ONE KILLED, ONE INJURED FREAK ACCIDENT KILLS BOBBY CALCOTE

Funeral services for Bobby J. Calcote, a 43-year old Keltan farmer and rancher who was electrocuted about 10:30 p.m. Friday were held Monday at 2:30 p.m. in the Keltan Baptist Church.

Mr. Calcote and his mother Goldie Calcote got into a pickup on the north side of the Wheeler Rodeo Arena following the first performance of the Wheeler FFA Rodeo. They drove around the arena to check on the loading of a horse. As he parked his pickup, Bobby's wife told him the

tires were on fire. Bobby jumped from the pickup and found the radio aerials in contact with the highline. Calcote noticed his mother starting to get out of the pickup and jumped in to try to keep her from getting shocked; both went out the passenger side of the pickup.

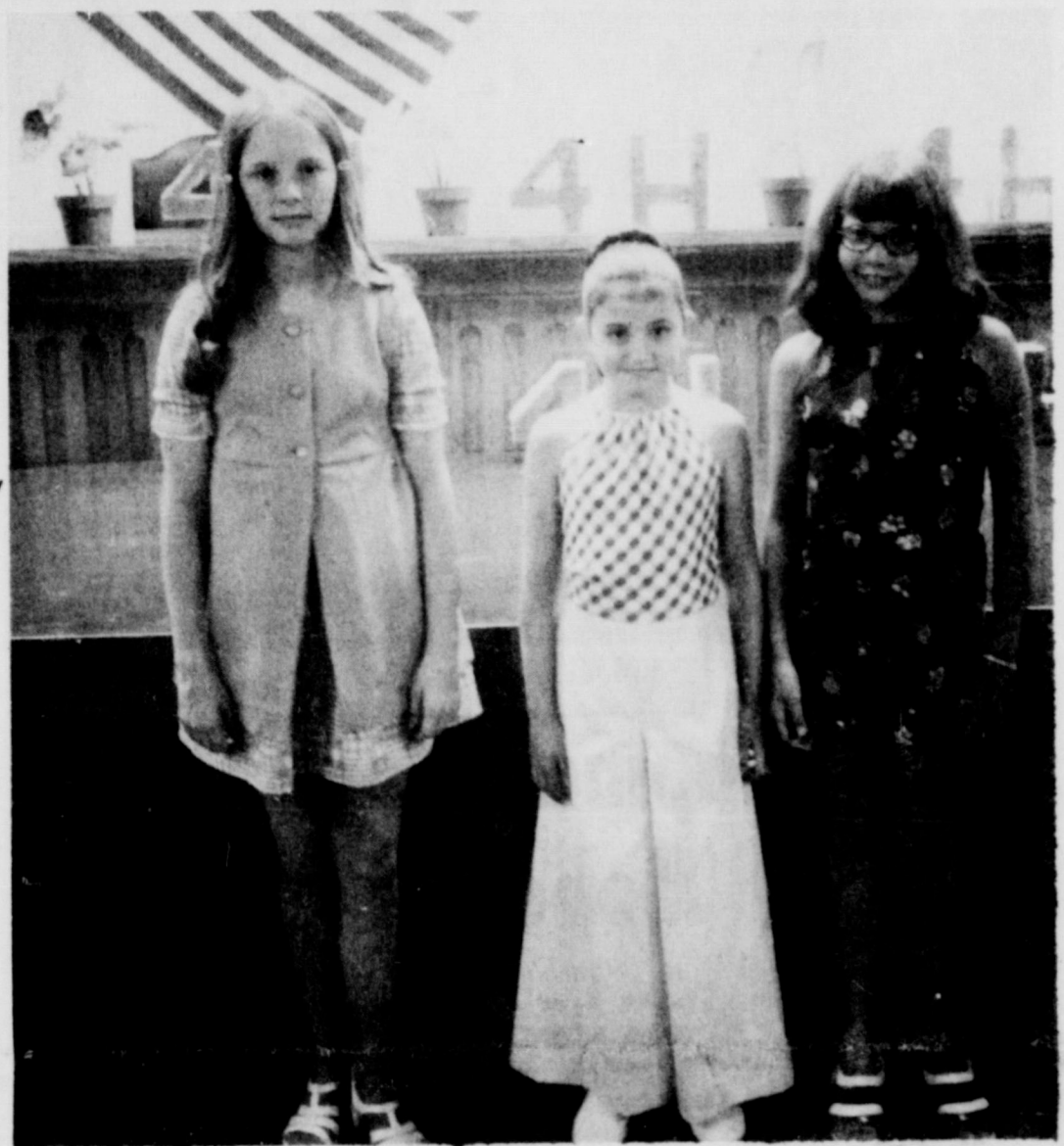
Mr. Calcote was pronounced dead at the scene by Wheeler County Justice of the Peace Charley Whiteley.

