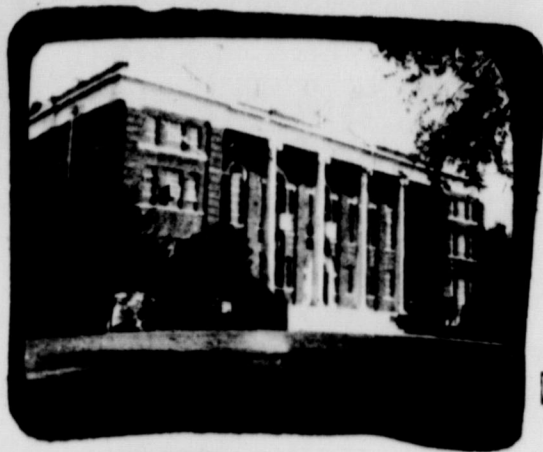

MUSTANGS, SKYROCKETS BATTLE TO 0-0 DEADLOCK

Frustration can probably describe the feelings of Wheeler and Wellington fans and players last Friday night as the Mustangs and Skyrockets fought a scoreless duel on Powell Field in Wellington.

Even though the game ended scoreless, thrills and excitement were plentiful in the contest and nobody can say that they were treated to a dull game.

As in most contests, mistakes played a big part in the outcome and they

did cost Wellington two touchdowns that were called back but you will never convince the Mustangs that mistakes didn't cost them just as dearly as they saw drive after drive killed in that manner.

An 65 yard pass and run for an apparent Skyrocket TD midway of the third period was nullified by a clip at the Wheeler 21 and then the Wellington drive fizzled for good when Randall Hodges 32 yard field goal attempt sailed wide to the left.

With fourth down at the Wheeler 10 early in the fourth quarter, Wellington lined up for what appeared to be their second field goal try but it was a fake and Hodges passed to Mike Williams complete in the end zone but it too was called back as Wellington's right end moved at least two counts before the snap.

After the ensuing penalty Hodges tried a field goal from the 27 but Wayne Wheeler broke through and made a clean block and Hodges was finally downed on the Wheeler 35 to kill the last Skyrocket threat.

Wheeler blunted the Skyrocket drive with the opening kickoff at the Mustang 37 and started the first of seven trips into Skyrocket territory.

Lewis Britt rambled for 28 yards and two first downs the first four plays the Mustangs had the ball with all the plays hitting off the fine blocking of

right side of the Mustang line.

Two plays got another first down at the 20 and after Kent Ware was held to no gain, Britt got the call

at right tackle but never had good possession of the pitch and fumbled the ball away to the Rockets at the 22.

Coming off the tough, physical scoreless duel with the Wellington Skyrockets last week, the Wheeler Mustangs will be making a comeback against the Valley Patriots this Friday and will be attempting to better their 1-0-1 district record.

On paper, the Patriots will be outgunned by the Mustangs but it is just this kind of situation that has seen many favorites bite the dust and taste bitter defeat.

The Mustangs felt like they should have won the Skyrocket battle and should come back with vengeance against the winless Patriots.

"Valley is real young but they are a good fundamental club and can cause folks trouble if they don't watch out," Coach Bateman said.

The survey is necessary to determine or show the necessity of additional rental property in Wheeler. This need for more rental houses is not new to Wheeler or any other town in the community, but the Chamber has voted pursue the objective of eliminating the problem.

At the September meeting of the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce, a committee was appointed to do a further study into the possibility

of building rent houses with money available through Farmers Home Administration. Committee members are Farmer Hefley, Barry Altman, Harrison Hall, and Charlie Brown.

At the meeting, Barry Altman head of the local FHA office explained the money is available to non-profit organizations if a need could be shown.

Shamrock and other area towns have obtained money to build rental property through their Chambers of Commerce. Apartment complexes were built in Shamrock and they are full at the present time with a waiting list.

It has been proposed that Wheeler work toward the construction of duplexes. Two and three bedroom housing is most needed.

