

Weeping Lovegrass

This is the time of year to take a close look at next years production of Weeping Lovegrass. Management given the grass this time of year will determine next years production.

If a plant hasbeen heavily used this growing season, the root sy stem of the plant will be weak. As a plant avows it has to have a large leaf surface area to take in air and sum ight or it will use reserves of nutrients from SI the root system. As a plant is Alliance, Nebraska. He grazed it has to deplete the root system reserve to produce regrowth. When the plant regrows it begins to catch up to where the leaf surface can manufacture needed nutrien te and will store excess in the root system. This excess or reserve that is stored in ther ots is the key to next years production. In the spring when a

plant begins to green up and grow is uses the root system res we to begin its production If this reserve is low the root system will be damaged by this use of nutrients and slow the production of forage. This can not be corrected by applying extra amounts of fertilize. If the root system is damaged it can not take in fertilizer

elements provided. This time of year when approaching frost the plants need to have an adequate growth of leaves as the root system stores are adequate if the cleaf growth is there.

If we will just keep in mind that 95% of the plants nutrients come from the air. we will realize that it has to have the leaf surface to take in these nutrients.

Have you ever stored your tulips in the refrigerator??

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WE BUY ALL TYPES OF HOGS

Tulips can be grown as successfully in the South as garden magazines and bulb. catalogs claim, if they are treated properly. Tulips require cold temperaturs to perform at their best and Southern winters are usually to warm for good flower bud develoments. So, the Southern gardener must substitute cold conditions by chilling the bulbs artificially at 35

to 60 days prior to planting. Keep the bulbs refriegerated until mid- December, then plant immediately upon removal from cold storage. If bulbs are planted earlier than this, the warm soil may nullify the cold treatments.

to 40 degrees for at least 45

Pre gooled bulbs are trequently advertised, but unless they are kept in cold storage, the normal garden shop tempe atures can also null fy the pre-cooling effect.

Without pre-cooling, the flower quality will be poor and the stems extremely short. A work of caution, though.do not allow the bulbs to freeze while in cold storage

Because of the warm winters, tulips should be con+ sidered as annual plants and discarded at the end of the blooming season.

Hyacinths respond to much the same treatments. but other spring flowering by lbs can be planted immediately after purchas ng.

When purchasing bulbs of any type, beware of the so-called 'bargins' bulbs, Spring flowers will only be as good as thebulbs you used, so select them carefully and buy only from reputable dealers. Good bulbs a e firm, clean and free of insects and diseases while bargin birlbs are usually draid out and of po ar quality.
