The Wheeler Mustangs will have a threefold purpose on Nicholson Field Friday night when they take on the also winless Silverton Owls.

It will be homecoming for the Mustangs and a win for the 0-3 Mustangs would not only be satisfying for the homecoming crowd but would break the Mustangs three game losing streak and put them in great shape for the district 2-A race which gets under way this weekend for all contenders except Claude and Valley who got the chase underway last week.

With the start of district games, kickoff time has been moved up to 7:30 and the big homecoming festivities will be capped by the battle between the Mustangs and the Owls.

Prior to the kickoff, the homecoming and football

queen will be crowned at ceremonies that are slated to get underway at 7:10.

Silverton is in the same shoes as the Mustangs as far as their record goes and will be trying mightily to also get their first win of the year.

The Owls are a young ball club and will start only three seniors on offense and the same number on defense.

Perhaps the biggest task facing the Mustangs against the Owls will be trying to fathom the multiple formations the Owls use both offensively and on defense.

Changes in the Mustangs lineup might be forthcoming for the Silverton game as the coaching staff is still looking for the right combination to get the Mustangs back on the winning road.

"We have just got to get more consistency in our offense," Coach Bateman said this week. He went on to add, "Our defense has kept us in all of our games but when we get a drive going something happens to kill it and we are going to keep looking for the people that won't make these mistakes."

Coach Bateman lauded the play of Dale Helton and Lonnie Whitener in the Shamrock game from a defensive standpoint.

"We need a win real bad but the bad thing is that Silverton is in the same boat and we know we will have to fight real hard," Bateman said.

The Mustangs came out of the Shamrock tilt in good physical shape and all should be ready for the important game with the visitors from the south plains.

MUSTANGS WHITEWASHED BY SHAMROCK IRISH 14-0

The Shamrock Irish dealt the Wheeler Mustangs their third consecutive defeat last Friday night 14-0 and it was the Mustangs second straight shutout.

Shamrock scored their

final touchdown to wrap up the victory with 1:12 to play in the final period when Sammy Jackson found a big hole at the Mustangs left end and romped over from 9 yards out on fourth down.

Inability to keep a drive going hampered the Wheeler offense all night even though several promising drives were started only to see fumbles, missed blocks, and penalties stymie the attack.

Even in the gloom of defeat, there were bright spots for the Mustangs, especially on defense which kept the Mustangs in the game and gave them a chance for the tying or go ahead points midway of the fourth quarter.

Forced back to their nine yard line by a punt on the second play of the final twelve minutes, the Mustangs were forced to kick but the Irish were guilty of roughing the kicker and Wheeler had a first down at the 25.

Again the Irish held and forced the punt and Verden sailed one 43 yards to Jackson on the Shamrock 34. Jackson bobbed the ball there and Lewis Britt smothered it for Wheeler at the Shamrock 32.

Britt got five at right tackle and then four more in a couple of whacks at left tackle. The Irish read the Mustangs mail on fourth down and dropped Kent Ware for no gain at left guard and thwarted the last serious threat the Mustangs made.

Shamrock moved to their 41 after the opening kickoff but had to kick and Ronald Gragg sailed one 20 yards to the Wheeler 39.

On third down, Don Chapman fumbled and Arville McNutt recovered for the Irish and six plays later the Irish had six points on the scoreboard.

Gragg got the big gainer in the 44 yard drive with a 25 yard keeper around his left end to the Wheeler 15.

A Letter from Ern

In the month of May 1925, Dr. Joss and Norwood McPherson came to the field where I was planting milo. They told me that a new court house was planned for Wheeler. I naturally wanted to know the cost price. They told me, any way I said we can get along with what we got. That Wheeler County was already busted on account of the bridge north of Shamrock, but I signed

for that fine structure that stands at the present location. An I was caught on a murder trial the first court session in the new building. Took two days to get 12 jurors I was one of the first and had the privilege of sleeping in the new court house Shelby Pettit was the youngest of us 12, he was 23 years old. Now he and I are somewhat older. P.L.

Meadows was jury foreman. Most of us fellows ate at Jaco's cafe. Pancakes 5c each two was enough for me for breakfast. Of course though they were big eaters, needed beef steak, ham and eggs and such as that cost not over \$50.

