

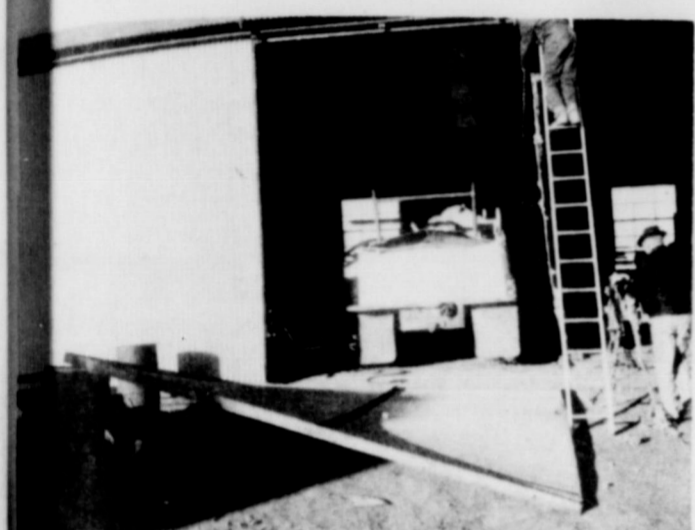

## WELDING EXPLOSION INJURES TWO BLAST FELT IN CITY BY RESIDENTS



**WELDING EXPLOSION:** Tuesday afternoon around 5:00 p.m. Wheeler residents heard what they assumed to be a sonic boom. In reality it was an explosion at the A & K Welding Shop, 1 mile east of Wheeler. Injured in the blast was Boyd Austin and Lannie Kenny (owners). The blast ripped the front door off the building and blew Boyd Austin against it in the process.

Mr. Austin was welding on the water truck shown in the above photo with Mr. Kenny watching. Cause of the explosion was unknown Wednesday morning. Mr. Austin at present time was in Parkview Hospital and Mr. Kenny was flown to Amarillo for treatment for an eye injury.

### Rock Fillets

- 1 lb. Hamburger
  - 1 med. onion (chopped fine)
  - 2 T. worcestershire sauce
  - 1/2 T. garlic salt
  - 1/2 T. monosodiumglutamate
  - (Accent)
  - 4 slices bacon (raw)
  - salt and pepper
- Mix hamburger, onion, worcestershire sauce, garlic salt, monosodiumglutamate, salt and pepper together. Make four individual patties. Take bacon slices and wrap around the edges of pattie, fastening with toothpicks. Broil in oven for about seven minutes. Be sure to turn the meat without pricking it. Serve 3 or 4.

## BENAVIDEZ CHARGED IN DESTRUCTION OF PROPERTY

Juan and Lillie Benavides were charged with destruction of private property Jan. 31, 1968. They are accused with the death of an animal belonging to Darrell Moore. The couple was arrested at their home 3 miles South of Wheeler Wednesday morning, Jan. 31 by Wheeler County Sheriff Bus Dorman. The sheriffs entered the case at the request of Mr. Moore.

Mr. Moore was attending his cattle in a pasture near the Benavides home Wednesday

when he made the discovery of the dead cow. According to Sheriff Dorman, a car was used to run the cow brute down. The car ran partially over the animal and could not be backed off. A truck was taken to the scene to remove the car from the animal and the pasture. The tracks and evidence under the car led to the arrest of the couple.

Juan Benavides is being held in Wheeler County Jail while Lillie Benavides is out on bond.

Parents, citizens, and civic leaders are urged to attend the Technical-Vocational Area Conference to be held in Wheeler High School Auditorium at 10 a.m., Monday, Feb. 12.

At 10 A.M., Mr. Milton Morris, Executive Vice-president, of Opportunity Plan, Inc., West Texas State University will address the Wheeler parents, citizens, students, and visiting school administrators. He will speak on Financial Aid to students pursuing higher education after high school. This concerns students planning to attend colleges, universities, technical, or vocational schools anywhere in Texas or the Southwestern United States. He will explain in detail the various possibilities of financial assistance. This information is vital to all of us, as we have over 90% of our students attending institutions of higher learning and a large percentage seeking financial help and

work opportunities. At 11 a.m., Mr. Dwaine Mires, Personnel Director, Shamrock Oil and Gas, Amarillo, will address all visiting students and Wheeler students on "Job Opportunities Today and Tomorrow." Please feel free to stay.

## Newspaper Chow

A mixture of ground-up newspapers and molasses was fed to a test group of heifers for 56 days in an experiment by dairy scientists at Pennsylvania State University. And believe it or not, it made good cattle feed.

These cows digested the mixture at the rate of one and a half pounds of newspaper daily--just as well as the controlled group of heifers digested a standard commercial quality feed supplement. Both groups of heifers gained along with the supplement. It is predicted by Dr. Carl M. Kesler, professor of dairy science, that a newspaper-molasses mixture could alleviate the expected world food deficit by making available a cheap, nutritious cattle feed that would not compete with man's own food supply. Molasses is cheap and molasses better when mixed with newsprint.