Mrs. Goldie Calcote, 68, was taken to Parkview Hospital where she is being treated for burns on the right elbow, right shoulder and both feet. She has a fractured wrist and is listed in serious condition.

Born in Keltan, Mr. Calcote was a member of the Keltan School Board and of the Lions Club. He was a Baptist.

He was married to Dortha Pannell in 1947 at Briscoe.

Survivors include his wife; two daughters, Marla of the home, and Mrs. Bob O'Gorman of Shamrock; a son, Bobby D. of the home; his mother, Mrs. Goldie Calcote; four sisters, Mrs. Doretta Moore of Miami, Mrs. Odessa Whitener of Wheeler, Mrs. Wanda Sailor of Pampa and Mrs. Oleta Levitt of Panhandle; three brothers, J.V. of Amarillo, Odus of McLean, and Thurman of Keltan; and a granddaughter.

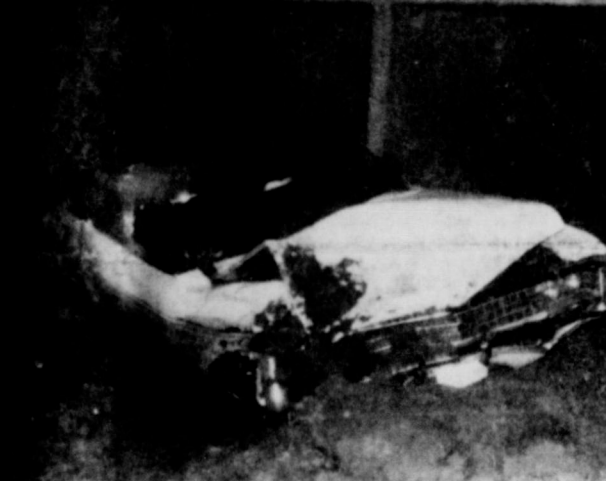

blades of better grass," Thomas said. The goal of SCS plant materials work is to find new strains of plants that will solve specific conservation problems. Since livestock and wildlife co-exist on the same land, the search extends to grasses, legumes, forbs and shrubs which have dual values for both wildlife and livestock. Such plants are needed for use in range seeding mixtures, travel lanes, or wildlife border plantings.

Strains of plants thought to have value for solving a conservation problem are grown and evaluated at the SCS plant materials center near Knox City. After careful selection, promising strains are field tested on farms of soil and water conservation district cooperators under a wide variety of conditions. Selections that prove superior to other plants available commercially are then released to seed growers. These producers then grow seed and sell it to the public.

Some of the groups who cooperate with SCS in this work include Agricultural Research Service, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas A&M University, Texas Tech University, Prairie View A&M University, Christian College, U.S. Air Force, U.S. Corps of Engineers, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, and the state's 193 soil and water conservation districts.

A Letter from Ern

I was not present but at the farm in North Wheeler County in the year of 1916 a few boys were gathered around the two story dwelling just as teenagers are apt to be doing on Sunday afternoon.

A leafy vine had grown up in a period of years and was fully 12 or more feet high. It so happened that one of the boys spied a snake in the vine.

One boy I would guess to be about 15 years old. The name was Morris Junod, said, "Get a ladder, I will get him alive." Morrie was unusually active. He got to where the snake was and with a quick move grabbed the snake close behind the head, descended down the ladder. The snake was about 3 1/2 feet long. One of the boys suggested that Mr. Fridolph furnish the snuff we will pry the snakes mouth open and give the snake a dib of snuff. Well the task was performed, the snake curled up and pretty soon the snake got to swelling. Some of the boys said the skin broke. The snake got as stiff as a broom handle and didn't move. The boys watched about 15 minutes then decided the snake was dead. The snuff had killed it. Yet

humans seem to enjoy the nasty stuff.

A brother-in-law was curious to know what the out come would be. His name was Erickson. Mr. Erickson picked the snake up by the tail and told me it was just as stiff as a broom handle. Out of curiosity he was not busy on a Sunday afternoon, wanted to know if the snuff had actually killed the snake. In fully an hour the snake daizely wiggled away but still fearfully sick.

I was here in Las Cruces six month came here Jan 18 1973. My oldest daughter and son-in-law and I were on a mountain trip. Was up at Silver City N.M., twas hot outside. We went into a super market to drink some soft drink, to my curiosity I spied a grocery cart loaded with 8 or 10 different size Whiskey bottles full of Whiskey. I examined a number. A clerk said to me, how about selling you a quart. I said I was wondering about the price. I told the clerk I was a total abstainer. I also told the clerk that the Government gets the revenue and the Devil get the soul. That is such a curse in this city. Saloon's everywhere.