Now don't think people had money then, they were nearer broke then them now. A real wet Oct. in 1925 with the cotton green in the boll, a severe freeze came on Oct. 18 and the cottons was yellow I had 6 bales that year, sold 3 bales for 14c per lb., took 3 bales home, sold it for 10c per lb. in Sept. 1926, and by January 1927 I could not have sold those 3 bales for 3c per lb.

Now don't think us fellows had easy sailing 50 or 60 years ago, we didn't.

The County Agents try to make us believe that the country was cleaner of disease, long time ago than now is. Black leg with cattle existed when I was a child, Colic with horses, Roup with chickens and people at ways have had all kinds of ailments.

When I first got to Las Cruces I was a pretty sick duck, the water here was fearfully bad I said to myself, if I only had some of that finewater that was wasted at my Wheeler Co. farm I would be soon well.

Oh yes, in the 1926 cotton crop year, real pretty white cotton didn't pay the picking. Great amounts of the pretty white fleece was wasted.

Cattle in Kansas City, good average killers, young cows, or coming 2 years old sold \$3.25 per hundred. The seller had to figure 100 lb. shrinkage per head from the time they left the ranch to the Rail Road Commission and if his cattle netted \$18 or \$20 per head pretty

good. That was much better than in the 30 years they were nearly worthless.

I one of my sisters got married to a fellow that had a dairy near Denver Colo. in 1907 and one of my single sisters went to visit her the following year. This fellow had some horses to deliver milk round the city.

One day my two sisters drove the team to the City tied them to the hitching rail like people did in 1907.

Were gone about an hour, when they wanted to go home, the team surly or carriage as some people called it, horses and all were gone. Like anyone else, they asked those near by if they saw anyone take the team, an elderly lady told men an old man acted crippled, but a little man with a long white beard was

seen untying them and driving away.

That happened 65 yrs ago no trace of the outfit seen or heard of since.

I hate a thief but if I have a fear melons and peaches, plums, grapes and such will go to waste I am not tempted but apt to steal, but not brave enough to risk in big supermarkets.

Am real glad Wheeler County has prospects for a better all around crop than it looked like in July when I was three.

The weather here is ideal and I tell you the truth I never saw so few flies in my 4 score years as this summer. If you see two or three a day is about sometimes a week not a single one.

Learn to keep trouble to yourself, on one wants to take them from you.

Gossip is like a snowball, the more you roll it over the bigger it gets.

