

What are some of the important as pects of fall gardening?

First of all, get the land into good shape. If a garden was planted this spring and fertilizer was applied, little if an additional fertilizer will be needed before fall planting.

For new gardens, two to three pounds of a complete fertilizer such as 10-10-10 per 100 square feet and working in to the soil. If plants make slow growth, a light amount of fertilizer may be applied between the rows and watered into the

Of major importance for a successful fall garden is an adequate water supply. Since planting is done during hot weather, sufficient wate is needed for germination and early growth. Light waterings three to for times a week may be necessary to keep the soil from drying out and crusting. Water stress during early growth of plants can reduce later yields.

Since transplants of recommended varieties of vegetables may be hard to find at local nurseries, the specialist suggests buying seed and growing yopr own transplants. Four to five weeks should be allowed from the time of seeding to sett ing the young plants out in the garden.

Transplanting is a good practice in the fall. Since it allows the s ed to be started in areas sheltered from high temperatures and drying winds.

Of course, as with all gardens, a wary eye must be kept for such problems as weeds insects, and diseases. However the quality and flavor of many vegetables grown in the fall are superior to those from spring gardens.

AUSTIN, Tex. - Views of citizens on how to save current assets of the Texas coast while permitting its orderly economic development are being sampled in a series of public hearings.

Hearings are a major initial step in development of a Coastal Zone Management

More than 150 representa-tives of business, labor, agriculture, industry and environmental groups outlined expectations for the plan at a workshop here last week.

Need for a balance between economic development and protection of natural resources emerged as the key element for the CZM plan. CZM is concerned with

economic development urban population growth, water supply, local control, residential and resort home development and power plant siting.

Hearings are slated for August 13 in Harlingen, Au-gust 28 in Corpus Christi, Sentember 5 in Vision September 5 in Victoria, September 12 in Beaumont, September 23 in Houston, September 24 in Galveston and September 27 in Austin. The technical phase of the program starting in the fall will seek to arrive at esti-

mates of demands on coastal resources, assess capability of resources to support the demands and to evaluate management mechanisms. After more hearings in

1975 and 1976, final recommendations resulting from the plan will be made to the legislature in September,



Lending" Your Home

Members of your church, ch lodge, or political party may want to hold a meeting in your home If you say yes, what kind of legal responsibility are you taking on in case somebody gets hurt?

The answer usually depends on whether those who come are classified as social visitors or business visitors. Most courts say you owe only a moderate degree of care toward social visitors, but a high degree of care toward business



Which classification is the correct one for people who gather in a private home? They are not ordinary social guests, yet they have not come for business reasons

As a rule courts have decided that the social category, even if not exactly right, at least fits better than the business category. The practical effect is to reduce the home owner's responsibility for accidents. Consider a typical case:

A woman opened her home for meeting of college alumnae. During the evening, one of the visitors skidded on a loose throw rug and injured her shoulder. As a result, the hostess soon found herself facing a suit for damages. But the court held her not liable. The court said the victim, just like an ordinary social visitor, had to take the premises as she

found them. On the other hand, the home owner's risk goes up when there is a business element in the day's arrangements. In another case, a woman allowed the local garden club to send sightseers to her home as part of a tour. But each person who signed up had to pay the club

This fact made all the difference later on, when an injured sightseer sought damages from the hostess. The court said payment of the fee gave the visitor the same special rights as a cash customer in a place of business.