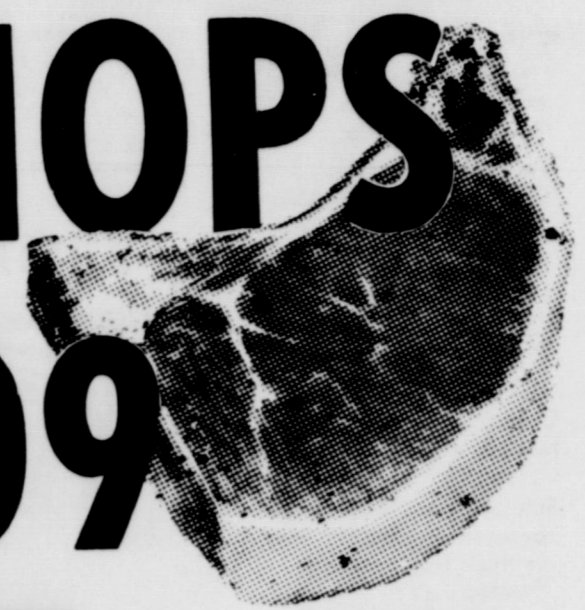

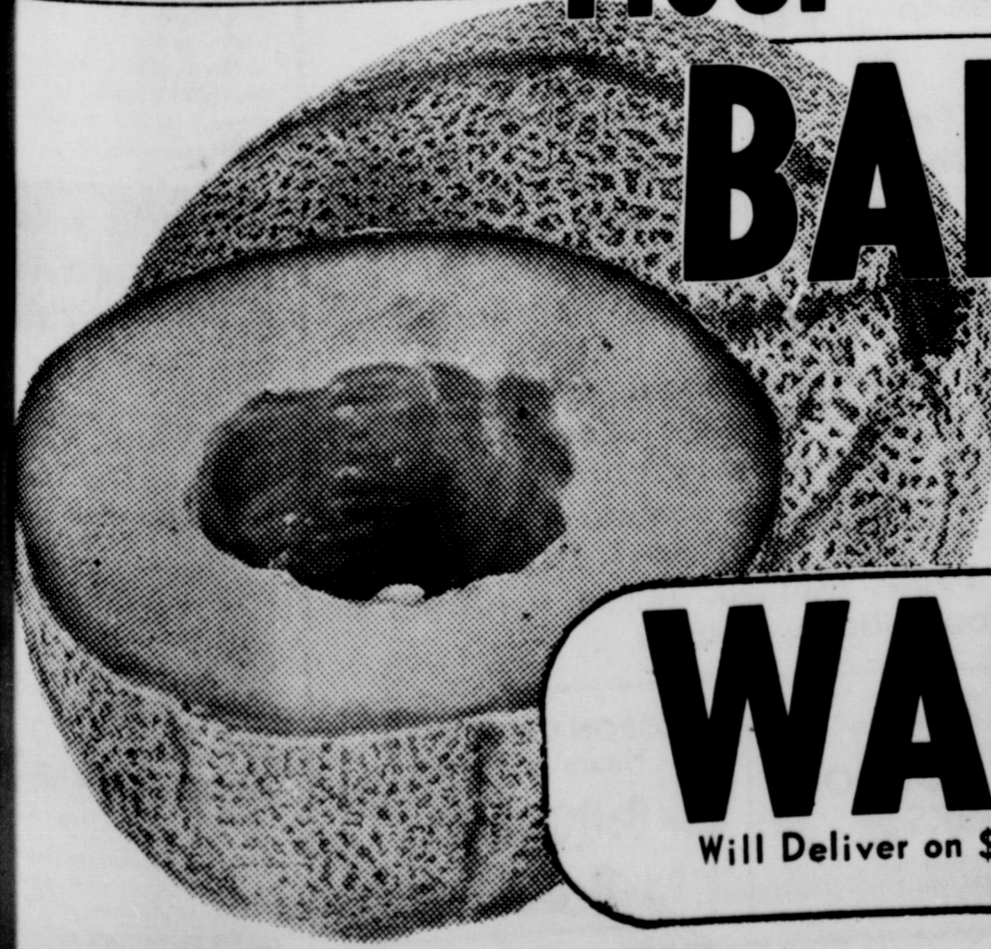

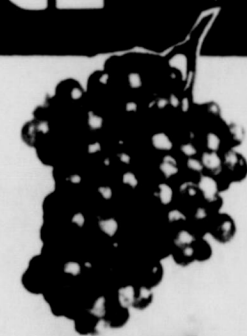
