Close counts in marbles but not in football and Wheeler's Mustangs found this out the hard way last Friday as they came up on the short end of a 7-6 score against the Lefors Pirates in the season opener at Lefors.

Not allowing a first down by the Pirates until the third quarter and holding the host to minus yardage until the fourth quarter, the Mustangs saw their slim six points margin evaporate as the Pirates put together an 80 yard march for the winning touchdown.

HIGHWAY DEPT. PLANS PAVING PROJECT IN CO.

The Texas Highway Commission today approved development of a 1.2 mile Farm to Market road in Wheeler County as a part of the 1973 Texas Farm to Market Road Program.

District Engineer V.J. McGeoff of the Texas Highway Department said estimated cost of the work in the county is \$70,000.

The approved project extends from F.M. Road 1045, 3.0 miles East of Briscoe, North to a proposed R.M. road at the Hemphill County line. This project is an extension of a Farm to Market road approved for Hemphill County and extends from F.M. Road 277 in Hemphill County, south to F.M. Road 1046 in Wheeler County. Work will be under the supervision of O.V. Johnson, Supv. Resident Engineer, Wellington, Tex.

Work authorized for this county is part of the \$59.4 million of paved secondary roads statewide which will be developed in this program.

A total of 261.6 miles will be newly designated roads. The remainder of the \$22.2 million program will develop Farm and Ranch to Market roads and recreational roads which previously have been designated as part of the state-maintained highway network.

The additional mileage brings total mileage of the FM- RM system to almost 41 thousand miles. Much of this mileage represents former county road routes which have been transferred to the state system. FM and RM projects are selected cooperatively by the Texas Highway Department and local county commissioners court.

The Farm to Market Road program originally was conceived to "get the farmer out of the mud." On that score it has been successful by opening new economic, social and education opportunities to the millions of Texans who live in rural areas.

For example, of the newly designated roads, 183.1 miles or 70 per cent are school bus routes and 168.3 miles or 64.3 per cent are rural mail delivery routes.

But FM and RM roads have benefited more than just those Texans who live in the country. Thousands of miles of FM and RM roads provide primary access to the great outdoor recreational resources in the state.

The FM system also provides access to new industrial enterprise located in smaller Texas cities. Many employees at some plants enjoy both a good paying industrial job and the benefits of country living because of easy access afforded by the FM system.

Dwight Keith split the uprights with his soccer style extra point boot with 2:04 left in the game and even though the Mustangs won the battle of statistics, the Pirates had a one point victory and their first win over Wheeler in what some Lefors fans said was 22 years.

Wheeler got the Pirates 5, 19, and 6 yard lines before they finally hit paydirt after recovering a fumble at the Lefors 11.

Lewis Britt put the Mustangs on the scoreboard with a one yard plunge with

2:12 to play in the first half three plays after Kent Ware fell on a Pirate fumble. Jim Verden's kick sailed wide to the left on the extra point try.

Wheeler missed a great opportunity to perhaps salt the game away early when Dale Helton pounced on the first of four Mustang recoveries of Pirate fumbles at the Lefors 13.

Facing fourth and two at the Pirate five, Britt ran into a stonewall at right tackle and was stripped for no gain and bobbled the ball in the process and Lefors recovered.

Two big plays spelled doom for the Mustangs on the Pirates winning drive. Gifford broke off his right tackle on sec. and down from the Lefors 22 and a flag floated to the turf at the 29 and Wheeler drew a 15 yard penalty for a face mask violation to give the Pirates their second first down of the game and a big 22 yard gainer out to the 44.

Seven plays later, with the clock running in the Mustangs favor, the Pirates had a third down at the Wheeler 31. Randy Klein passed complete, which was the Pirates only completion of the night, to Keith on the Wheeler 20. Evading one Mustang there, Keith rambled

CHATS WITH GLORIA

Does your family enjoy
relishes? How about
piccalilli? Why don't you
try making it at home. If
you have a plentiful supply
of vegetables from your gar-
den or when in season pur-
chased at a reasonably low
price, they can be econom-
ical. This is what you
would need to do to make
four pints of piccalilli.

Combine one quart of
chopped tomatoes, one cup
each of sweet red and green
peppers chopped, five cups

of chopped cabbage and one
third cup of salt. Mix and
stand overnight. Drain and
press in a clean, thin, white
cloth to remove all of the
liquid that is possible.

Then combine three cups
vinegar and two cups of firm
packed brown sugar.
Place two tablespoons
whole mixed pickling spice
loosely in a clean cloth and
tie with a string.

Add to the vinegar mixture
and bring to a boil.

Add the vegetables and

bring it to a boil and simmer
about thirty minutes or until
there is just enough liquid
to moisten the vegetables.
Remove the spice bag and
pack the hot relish into
clean, hot pint jars. Fill
the jars to one half inch of
top and close with lids ac-
cording to the manufacturer's
directions.

Process the piccalilli in
boiling water bath for five
minutes. Start to count pro-
cessing time as soon as the
water returns to boiling.

Remove the jars and set
upright on a wire rack to
cool.

Piccalilli will add zest to
your family meals long af-
ter vegetable season. It is
delicious with red beans.

We must say congrat-