Furthermore newsprint provides the kind of fiber the animals need. What affects the mixture had on the milk was not mentioned but evidently there was no appreciable difference in the quality.

## CHILDREN LEARN TO SAY NO

**No Is The Word:** So your child has learned to say "No." This can be very puzzling and upsetting to parents when their child begins to "rebel." It is much easier on the parent when they realize that is just a normal stage that all children pass through usually around two to three years of age. The reason for the "No Stage" is for several reasons. First of all the child has heard the word "no" quite often and is easier to say than "yes". Sometimes a child will say "no" to the question, "Do you want some more ice cream?" and yet at the same time be holding out his plate for more.

Another reason is that the child is beginning to realize that he is a separate person. This is the first stage of seeking independence from the parent.

A bewildered parent will many times react to the "no" as if it were rebellion on the child's part. The incident will lead from the first no to stubbornness, quarrelling and the eventual spanking from the parent to show that he still has control over the child.

This situation can be avoided if the parent will remember that it is normal and the child is not "rebellious." Try to avoid questions that really invite a "no" response. Such as asking Johnnie if he wants to wear his rain boots, when no matter what the answer he will have to wear them. Maybe it's time for the child to

come in from play. If you ask him if he wants to, he'll say no. About five minutes before time to come in, say "Johnnie you'll have to come in in a few minutes." When time is up say, "Come in Johnnie." Don't give a child a choice unless you mean for him to have it. It confuses a child when you ask him what he wants, and then tell him he can't have it.

Always make your directions to him in the positive. Say "It is time to go to bed, not "You can't stay up any longer, go to bed." It is only human nature to say "no" when you're told you can't do something.

Give your child some choices that aren't important such as what clothes to wear or what part of the yard to play in. This will give him a chance to feel independent.

This time (stage), too, shall pass, so be patient parents.

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## ACROSS THE FENCE

one of the wettest Januaries in a record sure helped looks of our wheat, in rounds, farmers were feeling fine.

He had heard a lot about of our long staple cotton varieties bring top money. He decided to check on the 18.

H. Riley, Rt. 1, Shampant, planted about 25 acres of the Del Cerro variety on 23. He gathered 18 bales on that 25 acres this year. He reports that he received a pound for four of the bales and averaged 26¢ for the remaining 13 bales. Riley stated that he had difficulty in gathering the Del Cerro. It was bad, he said, about falling out of bales. Cloys Troxell and Close were others who gathered Del Cerro. "I probably will plant about that of the Del Cerro next year," Mr. Riley said. He said that he was undecided in committing any more acreage to it because the yield of the cotton being harvested was an undesirable characteristic. Others had talked to including a demonstrator assistant, Duane L. Scott shared his attitude. However, at 31¢ a pound, this was 11¢ more than the average price received for his cotton in Wheeler County.

He predicts that many of the cotton producers will have a long hard look at the staple cotton varieties this year. Our Northwest Texas demonstration Handbook is out in March. It will show how long staple varieties stood up price wise yield wise on our on-the-demonstration plots. We are going to come with some long staple varieties that not only yield well, but stay in the ball until harvest.

We understand that better yields would be received if a number of farmers grew the same varieties and block-tested their cotton.

Several of the varieties in our test plots have a tolerance to Verticillium and Fusarium Wilt and to Nematodes. Growers who have these diseases or pests will be closely looking at these.

The 4-H and FFA Pig Show will be held in Wheeler, Saturday, March 2, 1968. Ribbons, trophies and prize money will be given. The show is sponsored by the Agricultural Committee of the Wheeler and Shamrock Chamber of Commerce and the Livestock and Crops Subcommittee of the Wheeler Co. Program Building Committee. Any 4-H or FFA member planning to enter the Pampa Livestock Show are reminded that the entry deadline is Feb. 12.

Had a chance to visit Roy Stribling and Steve Corse's pigs at Mobeetie a few days ago. These boys will have pigs right in the top of their weight classes.

I appreciated the opportunity of seeing Walter Coward's hog operation while at Mobeetie. Mr. Coward has one of the best organized hog operations in this part of country. At the time of our visit, he had about 15 sows with from 8-15 pigs at their sides.

Brucellosis: In a telephone conversation last week with Dr. W.O. Lindsey, Area Veterinarian for the Texas Animal Health Commission, he stated that we would not have to be retested. Wheeler County, he said, will receive recertification as a Modified Brucellosis free county for another 3 years. This means that we have a low enough incidence of reactors percentage wise to be recertified. Testing going on at the present, is to clean up present reactors, he added.

Scale Insect Control With Dormant Oils: Now is the time to start thinking about applying dormant oils to trees for protection against mite and scale insects. A dormant oil may be used any time when trees are in the dormant stage. However, better insect control may be obtained by using a dormant oil late in winter or early spring just before the buds start to crack. If a spring application is used, it should be applied after the possibility of heavy freeze damage occurs. An advantage of applying the dormant oil in late winter or early spring is the fact that the insects are in a weakened condition and are easier to kill. A disadvantage would be the fact that you have only a short time to apply the dormant oil and the greater possibility of plant damage. Dormant oils should be applied when the temperature is between 40 and 65 degrees F. Freezing weather should be avoided within 48 hours after applying dormant oils.

