





'One of the reasons for today's low cattle prices is excessive numbers of livestock. That is why it is so important to have good estimates of livestock num bers. We must know our own position.

The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service will soon be mailing

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out questionnaires concerning livestock and crop numbers to a selected group of Texas ranchers.

It's important to complete the questionnaire correctly and return it as soon as possilbe. Livestock and crop estimates are made on the basis of these re-

The reports, which are

held in stict confidence, are the only sorce of information on crop and livestock numbers available to

Ranchers who disregard the questionnaires or give wrong information only hurt themselves". If there were no government estimates but these would probably be only for private use. This would put the individual rancher at a definite

bargaining disadvantage. So ranchers are really helping thems elves when they complete the questionnaire.

Manure used as fertilizer will produce just as much sorghum, corn silage and Wheat as commercial fertilizer and is much cheaper, contends Dr. John M. Sweeten, agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Comparable yields were produced in the Texas High Plains with 10 tons of manure per acre and recommended fertilizer applicat-

'it costs about \$40 to fertilize one acre of land with commercial fertilizer while the cost of fertilizing the same amount of land with feedlot manure is about \$23 where the haul distance is 10 miles. Assum-

Because of the shortage of commercial fertilizer and the resulting high prices, the demand for feedlot manure as fertilizer has reached an all-time high, explains Last year when Texas

cattle production reached a peak, four million tons of manure were produced. most of this was used by crop farmers on the Texas High Plains," notes Sweeten "Today Texas feedlots are operating at less than 60 per cent capacity and the demand for manure from crop farmers is exceeding

the supply." Charges for feedlot manure delivered to the field varies amoung feedlots, but a typical charge is about \$2.25 per ton for a 10 mile haul. of course, the charge varies with the distance hauled.

Farmers who pay cash wages for agricultural labor must report and pay social security taxes on each employee, says Dr. Wayne Hayenga, economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Agricultural labor refers to all services performed for hire on a farm and also includes domestic work in in a private home. However, wages paid to a son or daughter under 21 years of age or to an employer's wife or husband are not subjuct to social security taxes.

'An employer must pay social security taxes on each employee who worked 20 days or more for any amount of cash wages during the year," points out the Texas A&M University System economist.

The employer can deduct half the tax due from an employee's wages but must pay the other half himself. The social security tax rate for 1974 is 5.85 per cent for the employee and the employer, which makes the total tax 11.7 per cent of the first \$13,200 in wages paid to each em-\$4.00 ployee.

If the total tax due at the end of a quarter is less than \$200, it can be paid directly to the Internal Revenue Service, using Form 943. If the total tax due at the end of any month other than December is \$200 or more, a deposit must be made with an authorized commercial bank or with a Federal Reserve

Are you obliged to obey? erally speaking, you are ir Under the ancient "hue and ry" doctrines of the common law, an officer may commandeer any vehicle that he needs to catch a fleeing

"The horse has yielded to the motorcar as an instrument of purof Edward I, the citizenry may be Chicken honestly and bravely and with whatever implements and facilities are at hand."

You may even be obliged to help in making the actual arrest (at least, say some states, if you are an "able-bodied male over 18 years of age"). To refuse, without good reason, could make you guil-

ty of a misdemeanor. On the other hand, in the event that you do lend a hand, the community owes you certain legal benefits in return. For example:

A man was called upon by the sheriff to help in arresting an Bordens armed fugitive. In the ensuing gunplay, he suffered a bullet wound in the shoulder.

He was therefore entitled, a court ruled afterward, to collect workmen's compensation—just like any county employee injured in the line of duty.

In another case, a clerk in a store helped a policeman make an arrest that turned out to be an error. In short order, the clerk found himself facing a damage suit for "false arrest."

But the court held him not liable. The court said making him pay damages for an innocent mistake, in no way his fault, would be shabby thanks from society to a good citizen.

RATE HIKES OPPOSED -A group backing utility regulation asked Attorney General Hill to investigate allegations of irregularities in rate practices by Southwestern

Bell Telephone Company. At the same time, the chairman of the Texas Coalition for Utility Regulation said no city council should grant phone rate increases while questions raised in a suit at San Antonio against Southwestern Bell are pend-

The \$29.6 million damage suit by a fired Bell executive and the family of a deceased executive alleges the company kept a separate set of books for use in getting rate increases and indirectly channeled money into political campaigns.

State Rep. Roy Blake of Nacogdoches also advised city councils to reirain from rate increases until the charges have been proved or disproved.

NEW INDUSTRIES MULTI-PLY-Twenty-six new industries which may have a \$121 million annual impact on the economy located in Texas during October.
