GENERAL TELEPHONE '1' Plus Dialing On Private Lines

J. H. Davis, district manager for General Telephone Company, has announced that General Telephone has a major central office equipment project underway at this time in the Wheeler Office. Additional toll line terminations are being added as well as 100 additional local telephone numbers and associated trunking equipment.

Davis indicated that temporary problems and service outages might be expected during projects of this magnitude. Every reasonable precaution is being taken, however, should a service interruption occur, immediate action will be taken to correct the problem.

Installation is underway and testing will be starting soon on the new "1" plus "Automatic Number Identification" (ANI) direct distance dialing equipment for Wheeler customers of General Telephone Company.

According to J. H. Davis, district manager, on Wednesday, September 18, 1974 equipment will be available for the dialing of station-to-station long distance calls on an ANI basis for customers with individual line service.

With the advent of this ANI direct distance dialing, operator assistance and special calls (such as person-to-person, credit card and collect calls) will still be handled by Pampa operators. Customers with party line service will continue to have Operator Number Identification (INI). In other words, they will continue to give the operator their number after dialing station-to-station calls.

Complete instructions will be mailed just prior to September 18, 1974.

City Council Backhoe Purchase, City Tax Increase, Ordinances Tabled

A special meeting of the City Council of Wheeler was held Tuesday, Sept. 3, for the purpose of opening bids for the backhoe, discussing open bottle ordinance, reviewing ordinance and setting a price for permits to street peddlers.

The council received three bids for a backhoe. All three were opened and reviewed. The lowest bid was accepted; it was submitted by Miami Implement Co., dealer of Case equipment.

It was decided by the council to have an "Open Bottle Ordinance" drawn up to curtail public consumption of alcoholic beverages and discourage littering. The ordinances were discussed and tabled for a later meeting.

A price of \$2.50 per day for a street peddler on foot will be charged for persons not of Wheeler County or the south half of Hemphill County. A permit for a person selling from a truck will be \$5.00 per day. The permits may be obtained from the city office.

TAX RATE

A portion of the story on the city council meeting was omitted last week. The lead to the story told of the discussion of the Tax Rate; however the paragraph concerning the increase was deleted by error.

After studying the budget for the year and the funds available, the council voted to increase the tax rate 25%. This motion passed with one councilman opposed. The increase puts the rate at \$1.25 per \$100 valuation.

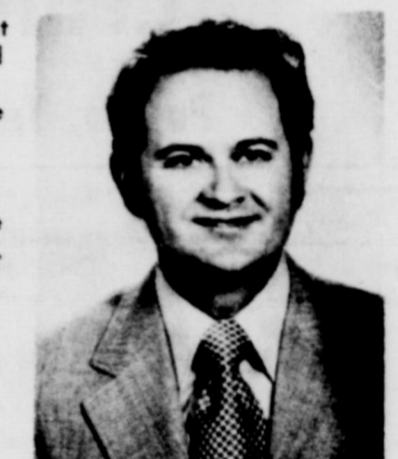
Rev. Moore and his wife Bobbie have witnessed with the spoken work and music to thousands of people around the world. It is their conviction that Christianity is just as relevant today as it was two thousand years ago.

Gene is an ordained minister having been appointed as evangelist in 1962. Previous to becoming an evangelist he was a pastor in a local church. He feels that evangelism is his call to the Christian church and thinks that his God given talents are in this area.

Bobbie is an accomplished musician. She has many years of formal training. It was music that brought Bobbie and Gene together. They met at an Oklahoma College where they both received their degrees. They were married in 1953. Their duets have thrilled thousands since then. They have sung for gospel meetings, camp meetings at retreats and for civic clubs.

Five thousand people heard Gene sing at a jungle camp meeting in India. In 1968 the Moores sang in Indonesia. At one time they sang in a crowded railway car jammed with Indonesians. Wherever they go, they find that music is the universal language. The Moores directed the music at the Southern Illinois Annual Conference in 1971. Gene's latest missionary trip was to India in 1971.

