This allows for longer rest periods and thus greater improvement. Pasture sizes are irrelevent but should be fenced so that proper usegrazing height csn be reached in optimum grazing period of no longer than 6 to 8 weeks. 
"No Soliciting, Please"

Do door-to-door salesmen have a legal right to come calling at your home? Generally speaking, they do indeed, according to the United States Supreme Court. "The knocker on the front door," the Court has ruled, "is

an invitation." But invitations can be revoked. And one way you can revoke this particular invitation is by

posting a notice saying "NO SOLICITING, PLEASE" — or - of words to that effect. Any solicitor who disregards such a notice would probably be considered a trespasser. This, in turn, would reduce your chances A more complex estate should

For the duty of a householder wise to consider the services toward a trespasser is slight. You of a qualified es ate planner. are not required to clear away All lawyers can draw a simple hazards on your premises, but merely to refrain from injuring him recklessly or on purpose. What about "NO SOLICIT-

ING" signs on apartment houses? Often posted by landlords, these signs have been attacked in court as an infringement of free speech-that is, the freedom to speak directly to individual According to John Hancocks tenants.

But courts have held that this is a reasonable and lawful way for a landlord to protect his tenants from being pestered.

This does not mean, however, that the landlord has unlimited control over access to the apartments in his building. In one case, an apartment house owner forbade any and all tradesmen to enter his building. When a grocer arrived to deliver fresh vegetables to a tenant, the landlord

threw him out bodily. In short order the grocer filed suit for damages, and the land-lord was held liable on grounds of assault and battery. The court said the tenant had the right of access to his own apartment, and, by ordering merchandise to be delivered, he had extended that