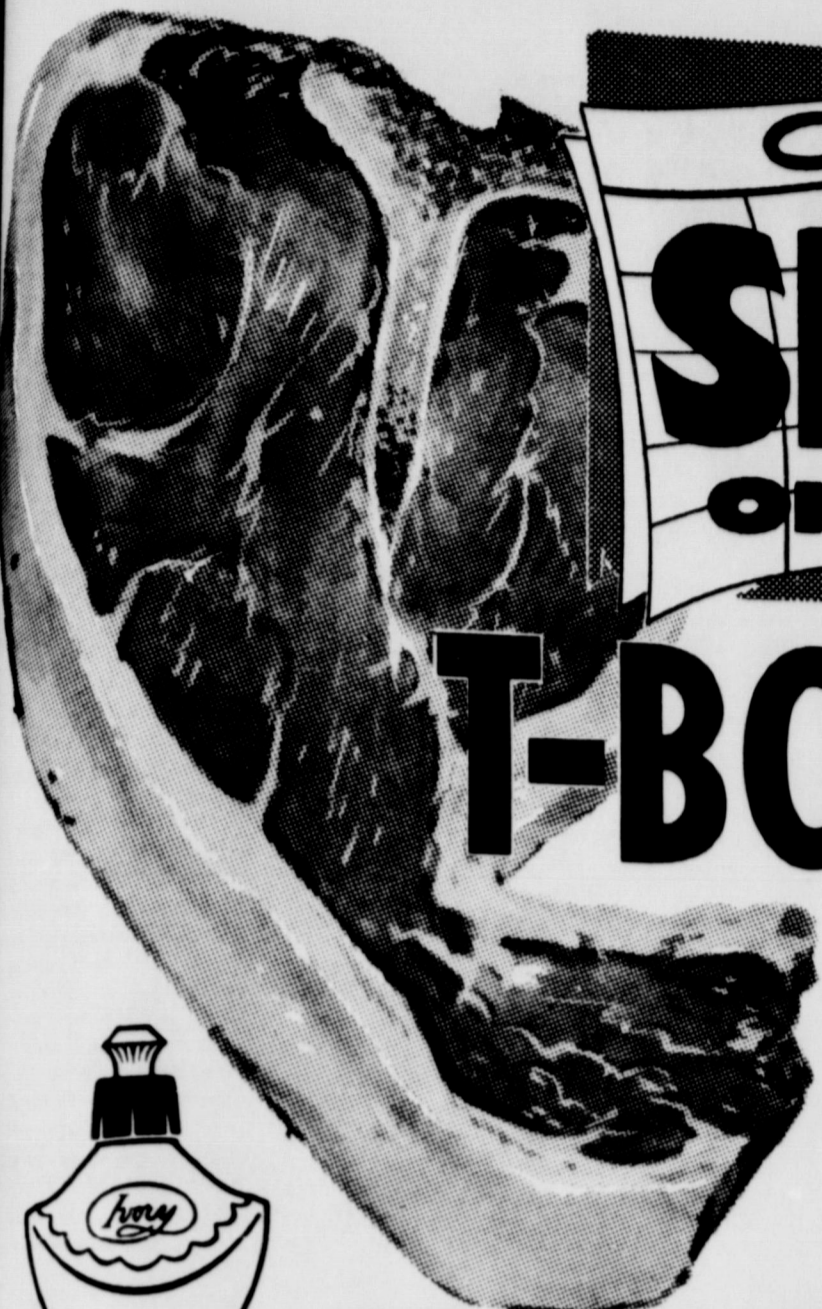

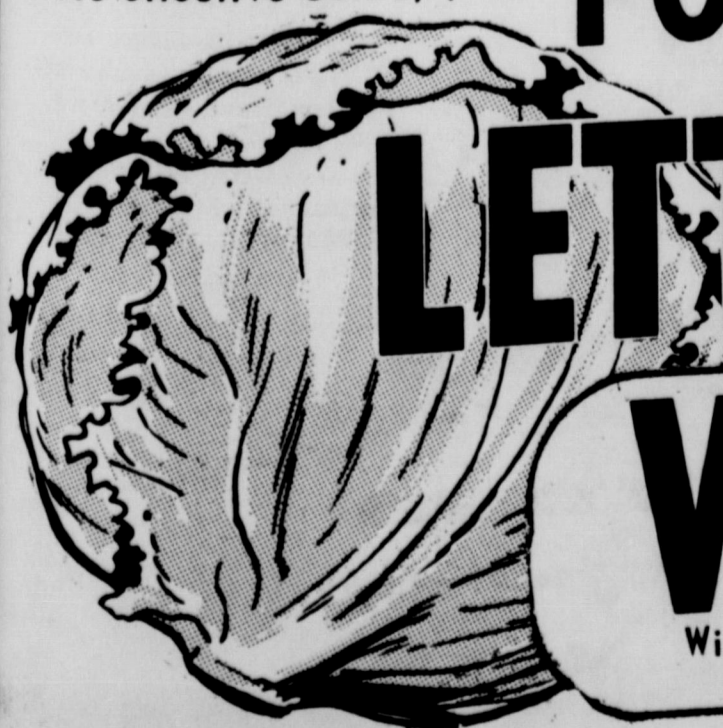

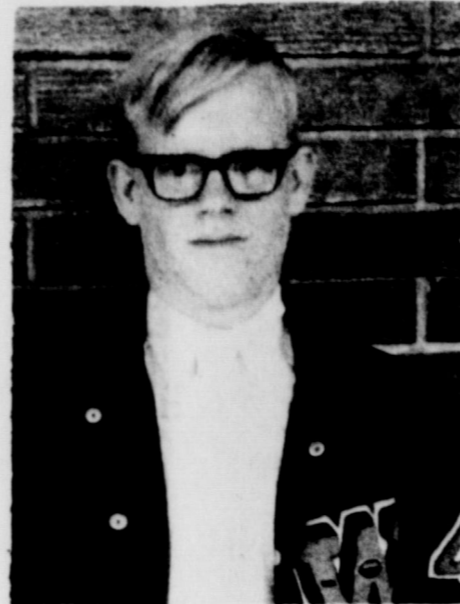