A large part of their giving goes for India Missions. Currently, they are building a church building in India in memory of their son Timothy.

They have been in charge of music for United Christians Ashrams. The south Central Jurisdictional Conference on Evangelism, and the National Committees of the Twelve. They led music for the Southern Illinois Annual Conference in 1972. They have four record albums, the latest of which was arranged by Kurt Kaiser and accompanied by a London Orchestra. Gene is a songwriter and has had several songs published by Work. Among his familiar songs are "Fill Your Life With Love," "Jesus Set My Heart to Singing," and "Do Unto Others." Gene's latest song was written several days after the death of their 9 year old son Timothy.

The Moores feel that they don't have to be old fashioned to be Christians. The songs of Bobbie and Gene are loved and appreciated by people of all ages. Teenagers find a message they are seeking in their music; older people's faith is strengthened as they listen to the familiar gospel songs.

The Moores have two children. Susan who is a teenager and Jonathan born December 19, 1972. Susan is a good singer and has begun singing specials with her parents. Jonathan as yet has only developed his lungs.

Perhaps the Moores sum up their own witness when they say, "Through our ministry we are trying to tell the message of what God has done for us and of what He can do for you."

DID YOU BRAG ABOUT WHEELER?

Reviewing History of Wheeler County Courthouse

In 1880 the court of Wheeler County decided to build a courthouse and jail in Mobeetie. This was the only

settlement in the county, at that time. The County Judge was, Emanuel Dubbs, other officers were: Clerk, H.D. Tomb; Commissioners, George Montgomery, Mr. Weed Mr. Williams and Mr. Mark Huselby. The courthouse was completed first. It was built of rock two story. This courthouse evidently was of poor construction, perhaps the rock was inferior because it was condemned as unsafe for usage in 1889. October 18, 1889 a contract was given to C.W. Watson to construct a frame building. The plans showed diminutions to be 44 by 51 feet. Sureties were signed by individuals for the amount of \$15,000.00 to construct the courthouse. Signers were: J.H. Anderson - \$500.00; E.S. Burlingame - \$500.00; D.M. Hargrave - \$500.00; E.E. Polly - \$500.00; M.C. Hughes \$1000.00; J.E. Jones \$500.00; B.F. Clappitt - \$500.00; Thomas Riley - \$1500.00; A. A. Parcess -

\$500.00; Mark Huselby - \$1500.00; Thos. O'Loughlin \$500.00; W. W. Anderson - \$500.00; W.H. Hopkins / 1000.00; John Hallicut - 500.00; H. E. Sides - 500.00; T.B. Hinkle - 1000.00; W.H. Grigsby - 500.00; Newt F Lock 1000.00

Charles Rath was paid \$20.00 per month for the use of his mercantile store for a courthouse until the new one was completed. G. W. Arrington was the Sheriff. The citizens voted in 1908 to move the county seat to the town of Wheeler, as it was more centrally located. Thus the frame courthouse was moved to Wheeler and located where the courthouse now stands. I was told, by observers, that the courthouse was moved by teams from Mobeetie to Wheeler without dismantling it. The court record stated the courthouse was moved to Wheeler and rebuilt in 1908.

The County Judge in 1908 was W.M. Durham. Commissioners were: Prec 1 - Blake Lee; Prec. 2 - E. E. Holt; Prec. 3 - J.R. Gracy; Prec 4 - G.J. Duncan. Sheriff was M.V. Sanders and County Clerk, C. Bee Stevens. The contractor for moving and remodeling or rebuilding was W.T. Johnson for the sum of \$3250.00. There was need for more room in the courthouse in 1924 plans were begun for the erection of a new brick building for the county. May 20, 1926 this new brick structure was accepted as finished by the court.

The heading the court list at the finishing date were: A.C. Wood, Co. Judge; J.P. Williams, W.O. Miller, W.M. McMurry and D.C. Howell commissioners. Emmett T. Scott was county attorney; Riley Price sheriff and R.H. Forrester, clerk. Mr. K.D. Morris was hired as janitor at \$75.00 per month at full time service.

