

In fact, an extra 335 million pounds of beef is produced in Texas every year from grasses releasedby the USDA Soil Conservation Service.

Edward E. Thomas of Temple, state conservationist for SCS, said the figures came from a recent study conducted by his office.

"Our survey revealed that in the last 20 years, 5.9 million acres of land has been planted to new grasses re-leased by SCS," Thomas said. "Statewide, increased beef production is averaging 56 pounds per acre per year from thesegrasses. And the average climbs every






