



To ensure proper fit, measure the width of the mattress then add 13 - 14 inches per side to this measurement. Blanket length, on the other hand, depends on needed tuck-

Read and follow all care instructions provided with the blanket. Following cleaning instructions to avoid damaging the blanket. To wash electric blankets fill washer with warm sudsy water and gently feed blanket into agitating water (you can't do this if you have a front loading washer). Run the blanket through the gentle washing cycle adding fabric softner for a fluffy static free blanket Electric blanket, as a rule, should not be machine

dryed. Many Wheeler county residents made their own pickles but for those of you who weren't able to do so here's some information on buying store pickles.

According to the U.S. Depart of Agriculture's Agricultural Marketing Service, the kinds of pickles youcan buy are almost as infinite as the different kinds of cooking there are. Just stand in front of the pickle counter in your local store and you can reach that conclusion for yourself. How do you decide which style pickle to buy? Well, it will help to know that all cucumber pickles are related to one or another of an easily--remembered handful of varieties.

First is the dill pickle. flavored primarily with the aromatic herb dill, and sometimes supplemented with various mixed spices. The dill pickle comes in three variations: Genuine dills, prepared by a long process of natural fermentation; processed dills, which start out in a brine of salt and water and are finished later in a dill solution; and the quickly fermented, cucumber-dill overnight" pickle. Some dill pickles are

'kosher" or "kosherstyle". The term has religious signinficance in accord with Hebrew law, but in the United States has come to mean that the pickles are more highly spiced with onion and garlic.

After the dill pickle comes the sour pickle. As with 12 Volt \$12.95 the dill, the cucumber is first fermented in a salt brine. Sour pickles are

finished in a solution of vinegar and spices. Some relishes and piccallilli are made from sour pickles.

The third basic kind of cucumber pickle is the sweet pickle. These start as sour pickles from which the vinegar has been drained. They are then put into spicy liquours and aged, until the desired degree of sweetness is attained.

As with many of the other toods you buy, the U.S. Department of Agriculture has U.S. grade standards for pickles. These grades help manufactureres to properly make and accurately label the products they offer for sale.

When buying pickles, check the labels. This should help you decide weather or not the flavorings are the types that suit you. Pickle prices vary from item to item and brand to brand. This is because some types are much more costly spices and other ingredients are reasons for

high priced items. As with all purchases, the decision of whether to buy the higher priced product or may not always depend solely on your purse, but

also on your taste buds. When you buy meat and poultry products produced under federal inspection, you can be assured of the safety of the packaging materials. They must be


