

#### KING'S KOMMENTS By Don King - CEA

Several changes have been made in the indemnity progran for brucellosis reactors recently approved by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The indemnity payment program has been expanded to allow federal authorities to pay on eactors found at auction markets. When the program was first announced, payment was only authorized on reactors found in official herd tests.

However, indemnity payments have been lowered. The indemnity is now \$40 on grade cows (down from \$50) and \$80 on registered cows and bulls (down from \$100).

No indemnity is allowed for grade bulls, steers or sprayed heifers, as previously announced.

It is important that produc s have their herds tested in order to rid the nation of the disease. Only about one per cent of the nation's cattle is infected with the disease, but that is enough to threaten the entire livestock industry.




