

MUSTANG NEWS LETTER BEAT LEFORS

A steady Mustang offense and a salty defense combined to stop any Miami hopes of a win in Friday night scrimmage. Both the Mustang Varsity and Junior Varsity were able to handle their oppos-

ing teams as the Mustangs played their regular eleven man rules on offense and Miami's eight man rules on defense.

The varsity started things off right with a 65 yard scoring drive in 15 plays. Fullback Dan Helton capped the drive on a 5 yard scor-

ing run up the middle. Seniors Ray Martin, Steve Wallace, and David Patterson anchored a solid line which provided fine blocking for the Mustang backfield. Tailback Kent Ware carried the pigskin 19 times for a total of 122 yards as the Mustang offense rolled. Quarterbacks

Don Chapman and Don Brown engineered the Mustangs with a surprisingly few number of mistakes for the new ball club. It only took the varsity seven plays to score in the next series of plays as Chapman took it in on a seven run. The only other Mustang scoring threat came

after a 25 yard pass to Rob Wills before the Mustangs ran out of their allotted number of plays.

Defensively the Mustangs were hard to penetrate as Miami failed to mount any threatening drives. Many players substituted for the Mustangs and all played their positions well. Middle linebacker Bill McIlhenny played a big role in shutting down the Warrior inside game and Terry Tidwell made two score saving tackles for the Mustangs. Overall the Mustangs did a good job of playing the eight man defense.

The Junior Varsity, led by the running of sophomore tailback Mike Izard and the passing of freshman Bobby Guthrie, also succeeded in moving the ball on Miami. The Junior varsity Defense proved too tough for Miami as the Miami J. V. never came in close scoring range. Linebackers Kevin Frankenberg and Dell Ford drew praise from Mustang Coaches for their hustle and hitting.

This Friday, for their final scrimmage the Mustangs

will play host to Valley High School at 4:00 P.M. We would like to urge all Mustang fans to attend our last scrimmage before the start of the season.

DRIVER IMPROVED

Mobeetie Explosion

A Groendike transport truck with a cargo of gasoline exploded at the storage area of the Leonard Service Station Friday evening about 5:30 critically burning the driver, Virgil Simpson, 62 of Barger, in the blast. Mr. Simpson, who was taken to the Parkview Hospital in Wheeler, was given emergency treatment and transferred to the High Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo. But is improved at news time.

A diesel storage tank also exploded blowing off the top of the tank. The first explosion came soon after Mr. Simpson had started the unloading process.

Two gasoline storage tanks near the diesel tank did not explode due to the pop-off valves with which the tanks were equipped.

Mobeetie Volunteer firemen were aided by men and equipment from Briscoe, Wheeler, Pampa and McLean. A four man crew from Pampa was credited with extinguishing the fire by using a special chemical foam which smothered the blaze.

The fire was brought under control about 8:00 p.m. Cause of the fire is thought to have been a faulty hose leading from the truck tank to the storage. At the height of the fire, smoke was reportedly seen some 20 miles away.

No estimate on the dollar loss has been released at this time.

LIVESTOCK AND POULTRY

EMERGENCY LOANS AVAILABLE

Financial assistance to livestock and poultry producers under the Emergency Livestock Credit act is available through a new loan guarantee authority of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) a rural credit service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Barry D. Altman, FmHA County Supervisor, said the agency is prepared to implement the recently enacted law by guaranteeing up to 80 percent of possible loss on loans made by legally organized lenders to livestock and poultry producers.

Under terms of the act, the loan guarantee program will be in effect through July 25, 1975. It may be extended for 6 months beyond that date if the Secretary of Agriculture determines that it is needed to help the livestock industry obtain sufficient credit.

The law calls for loans to be made by banks or other legally organized lenders. Mr. Altman said interested producers are urged to make applications to, and complete loan arrangements with lending institutions. The lender in turn will ask FmHA for a loan guarantee if one is required. The lender will process the application, close the loan and service it.

The maximum loan to any single borrower that can be assisted by FmHA guarantee is \$250,000. Loans will be repayable from 1 - 3 years, although renewal for 2 years may be authorized. Interest rates are determined between borrower and lender.

Mr. Altman said the agency is authorized to guarantee up to 80 percent loss a lender may incur on loans to bonafide farmers and ranchers who breed, raise, fatten or market beef and dairy cattle, hogs, sheep, goats, chickens and turkeys. A majority of the borrower's income must come from the operation and a majority portion of the borrower's time must be devoted to the livestock

Mrs. Shelton and daughter Tressa were away from home when the fire started, but she said it is suspected lightning may have been the cause as an electrical storm was in process.

The FmHA office serving Wheeler, Hemphill and Roberts Counties is located at 110 West Oklahoma in Wheeler.

