livestock water. A good distribution of water will be very beneficial for livestock grazing. When livestock watering places are scarce in a pasture, the animals will not make efficient use of all the forage in the pasture. Some areas will rarely be grazed when they are too far from water while others near the water will be overgrazed. Inefficient grazing of a pasture is lost income to the landowner. For good grazing distribution, water supplies should be located around 1/2 mile apart. One mile is considered the maximum distance cattle will normally graze from a water supply. Farm ponds provide many recreational possibilities as well as livestock water. These may include: fishing, swimming, wildlife habitat, camping area, and aesthetic value. With a little planning farm ponds can be money making projects. Your local Soil Conservation Service will be happy to assist you in locating a good farm pond site. Another good source of livestock water is windmills. However, windmills are only as good as the storage facility used with them. Water storage facilities should be designed to hold a week's supply of water for your cattle herd. This is necessary since windmills occasionally need repair and the wind does not blow every day of the year. Protect your livestock investments by planning adequate water, in good locations for all of your pastures.

## CHATS WITH GLORIA

We have had a few more questions this week. They'll help you too!

Q. I have been looking for a good pickled okra recipe. Shamrock.

A. 3 1/2 pounds small okra pods  
 1 pint distilled vinegar white  
 1 quart water  
 1/3 cup salt  
 3 small hot peppers, if desired  
 Garlic bud  
 2 teaspoon dill seed  
 Pacn okra firmly in hot sterilized Ball Jars. Put a garlic bud in each jar. Pour boiling brine in jars and seal. Process in boiling water bath at simmering temperature about 180 - 200 F for 10 minutes. Let ripen several weeks before opening. Yield 4-5 pints.

Q. We are raising zucchini squash in our garden but haven't been able to find a good recipe. Mobeetie

A. Scalloped zucchini squash - 6 servings  
 6 cups thinly sliced zucchini squash  
 1 cup boiling water  
 1/2 cup medium white sauce  
 2 eggs beaten  
 1 teaspoon salt  
 1/2 teaspoon worchestershire sauce  
 1 teaspoon finely chipped onion  
 1/4 cup fine dry bread crumbs

1 tablespoon butter or margarine melted  
 Cook squash in boiling water until tender, about 5 minutes Drain. Make a white sauce ( 1 tablespoons fat, 2 tablespoons flour, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 3/4 cup milk)  
 Stir a little hot white sauce in to beaten eggs; then gradually stir eggs into remaining sauce. Stir in salt, worchestershire sauce, onion, and cooked squash.  
 Put in greased 1 quart casserole. Mix bread crumbs with fat; sprinkle over squash mixture. Bake at 325 about 35 minutes.

Q. Where can I but lime for use in pickle making? Wheeler

A. I called every possible store in town at the only place that had limewat the lumber yard. Even though you will need only a cup or two for your pickles, this lime is sold in 10 lb. bags. Perhaps you could share with a friend!