The court house was insured for \$60,000.00. In 1965 a renovation program was completed, the first remodeling for the entire courthouse. At other times a room was painted, basement rooms changed and redecorated. In 1964 a ladies restroom was added to the first floor for use of employees only. The jury room had been renovated and refinished about four years previous to this renovation period, of 1965.

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A Letter from Ern

Editor's Note: The following letter was written for the Wheeler Times and was postmarked the day of Uncle Ern's death, Monday, August 12.

Yesterday recalled It was Feb. 1883 my parents left Switzerland to come to America with 4 children school age. Neither of the six could talk a word of the American language. The children soon learned but the parents were much longer learning. I know how handicapped the U.S. soldiers were in a foreign land and couldn't talk or understand the language.

Now let me tell you how big a coward I was in my late 20's, I wanted to go to South America and Canada, a fellow by myself, not enough kick. I believe people that grew up and stayed a lifetime at the same place are the happiest.

In vain we call old notions fudge, and bend our conscience to our dealings.

The Ten Commandments will not budge and stealing will continue. Coffee and cigarets are overdone to my way of thinking however tis none of my affairs. Some people seem to think more of television than of relatives and friends.

The picture in the Wheeler times amused me I am not as dark as that however quite a lot of dark complected people live in Las Cruces. On one occasion a fellow took a picture of my team and myself about 15 years ago. I showed it to my wife, she said looks just like you, don't expect anything worth looking at.

I'm sure enough getting tired of the Watergate squabble, am a poor scholar don't know yet what its all about. Got a nice little rain shower July 14, the Bermuda grass sure enough thrives when it gets moisture enough.

You fishermen that plan on a big catch I want to give you some advice. A prayer like this, it says, Lord give me grace to catch a fish so large that even I need never tell a Lie.

One winter day the month of February 1935 a car stopped in front of my house to clean windshields on car, two fellows in the car, they started toward Allison less than a quarter of a mile the car stopped Anna my wife said someone was running toward our house. The man that was driving was a victim of a heart attack, a cotton buyer the name Hubbard, the other was his son-in-law.

Like anyone else, the son-in-law was in a jam the home was in Grand Prairie, Texas. Elbert and I put the dead man in the back seat, the son-in-law was so disturbed I told Elbert to drive the rig to Wheeler and someone would bring us back home.

Religion teaches people to lend a helping hand to people in distress.

I heard a number of untrue stories of that particular incident.

Lotsa things worse than dying. Fortunately no one knows the time of hour death is sure to come to one and all.

Tonights prayer Make us aware of God within and never let our minds grow dim. And always seek his will to Love God and other to Good night. Old man Zybach, worn out farmer.

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KING'S KOMMENTS

Those attending the diethylstilbestrol (DES) certification meeting in Dumas last Friday were told that before they could ship livestock or meat to Canada they were required to certify that the animal had not received any DES had not been used on the premises.

It was stated earlier that anyone wanting to ship livestock to Canada must attend one of the meetings held last week. However, we were told at the meeting the County Extension Agent in your county can go over the regulations with you. You will still need certification that you understand the regulations and there are other forms that must accompany the shipment.

BEEF HERDS UP IN TEXAS
Texas farmers and ranchers increased their beef breeding cows by a huge 7 percent during the past year. Beef cows and heifers that had calved increased by 450,000 head from July 1, 1973 and July 1, 1974. While almost every section of the State recorded gains, the southern end of the Panhandle and Far West Texas reported smaller numbers. The largest increase came in South Central Texas.

The Texas calf crop for 1974 is estimated at 6.2 million head, 5 percent greater than last year's crop. That means the Texas crop represents 12 percent of the national calf availability.

Concentration of beef cow herds in eastern and southern parts of the state will have a marked effect on the beef picture in the United States in the coming months.