Adult Education Courses Offered

Bynum Smith, Superintendent of Schools, announced that a new program for adult Vocational Training will be implemented in the Wheeler Public Schools, if there is enough interest shown. This will be a cooperative effort between Wheeler ISD, Texas Panhandle Community Action Corporation and Texas Technical Institute of Amarillo. The idea is to bring adult vocational training to communities throughout the Panhandle Area where it would not be available otherwise. The program is state funded and will not cost the local educational agency.

This is abbreviated training and does not necessarily lead to direct job placement. It does provide the participant with an opportunity to explore a field of training, improve a skill for current employment or begin acquiring a skill which may lead to future employment. There is no enrollment fee for this program, although a small materials fee may be charged.

The courses will be taught by qualified instructors and each class will be three hours in length.

Type of classes may include typing, bookkeeping, and general office procedure. These classes must have a minimum enrollment of 15 students. Auto Mechanics, welding, basic electronics, and other of this nature must have a minimum of 12 enrolled. The classes are designed to fit the needs of the students.

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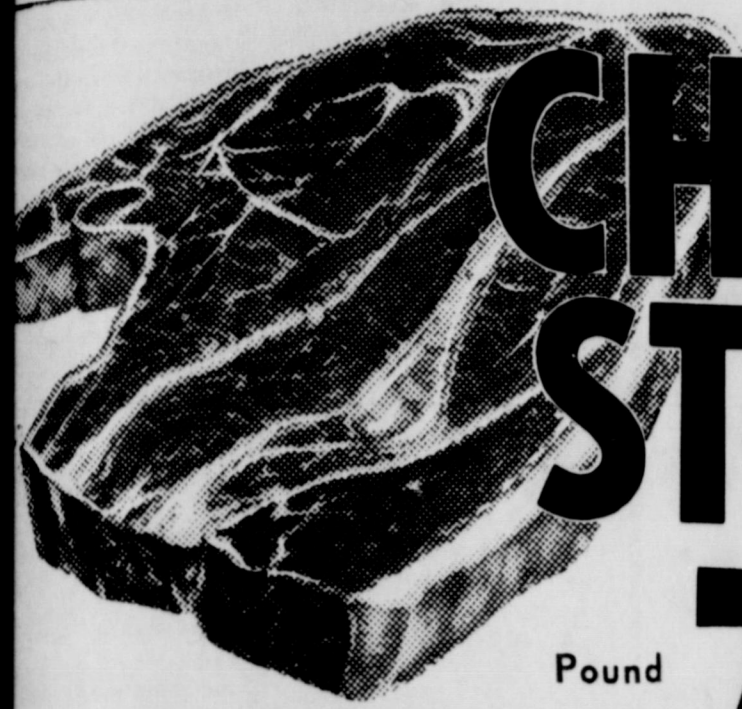

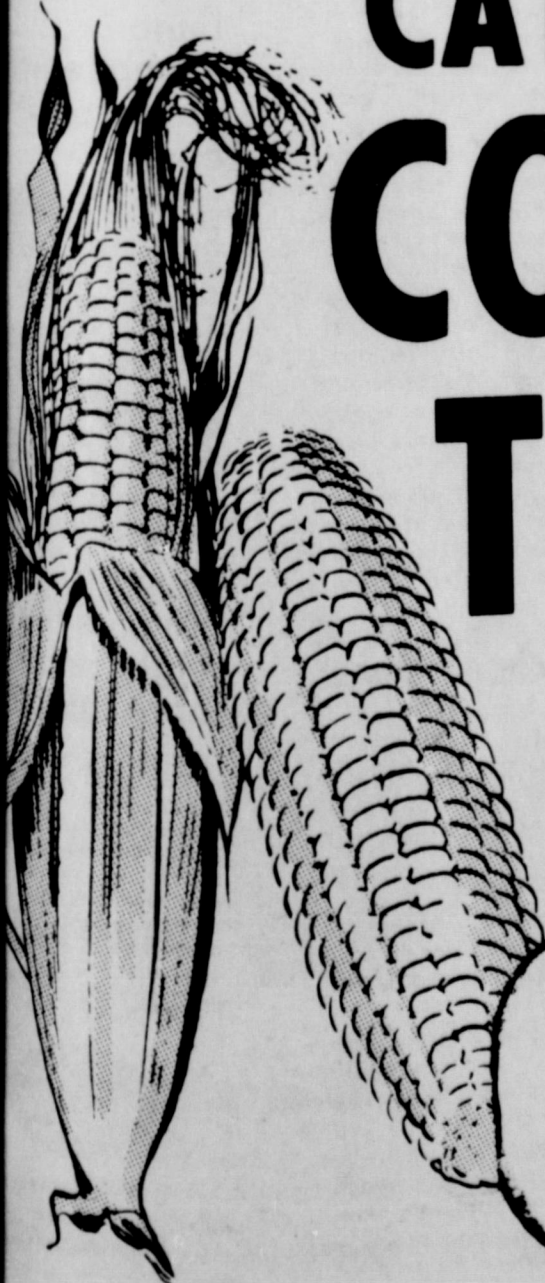