Colts Host Valley After Losing To Firecrackers 22-12

Wheeler's improving Jr. High Colts lost a tight one last Thursday to the Wellington Firecrackers 22-12 and will be out to get back in the win column this week when Valley Jr. High visits Nicholson Field Thursday at 6 P.M.

Marvin Grimes tallied from 7 yards out to give the Colts a 6-0 lead that they held for the first quarter only to see the visitors from Wellington take a 8-6 lead at halftime.

A 40 yard pass from Bobby Guthrie to Bob Gunter put the ball at the Firecracker 2 and Grimes got the six pointer after a five yard penalty for offsides against the Colts.

Annie Ingram broke for 71 yards to give the Firecrackers their halftime lead.

The Colts needed just three plays after the halftime break to get the lead back. Dell Ford was popped loose from the pigskin on the kickoff at the Colt 30 but Tim Patterson recovered on the 32.

Grimes got 9 at right tackle and then swept his left end for 23 more. Ford got the call and broke into the secondary over his left guard and raced 36 yards to paydirt.

Tulips can be grown as
successfully in the South as
garden magazines and bulb-
catalogs claim, if they are
treated properly. Tulips re-
quire cold temperatures to
perform at their best and
Southern winters are usually
too warm for good flower bud
developments. So, the Southern
gardener must substitute
cold conditions by chilling
the bulbs artificially at 35
to 40 degrees for at least 45
to 60 days prior to planting.

Keep the bulbs refrigerated
until mid-December, then
remove them from cold storage.
If bulbs are planted earlier
than this, the warm soil
may nullify the cold
treatments.

Pre-cooled bulbs are fre-
quently advertised, but unless
they are kept in cold storage,
the normal garden shop tem-
peratures can also nullify the
pre-cooling effect.

Without pre-cooling, the
flower quality will be poor
and the stems extremely
short. A work of caution,
though, do not allow the bulbs
to freeze while in cold storage.
Because of the warm
winters, tulips should be con-
sidered as annual plants and
discarded at the end of the
blooming season.

Hyacinths respond to
much the same treatments,
but other spring flowering
bulbs can be planted im-
mediately after purchase.

When purchasing bulbs of
any type, beware of the
so-called "bargain" bulbs.
Spring flowers will only be as
good as the bulbs you used,
so select them carefully and
buy only from reputable
dealers. Good bulbs are
firm, clean and free of
insects and diseases while
bargain bulbs are usually
dried out and of poor quality.

The finest cattle and hogs were to be seen also sheep, goats and poultry and farm products, melons and garden produce. Even the bakery department demonstrated sour dough biscuits A nice young lady was in the stand and I told her, us old cow hands and farmers called such as that cat heads. I told her us old hardened cow hands could digest rocks if we were hungry enough. Do any of you know the fisherman's prayer? It goes like this: Lord give me grace to catch a fish so large that even I need never tell a lie. 'Tis pretty chilly here tonight but ever so much colder up at Albuquerque, 220 miles north of Las Cruces. Armistice Day is only a month away You can imagine how often last winter, while I was off of my little farm in Wheeler Co, Texas appreciated that wonderful shelter which was sometimes so desperately scarce in 1918 In June us remounts had the pleasure of parading for General Pershing with our saddle bags over our shoulders. Captain Thomas told us we were the dumbest boys he ever saw as we had no drill work after Armistice day in November. I have a new great grand daughter so you see I am now great grand pa, don't seem to affect my age any. The extremely dry summer, of 1936, Clyde Dickey was at my place sound asleep about midnight in summer time. I heard a hen squaking I told Clyde to put on his shoes and come help me see if we could kill a skunk. I lit a lantern, gave him the 410 shotgun and we went. I with night clothes, he only shorts and shoes. We shot the skunk. I suggested we go down the hill and bury the skunk. As we were coming back; suppen a car came along what would people have thought. Luckily we were not bothered. Many a man looks back on the days of his youth with regret. How dath the little message card the many needs supply to people who have so little time to write as you and I but I am always glad to hear and always glad to send a word of hearty old time cheer to you my old and new time friend.
