Revision of the Dress Code

Generally a strong relationship exists between a person's appearance and his conduct. Good grooming and appropriate dress are encouraged and expected of the student's enrolled in the Wheeler Public Schools. A person's grooming, dress and conduct are not only related to himself, but reflects on his family, his school and his community. The following are some regulations that are expected of the students of our school system.

Boy's Dress

1. Belts must be worn with clothes that were originally designed with loops.
2. Socks must be worn with

shoes, including sandals.

3. Shirt tails designed to be worn inside of trousers must be worn in this manner. All shirts must have sleeves.

4. Attire with slogans or emblems is permitted only if it promotes Wheeler Public Schools or an accredited College or University.

5. No tie dye or see through attire will be permitted.

6. No conspicuous or ridiculous costume or attire can be worn that will distract other students attention or detract from a learning environment.

7. Head bands are not permitted.

8. No "T" shirts or decaled sweatshirts are permitted.

Boy's Grooming

1. Cleanliness at all times will be expected.

2. No beards or mustaches will be permitted.

3. Sideburns must not extend below the bottom of the ear and must be straight cut and trimmed.

4. Hair shall not extend beyond the following limit: A. Front - must be out of the eyebrows.

- B. Side - must not exceed below the bottom of the ear.

- C. Back - not to exceed the bottom of a regular shirt collar (measured from the middle of the shirt in back.)

Girls Grooming

1. Cleanliness at all times will be expected.

2. Girls should wear their hair in a neat, clean and well groomed manner.

3. Hair must not obstruct vision.

Girl's Dress

1. Attire with slogans or emblems is permitted only if it promotes the Wheeler Public Schools

KING'S KOMMENTS

Several changes have been made in the indemnity program for brucellosis reactors recently approved by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The indemnity payment program has been expanded to allow federal authorities to pay on reactors found at auction markets. When the program was first announced, payment was only authorized on reactors found in official herd tests.

However, indemnity payments have been lowered. The indemnity is now \$40 on grade cows (down from \$50) and \$80 on registered cows and bulls (down from \$100).

No indemnity is allowed for grade bulls, steers or sprayed heifers, as previously announced.

It is important that producers have their herds tested in order to rid the nation of the disease. Only about one percent of the nation's cattle is infected with the disease, but that is enough to threaten the entire livestock industry.

Animals found to be reactors will be branded with the letter "B" on the left jaw and will be tagged in the left ear. Must go directly to slaughter.

Pinkeye is a serious problem in some beef cattle herds in Texas during the hot summer weather. The disease can cause considerable weight loss and even the loss of life.

There is no single all for pinkeye, but there are several practices which you can follow help reduce pinkeye problems.

Clipping pastures seedheads develop is one practice that irritate the eyes of the cattle and increase the chances of pinkeye infection.

Flies spread certain kinds of pinkeye. Spraying of the faces cattle with Cloidin insecticide is recommended to control face flies.

Separate animals with pinkeye from the herd to eat infected eyes. Keep infected animals in a sheltered area. Contaminated eyes will pass them from light to matter and will spread coverly. A simple paste made of bulap and the place with rubber cement seems to be effective.

If treatment does not improve conditions, consult a veterinarian. Viral diseases such as IBR may be the cause of pinkeye. Your veterinarian can recommend a vaccination program for controlling such diseases.

Studies have shown that calves with pinkeye weighed considerably less at weaning time and at yearlings when compared to calves the same age without pinkeye. Thus, controlling pinkeye can pay with increased productivity.

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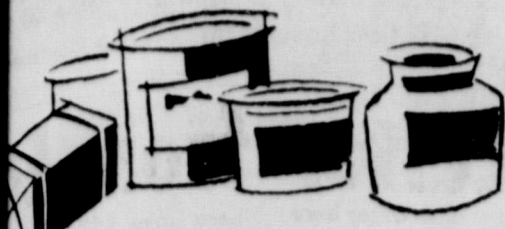

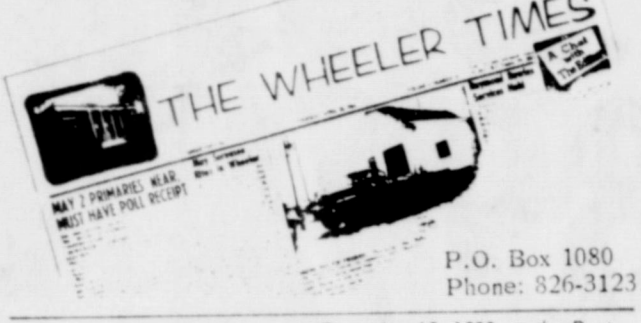
