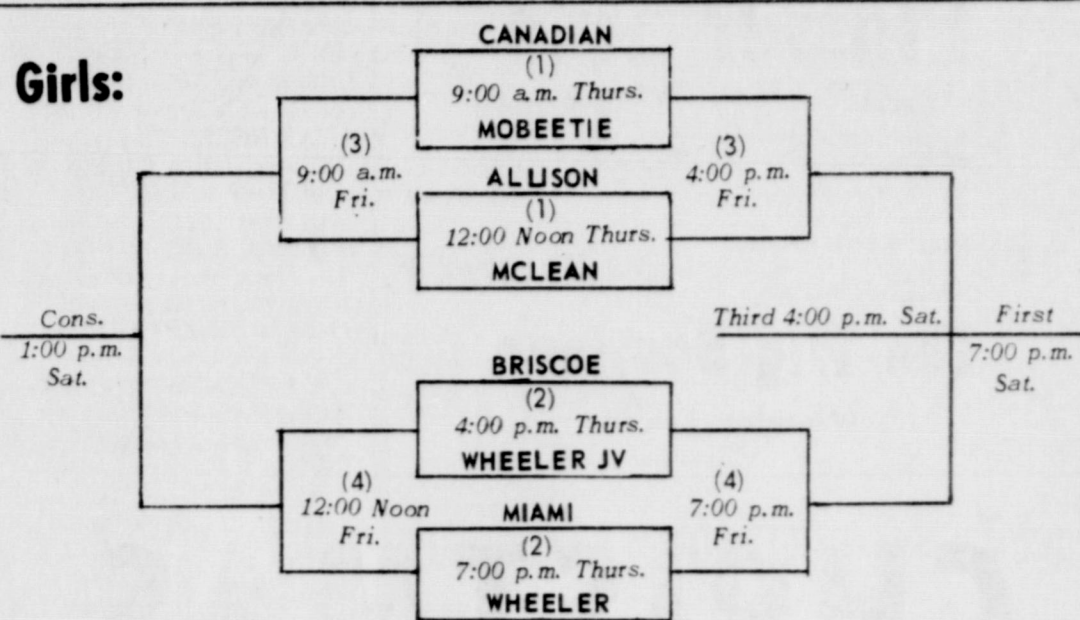
To make this project a great success the citizens of Wheeler must all put forth an effort to help make Wheeler the most beautifully decorated city in the Panhandle.

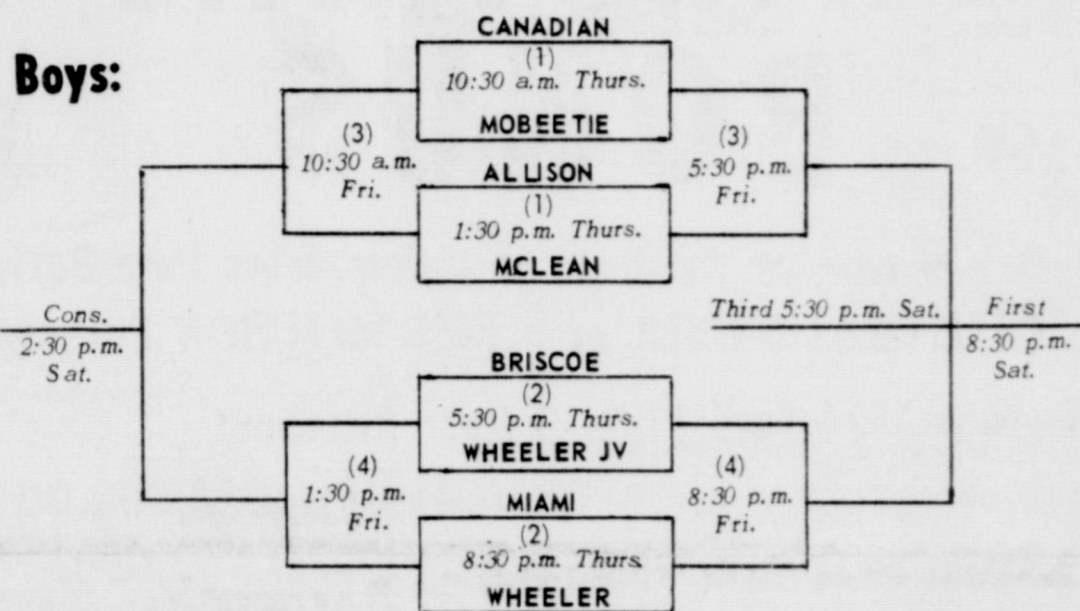

Eight teams have entered both girls and boys brackets in the double elimination tournament with play getting underway Thursday morning at 9 A.M. with a girls game between Canadian and Mobeetie.

