MEMPHIS CYCLONES ROLL OVER WHEELER 43-7

An ill wind blows no good as the old saying goes and Memphis used their nickname real well last Friday night and they blew the Mustangs out of the district race with a 43-7 victory. A chilled Nicholson Field crowd saw a short punt and errors by the Mustangs give the Cyclones excellent field position all of the opening quarter and most of the second twelve minutes and although the gallant Mustangs stopped two drives by the vaunted Cyclones, they couldn't overcome both their mistakes and a high powered Memphis offense and trailed by a big 35-0 at half.

The Mustangs biggest problem was that they didn't have the ball enough to really make a contest out of it. Even though yards were tough to come, by the Mustangs were able to move the ball on the ground against the Cyclones but coughed it up to nullify any consistent drive. Penalties and turnovers marred the game and turnovers led to the first three Memphis touchdowns. The Cyclones had the wind in the first quarter and it paid off real quick. Colts Tie Memphis 6-6

Shutting off two late bids by Memphis to break the deadlock, the Wheeler Colts held on and came away with a 6-6 tie with the Memphis Whirlwinds last Thursday night in Memphis.

Memphis had first and goal from the Colt 9 shortly after the final quarter began but when four downs were finished, the Whirlwinds gave up the ball on downs.

The Colts weren't out of the woods by a long shot as they had to punt and Memphis got the ball at the Wheeler 18. Two plays later, Bobby Guthrie quelled the threat by intercepting a pass on the 5 and returning it out to the Colt 23.

Memphis took the opening kickoff and drove 85 yards for their touchdown and

used up nearly the entire first quarter doing it. It appeared that the Colts had stopped the drive when Dell Ford intercepted a pass at the Colt 36 but the turnover was wiped out as one of the Colts was detected grabbing the face mask of the Whirlwind passer, Ricky Guy.

Ford returned the kickoff 16 out to the Colt 40 to set the Colts in motion for their 60 yard TD march. The Colts used the running of Ford and Marvin Grimes to get a first down at the Whirlwind 36 but were assessed 15 for holding and faced a big 25 yards needed from their 49.

They got 22 yards of that back with a pass from Guthrie to Bobby Gunter and Grimes punched out 4 and a first down at the 25. Six plays later, the Colts hit paydirt as Guthrie rolled out around right end on a keeper and scored from four yards out. Grimes was stopped short of the goal on the two point conversion try and the Colts and Whirlwinds were knotted at six all.

The Colts had a chance to go ahead when Kent Gaines intercepted a pass on the first play after the kickoff following the Colts touchdown. Gaines' interception gave the Colts the ball at the Memphis 45 but Ford fumbled the ball away three plays later at the 26.

Memphis stormed back and got to the Wheeler 3 but the clock ran out in the half. Wheeler spent most of the second half on defense and although their defense bent, it never broke and the Colts held on for the tie.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

- The constitutional amendment to provide for annual regular sessions of the legislature; and to provide an annual salary of \$15,000 and per diem for the members of the the legislature, effective in January, 1975.
- The constitutional amendment to include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses.
- The constitutional amendment to extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the homesteads of unmarried adults.
- The constitutional amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws creating certain conservation and reclamation districts.
- The constitutional amendment authorizing counties and cities bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to issue bonds for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a vote of the resident property taxpayers.
- The constitutional amendment stating that the district court concurrently with the county court shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court, and providing the jurisdiction thereof, and further providing that in any probate proceeding the district court shall also have jurisdiction otherwise conferred upon it by law, and further providing that the legislature may increase, diminish or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, and further providing that the legislature shall have power to adopt rules governing the filing, distribution and transfer of all such cases and proceedings as between district and county courts, and other courts having jurisdiction thereof, and further providing that the legislature may provide that all appeals in such matters shall be to the courts of (civil) appeals.
- The constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund.
- The constitutional amendment to authorize cities, towns, and villages to levy such ad valorem taxes as are sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on their general obligations hereafter issued subject to the restrictions provided by law.
- The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from property taxes certain property used by a nonprofit water supply corporation or a nonprofit water supply cooperative.

Sept. Accidents in County

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated nine accidents on rural highways in Wheeler County during the month of September, according to Sergeant J. C. Damrymple, highway patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and seven persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first nine months of 1973 shows a total of 109 accidents resulting in one person killed and 57 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for September, 1973 shows a total of 601 accidents resulting in 24 persons killed and 364 persons injured as compared to September, 1972 with 561 accidents resulting in 21 persons killed and 335 persons injured. This was 40 more accidents, three more fatalities, and 29 more injured in 1973 at the same period of time.

The 24 traffic deaths for the month of September, 1973 occurred in the following counties: Five each in Hardeman and Montague Counties; two each in Palo Pinto, and Gray Counties; and one each in Cochran, Floyd, Hale, Knox, Parker, Wise, Armstrong, Hansford, Ochiltree, Potter