WHEAT FERTILIZER CONSIDERATIONS

After the generally disappointing wheat yields of the 1974 harvest, High Plains farmers are facing a somewhat different harvest, High Plains farmers are facing a somewhat different challenge in meeting the next wheat crop's nutrient requirement.

Producers should use those fertilizer rates that would eliminate deficiencies for their yield goal. This goal, he said, should be

consistent with available irrigation water and management practices. While fertilizer costs are higher this year they remain a real bargain when applied at optimum rates.

Nitrogen is the most important plant nutrient in the production of both forage and grain because it is required in the largest amount and is the most commonly deficient of nutrients in wheat producing soils.

Keep in mind, however, that the heavier soils can accumulate nitrate following application rates that are above the amount removed by crops. If you fertilized for 60 bushels of wheat last year and for some reason produced much less, chances are you have a very significant level of nitrate in the soil for the next crop. In this case, you can decrease your nitrogen rate.

Nitrate nitrogen testing in the Extension Soil Testing Laboratory in Lubbock has proven over the years to be very helpful in determining nitrogen need for wheat and other field crops.

Phosphorus is the second element of most concern. While much of the hardland area does not respond to applications of phosphate, where soil test values are in the very low range it can be a major contributor to vigorous early growth of high quality forage and can also contribute to increased grain yields. Unlike nitrogen which can be effectively applied anytime before tillering, phosphate

must be applied in the seedbed if it is to be effective for the next crop. Soil tests for phosphorus have been carefully with yield response in field tests by Texas Agricultural Experiment Station researchers at Lubbock over several years. These tests afford the best indicator available

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to the producer for evaluation of phosphate need and likelihood of response from its application. Information on sample collection and mailing may be obtained from the county Extension office.

It is important that samples be properly collected to adequately represent a soil area. Information on crop history and irrigation available together with realistic yield goals should a company soil samples so that suggestion on rate and kind of fertilizer can be returned to the producer in written report.

