



TOPDRESS WHEAT:

Top wheat yields can't be produced without adequate nitrogen. If you've grazed heavy, fall applied nitrogen will be gone. From 30 to 60 pounds of actual nitrogen per acre should be considered. Under irrigation, higher rates may be profitable. On clay soils with no grazing, topdressing probaby won't be needed - if 45 -60 pounds were applied at planting. Putting on anything other than nitrogen wouldn't help because phosphate and potash are needed in the

A lot of our soil tests coming in reveal a need for both nitrogen and phosphate especially where irrigation is practiced. Keep this in mind as you make plans for spring fertilization of grass.

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

#### agers are living in today is JACK FINSTERWALD IS NAMED COUNTY'S NO. 1 FARMER

When you ask a farmer why he operates as he does, be ready for some surprising answers. They relate to money making reasons and usually connect to soil conserving practices that prove profitable.

Jack Finsterwald was selected as Wheeler county's outstanding Conservation farmer on the basis of his outstanding conservation accomplishments. Jack has been in the farming business about 15 years. He and his wife, Doris Faye, have three boys: Billy Wayne, 13, Bobby Gene 11 and Jerry Don, 9.

Starting with a 500 pound maize yield in 1954, he now produces 3400 pounds. He has increased this yield through the use of conservation farming techniques. fertilizer, and improved vareties. Starting with 7 acres of cotton and a 125 pound to the acre yield, Jack has raised his acreage to 100 and now has an average yield of 350 pounds of lint to the acre. He grows wheat, cotton and maize on 450 acres of

cropland. Thirteen heifers was the backbone of his herd 14 years ago. He nowhas 50 mother cows grazing on 940 acres of native grass. He weaned a 90% calf crop last year. Jack feeds salt and minerals free choice. His wintering program is hay supplemented with cottonseed cake. In February he feeds alfalfa to make up for the vitamin A deficit. He holds his calves over to sell at 750 pounds

rather than 500 pounds. At present he is crossing Hereford cows with a registered Angus bull. All calves are vaccinated for blackleg, malignant edema and leptospirosis. His herd was 'clean-billed' in the brucellosis eradication program

three years ago. A soil test is run every two years. Soil fertility recommendations by Texas A & M University are followed closely. He usually exceeds his nitrogen levels only slightly and uses anhydrous ammonia.

Jack says erosion has always been a problem. He has terraced all of his land and has constructed a relatively new terrace to this area, a parallel terrace. He is proudest of the waterways that controlled his biggest erosion problem and to put some wasteland to good use. He had a lot of outside water from a large drainage area that made a large portion of his best land practically useless. The construction of a waterway and the seeding of that to alfalfa is one

of his proudest achievements Jack is a member of the Wheeler County Farm Bureau. He is a past member of the Young Farmers organization in his area. In other ways he boosts his community by serving as church treasurer of the First Baptist Church in Briscoe, Texas. He served as a school board member for the past six years and has served as an ASCS Lee Guthrie and the hostesses community committeeman. Jack has served his community faithfully and well.

> The young Finsterwald boys all help on the farm. Neighbors say "those boys really know how to work. They are proficient in using and operating tractors and other field equipment.

Concerning his attitude on the future of agriculture, Jack said, "I believe the trend in our part of the country will be more to livestock farming with the emphasis on cattle and hogs. There will be less row cropping." He is encouraging his boys to think of getting a college education in an agriculture

or related field. In selecting Jack Finsterwald as the outstanding conservation farmer, the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District supervisors considered his good farming ability, determination, the application of good conservation practices, the respect and use of available agri-business knowledge and that his family, friends and neighbors believe in him and encourage him in his endeavors.

#### Sweetwater Creek Program

The Sweetwater Creek Watershed program is still alive. This program was very much in the news from 1962 through 1964. Not much has been said about it lately. The action has not stopped, however, not has it gone underground. It is now at a stage where the next move up is to the State Soil Conservation Boards of Texas and Okla-

According to Gordon Stiles, Chairman of the Sweetwater Creek Watershed Association, a meeting was held in Sayre, Okla, last May (May 5, 1967) of the two state boards. At this meeting they agreed that all necessary preparations had been made, that the problems of the watershed were pertinent and pressing and that local opinion was favorable. They decided it was time to start work. The Texas board agreed to issue an immediate planning priority. (At a later date they did give this watershed such a priority pending concurrent planning with Oklahoma.) Oklahoma operates differently from Texas and, although they agreed to give it a top planning priority, itmust wait its turn to come up. This is expected to be in 1970.

No further action can be taken until planning work is done that will develope the work plan. This work plan will consist of the actual layout for the structures (dams) and will show how much and where the water will be impounded; howmuch conservation work must be done on the drainage area of each structure; and some organization as to when they will be built. It will take about two years to develop the plan and get it approved. Actual construction of the dams may then be started.
