PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

The constitutional amendment to provide for annual regular sessions of the legislature; and to provide an annual salary of \$15,000 and per diem for the members of the the legislature, effective in January, 1975.

The constitutional amendment to include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses.

The constitutional amendment to extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the homesteads of unmarried adults.

The constitutional amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws creating certain conservation and reclamation

The constitutional amendment authorizing counties and cities bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to issue bonds for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a vote of the resident property taxpayers.

The constitutional amendment stating that the district court concurrently with the county court shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court, and providing the jurisdiction thereof, and further providing that in any probate proceeding the district court shall also have jurisdiction otherwise conferred upon it by law, and further providing that the legislature may increase, diminish or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, and further providing that the egislature shall have power to adopt rules governing the filing, distribution and transfer of all such cases and proceedings as between district courts, county courts, and other courts having jurisdiction thereof, and futher providing that the legislature may provide that all appeals in such matters shall be to the courts of (civil) appeals.

The constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund.

The constitutional amendment to authorize cities, towns, and villages to levy such ad valorem taxes as are sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on their general obligations hereafter issued subject to the restrictions provided by law.

The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from property taxes certain property used by a nonprofit water supply corporation or a nonprofit water supply cooperative.

Admendment No. 7 Effects **Local Veterans**

Tuesday, November 6, 1973 is General Election Day in Texas and is of particular significance to veterans who reside in the State. This was announced to Paul Topper, Vererans Service Officer for Wheeler County.

The voters of Texas will this year be asked to vote "for" or "against" a proposal to ard \$100 million to the Veterans Land Program to finance purchases of ranch and farm lands by eligible vaterns. The 1973 General Election ballot will contain a number of constitutional amendment proposals, and this

will be Number 7 on the form The proposal is to increase the Veterans Land Program band issud from \$400

million to \$500 million. The Veterans Land Program has been in existence since 1949, and has helped thousands of wartime veterans to ,purchase farms and ranches. Under the program, a maximum loan of \$10,000 may be made to an eligible veteran for the purchase of ten acres or more of rural property. Eligible are persons who served 90 days or more in the Armed Forces of the United States since Sept. 16, 1940. and whose service terminated under other than dishonorable conditions. Included are veterans who were legal residents of Texas at the time they enter ed the service, or who have now been residents ofr five years or longer.

This program has operated at no cost to the taxpayer and at considerable benefit not only to veterans but to the economy of all Texans. I t is one of very few programs ever established which will make a profit for the State. Statisticians have determinde that the State of Texas will eventually realize a profit of from \$100 to \$200 million on the Veterans Land Program.

Every citizen of Texas should exercise his or her right to vote on November 6, 1973 and each should cast his ballot for each canadidate or issue in accordanc with the dictates of his concience.

Take a look at any item nat really needed or any that could have been purchased for less during sales times.

I f there is a consistently high expenditure in some unnecessary area - auch as to many meals out or too many pairs of shoes then perhaps you've caught the bill bug.