### JEALOUSY IN OLDER CHILDREN

"I don't like that baby," "Take it back to the 'ospit'!" "It makes too much noise!"

Jealousy comes in many forms. A child may outright express a dislike of a brother or sister. He may hug a child so tight that he makes the child cry. He may revert to babyish ways of bed wetting, baby talk, sucking a bottle and helplessness. He may be overly concerned about the brother or sister and talk about him constantly. Or his reaction may have nothing to do with the brother or sister, such as loss of appetite, frequent accidents, more aggressive behavior or more destructiveness.

Whatever the form of jealousy a child takes, the parents should not become too alarmed. Jealousy is a natural emotion and if handled correctly will be of no further worry. The causes of the behavior might be the arrival of a new baby, unfair treatment or favoritism or unfavorable comparison of a child to other children.

If a mother will learn to accept the fact that a child will be jealous of a newborn baby no matter what she does, she will find her attitude better for handling the situation.

If a new baby is expected and there are to be some changes made, like the child being moved from the crib to a half bed, do so before the child is born. This way the child will not feel he is being pushed out for the new baby. Be sure to tell the child that the new baby is coming. Let him help in some way prepare for the new baby. Be sure when you leave for the hospital that the child knows the person he will be staying with. Be sure that when you come home, you are immediately ready to give him the love and attention that a child needs from a mother that has been gone several days.

When a new baby is first home from the hospital, he doesn't need as much attention as he will later. This is a good time to give extra attention to the older child. Never be too busy to listen to the older child even while you take care of the baby. Let the older child help with the baby by getting equipment for you. Even though you may fear it, let the child hold the baby in his lap while you sit close by. This is the best way to build a protective feeling in the older child.

If your child reacts in a jealous manner, don't punish him. You'll have to restrict him and not let him harm the baby, but don't punish or call him "bad boy." Correct

Willie Vance Boydston has been selected postmaster from the list who took the examination recently. Boydston was sworn in Friday and will receive his appointment in the near future.



Mrs. Grady Harris then presented the certificate of approval for a medallion honoring the late Millie Porter to her daughters, Mrs. Cora Hyatt and Mrs. Virgil Caperton of Shamrock. This is Mrs. Harris's message to all present:

Madam Chairman, members visitors and friends:

I wish to say, with a deep and grateful feeling, thank you for giving me the privilege and honor to make this dedication of historical interest of one of the honored women of the State of Texas.

The '54 Study Club of Wheeler wished to pay homage to the well known pen woman Wheeler and the Panhandle of Texas, Millie Jones Porter erecting a marker on her home built in 1914 and owned and occupied by her daughter, Cora Porter. The club members are quick to rally to the challenge and immediately upon the money needed to place this state marker placed in the restored and well home of the Porters.

Mrs. Porter was busy being a wife, mother and a man's helper for several years after marriage and being the mother of six children did not take time to write historical talent of use and trying to preserve the heritage of Wheeler County. Not that she did not think, just that she did not record some thou-

mission. Oh, may we account ourselves trustworthy; for we know not who has chosen us for his ideal."

Mrs. Porter was a never ending church and civic worker for her community. Millie Jones had a burning desire to learn to read, write figure and spell. Then she wished to teach others who had the same desire so she became a very young teacher in Wheeler County.

Although it was a long, long lonely trip to Fort Worth and it hurt to leave her home she never faltered but was eager to go and stay until the certificate was earned... No trips home, ever.

It was after serving on several committees in 1936 for the Texas Centennial that Millie Porter discovered that facts of history of this area was fast slipping past as the ones who first came and knew were already forgetting or had passed on when she began contacting them to get historic events for the records at the Centennial. She began to search further and write down all the things she could remember and gather from others and court records to substantiate facts.

This poem, that she composed expresses beautifully her feeling as she approached the "Old Timer" for facts.

"Memory's cup begins to fill, We know not how or when But day by day and drop by drop, To middle age and then For most of us, its contents dear Evaporate, we find, And in the bottom of each cup But dregs are left behind.

"How dear its dregs, as sand panned gold Remains because of weight These fragile cups still hold the best Be that life small or great. Sure, not worthless and foul they lay,

As Webster's book defined, But glistening as jewels rare, Stored treasure of the mind."

All who have not, should read "Memory Cups" and "Put Up Or Shut Up."

Cora and Mrs. Caperton, it gives me joy and a good feeling to present to you this recorded wording for, The Texas Historical Medallion Plate to be placed on your home this year, to depict Millie Porter, your mother, as one of the most outstanding products of a pioneer family left to preserve the history and make this area one of the outstanding historical points in the history of the Panhandle of Texas.