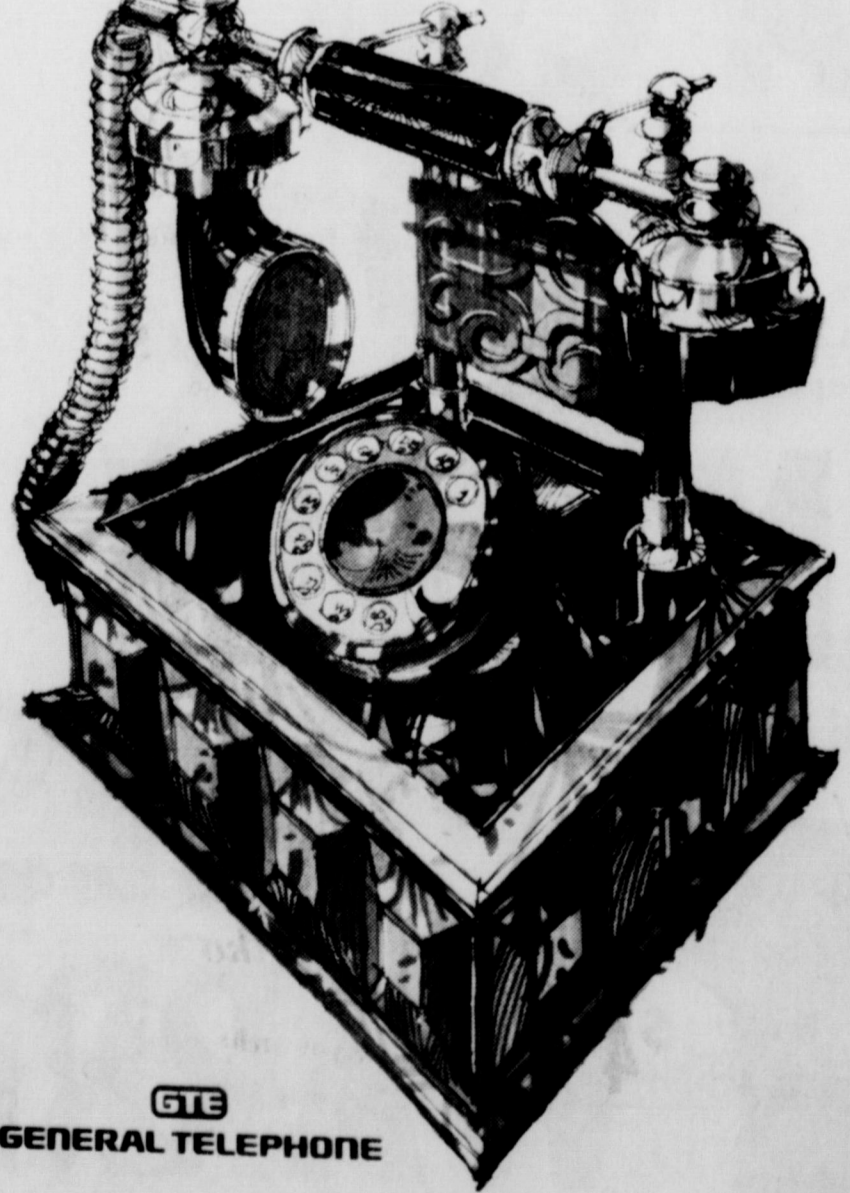

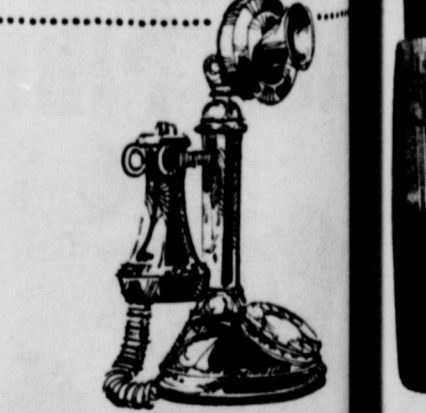

THE FAMILY LAWYER
 Tree Litter
 From time to time, when the west wind blew, twigs and leaves from Fred Miller's poplar tree would flutter down into a neighbor's back yard. Resentful, the neighbor finally took the matter into the courtroom.
 "It is up to Miller to keep his litter out of my yard," he told the judge. "If there is no other way, then let him cut the tree down."
 But the court refused to mix in. Noting that the tree was located entirely on Miller's land, the court said he could not be blamed for the natural process of shedding.
 Generally speaking, the law will not interfere with natural growth on private property.
 Thus, another man was held entitled to maintain four large maple trees on his land even though they kept a neighbor's house in the shade. The court said his freedom to use his own property outweighed the indirect annoyance to the neighbor.
 On the other hand, the neighbor may have a valid complaint when the injury he suffers is more substantial. Thus, when branches actually spread across the property line, most courts give the neighbor the right to chop them off at the boundary.
 Furthermore, a neighbor usually has grounds for suit if a tree threatens his safety. Another case involved a badly decayed elm standing near a back yard fence. The next door neighbor, fearful of an impending accident, warned the tree's owner of the danger—to no avail.
 One morning, during a storm, a heavy bough split off and fell across the fence, smiting the neighbor on the shoulder. Under these circumstances, the owner of the tree was held responsible for the neighbor's mishap.
 The court said he had no more right to keep a dangerous tree on his property than to keep a dangerous building.

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STATE CAPITAL

Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN, Tex. — Battle lines are drawn for the State Democratic Convention here September 17.

Liberal delegates, although apparently outnumbered, asserted their intentions at a recent meeting in San Antonio to claim their full share of convention plums.

— First, they made clear, they will fight for proportional representation on the State Democratic Executive Committee, the party's policy-making and house-keeping body in Texas.

— Second, they are demanding their share of the 76 delegates to the national Democratic mid-term convention in Kansas City next December.

— The liberals also made preparations for expressing their views on the party platform, resolutions and rules.