There will be five sessions in the tournament with two sessions on Thursday and Friday and one session on Saturday beginning with the consolation finals at 1 P.M.

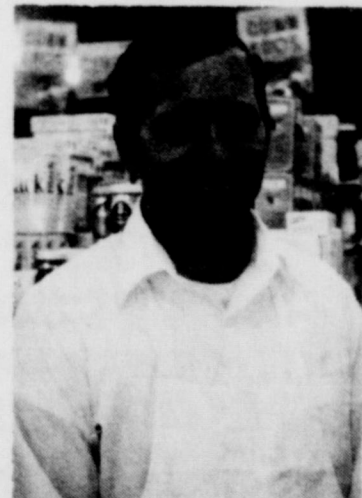
Admission for all the sessions will be \$1.00 for adults and 50¢ for students and under.

LINES FROM LINDA

There is much concern these days for underprivileged children - Children whose families lack sufficient resources to keep up with the mainstream of American life.

But another group needs consideration also.

What of the children who are growing up in the midst of plenty - the overprivileged children? Children who are:

Overindulged - with money and the things money can buy (but not necessarily with love and human values).

Overprotected - insulated from responsibility (but not taught self-discipline or the ability to make their own decisions).

Overpressured - to grow up to fast, to get good grades, to become sophisticated and socially adept (but not necessarily to think for themselves, be creative or become mature persons).

No doubt there are as many overprivileged children as there are underprivileged. But what happens to these overprivileged children as they grow up?

Surely some of them are turning out well in spite of being overindulged. But a few changes are noticeable in some members of the "new" generation.

Youth who believe the world owes them a living.

Teens who try to escape pressures of life through narcotics, alcohol or even suicide.

Youth who view marriage as only a temporary arrangement, easily dissolved if unsatisfactory.

Perhaps none of the 'overprivileged' factors in a child's upbringing cause these behavior patterns. But studies do show that an individual's personality is largely the result of what effect his early environment within his family had on his basic inherited tendencies.

Each individual parent has a strong influence over the way his children (the way his children the future generation) develop.

After all, society is the sum total of all the individuals who grew up in families.

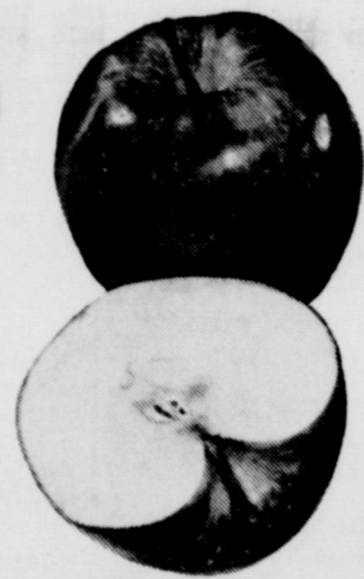

held in strict confidence, are the only source of information on crop and livestock numbers available to producers.

"Ranchers who disregard the questionnaires or give wrong information only hurt themselves". If there were no government estimates but these would probably be only for private use. This would put the individual rancher at a definite bargaining disadvantage.

So ranchers are really helping themselves when they complete the questionnaire.

Manure used as fertilizer will produce just as much sorghum, corn silage and wheat as commercial fertilizer and is much cheaper, contends Dr. John M. Sweeten, agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Comparable yields were produced in the Texas High Plains with 10 tons of manure per acre and recommended fertilizer applications.

"It costs about \$40 to fertilize one acre of land with commercial fertilizer while the cost of fertilizing the same amount of land with feedlot manure is about \$23 where the haul distance is 10 miles. Assuming the same yields from the two acres, fertilizing with feedlot manure saves about \$17 per acre," says the Texas A&M University System specialist.

This would indicate a break-even haul distance for manure of about 40 miles.

Because of the shortage of commercial fertilizer and the resulting high prices, the demand for feedlot manure as fertilizer has reached an all-time high, explains Sweeten.

"Last year when Texas cattle production reached a peak, four million tons of manure were produced, most of this was used by crop farmers on the Texas High Plains," notes Sweeten. "Today Texas feedlots are operating at less than 60 per cent capacity and the demand for manure from crop farmers is exceeding the supply."

