

Are You Planning Personals . . . Range Seeding?

Are you as a cooperater of the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District thinking about doing some grass seeding this spring? Are you wondering what kind of seedbed to prepare and what kind of grass to seed?

When seeding into an existing cover of prennial junk grasses, the proper method of seedbed preparation is to run sweeps under the undersirable vegetation and leave it lying on top of the ground to prevent blowing. Then in late winter or early spring, it is ready to drill grass into. If you have a field with little cover, then you should plow the land once or twice depending on weed campetition, then drill from 14 to 18 lbs. of any kind of sorghum. Do not permit sorghum to head out as it will compete with the seeded grass the next year.

The kinds of grasses to sow depend mainly on the soil. As an example, you would plant tall grasses such as Indian, Bluestems, Switch grass and Love grasses on sandy-land and deep sand. The tighter soils would be adapted to Bluegrama and Sideoatsgrama.

For further information on grass seeding, see the Soil Conservation Service which works through the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District and they will promptly assist you.