— Finally, they indicated they may challenge Gov. Dolph Briscoe's choice for SDEC chairman and other top committee officers.

Choices of incumbent governors for these posts traditionally have gone unchallenged where they have majority control of conventions.

The "open party" Democrats at the San Antonio session adopted a platform committing themselves to a state party organization that will support Democratic candidates and principles at all levels rather than "promoting the policies of incumbent governors."

Bob Bullock of Austin, Democratic nominee for comptroller, is being urged to oppose incumbent SDEC Chairman Calvin Guest of Bryan, Governor Briscoe's choice for a second term.

Meanwhile, the national Democratic charter commission broke up in anger when party regulars and reformers clashed over reform measures in the proposed Democratic constitution.

GOVERNORS TO MEET — Governors of the southern states, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands will meet here September 8-11 to discuss a wide range of problems, including economy and energy.

Governor Briscoe is host to

the Southern Governors Conference which will meet at Lakeway, a luxury resort on Lake Travis 20 miles northwest of the Capital City.

About 300 reporters will join the 19 governors and their staffs for the three-day business meeting, and the social rounds of tennis, golf, sailing and parties.

Gov. Melvin Evans, governor of the Virgin Islands, is chairman of the Southern Governors Conference for 1973-74.

INSURANCE JARGON HIT — The State Board of Insurance is declaring war on "the fine print, double talk and gobbledy-gook" in insurance policies, according to Board Chairman Joe Christie.

Christie said the average policy holder cannot understand policy jargon, and recent tests show Einstein's theory of relativity is more readable than an average hospital insurance plan.

Christie said efforts will be made in the next session of the legislature to improve "the readability factor" of insurance policies. He recommended that other state agencies give some attention to similar readability problems involving documents over which they have jurisdiction.

No-fault auto insurance will be another subject for legislative consideration in 1975, Christie told Texas Bankers Association at a conference here. He said a recent study on the subject by the Lyndon Baines Johnson School of Public Affairs will be of major help to lawmakers.

AG OPINIONS — The University of Texas must give a legislator access to files on UT land leases, but may keep confidential land appraisals and sealed bid contents, Atty. Gen. John Hill held.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded:

• Records of a city's exercise of licensing authority over electrical installations is public information and should be disclosed.

• Police supplementary reports of accidents, including witnesses' statements and photographs, although in-

volving possible litigation against a city, are part of the official record and are not excepted from disclosure.

• A faculty member who fails to exercise the option to participate in the optional teacher retirement system does not have the right to a second opportunity to exercise that option on returning to teaching in Texas after terminating previous employment and leaving the state to seek an advanced degree.

• Whether a water pump and irrigation casing are fixtures within terms of taxation depends on facts in a particular case.

• An individual who is not a registered engineer may not display or use membership in or certification by an association using the term "engineer" in its name in his professional or business activities.

COMMITTEES NAMED — State Democratic Chairman Calvin Guest named an election advisory committee to plan statewide rallies and extensive voter registration and get-out-the-vote campaigns to help Democratic nominees.

A pre-election statewide telecast is also under consideration for the party's nominees.

Members of the committee include all statewide Democratic nominees, Guadalupe County Democratic Chairman Lem Allen, Travis County Chairman Ken Wendler, Midland County Chairman Vann Culp, Tarrant County Chairman Estil Vance, Swisher County Chairman R. T. O'Daniel.

Also Democratic Congressional Candidates Bob Krueger of New Braunfels, Jack Hightower of Vernon and Mike McKool of Dallas and seven members of the State Democratic Executive Committee.

SCHOOL AID APPROVED — Seven Texas school districts and four regional education service centers will receive a total of \$191,091 in federal funds to develop modern planning, budgeting and program evaluation techniques in 1974-75.

The grants will go to El Paso, Galveston, Birdville, Waxahachie, Irving, New Caney and Lockhart and to ESC regions in Edinburg, Corpus Christi, San Angelo and El Paso. A second round of grants totalling \$79,599 will be awarded later this fall.