Charges for feedlot manure delivered to the field varies among feedlots, but a typical charge is about \$2.25 per ton for a 10 mile haul. Of course, the charge varies with the distance hauled.

Farmers who pay cash wages for agricultural labor must report and pay social security taxes on each employee, says Dr. Wayne Hoyenga, economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Agricultural labor refers to all services performed for hire on a farm and also includes domestic work in a private home. However, wages paid to a son or daughter under 21 years of age or to an employer's wife or husband are not subject to social security taxes.

"An employer must pay social security taxes on each employee who worked 20 days or more for any amount of cash wages during the year," points out the Texas A&M University System economist.

"The employer can deduct half the tax due from an employee's wages but must pay the other half himself. The social security tax rate for 1974 is 5.85 per cent for the employee and the employer, which makes the total tax 11.7 per cent of the first \$13,200 in wages paid to each employee."

If the total tax due at the end of a quarter is less than \$200, it can be paid directly to the Internal Revenue Service, using Form 943. If the total tax due at the end of any month other than December is \$200 or more, a deposit must be made with an authorized commercial bank or with a Federal Reserve

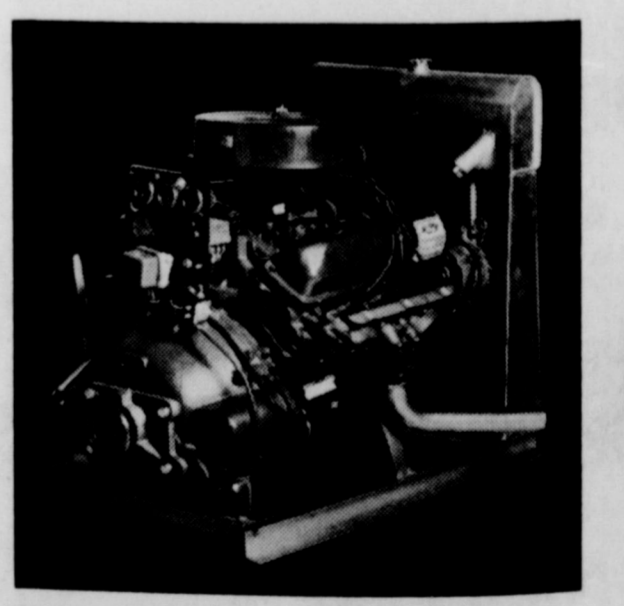

THE FAMILY LAWYER

"Follow That Car!"

Suppose a policeman jumps into the back seat of your automobile and shouts: "Follow that car!"

Are you obliged to obey? Generally speaking, you are not. Under the ancient "hue and cry" doctrines of the common law, an officer may commandeer any vehicle that he needs to catch a fleeing felon.



As Judge Benjamin Cardozo once put it: "The horse has yielded to the motorcar as an instrument of pursuit and flight. Still, as in the days of Edward I, the citizenry may be called upon to enforce justice, not faintly and with lagging steps but honestly and bravely and with whatever implements and facilities are at hand."

You may even be obliged to help in making the actual arrest (at least, say some states, if you are an "able-bodied male over 18 years of age"). To refuse, without good reason, could make you guilty of a misdemeanor.

On the other hand, in the event that you do lend a hand, the community owes you certain legal benefits in return.

For example: A man was called upon by the sheriff to help in arresting an armed fugitive. In the ensuing gunplay, he suffered a bullet wound in the shoulder.

He was therefore entitled, a court ruled afterward, to collect workmen's compensation—just like any county employee injured in the line of duty.

In another case, a clerk in a store helped a policeman make an arrest that turned out to be an error. In short order, the clerk found himself facing a damage suit for "false arrest."

But the court held him not liable. The court said making him pay damages for an innocent mistake, in no way his fault, would be shabby thanks from society to a good citizen.

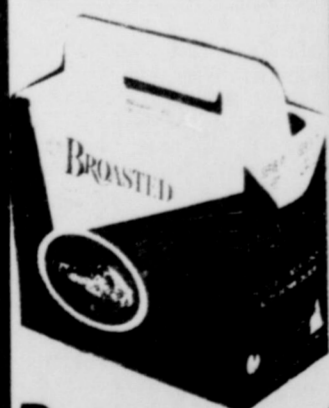
