## \$1 MILLION MARIJUANA HARVEST NORTHEAST OF WHEELER

from a stoolie led discovery and destruction of over \$1 million of marijuana growing in Wheeler County.

Wheeler County Sheriff's department was alerted Wednesday, June 27, by law officers of Bay County that marijuana was being harvested north of Wheeler.

A four acre patch was located on a ranch 6 miles south of Allison, a mile off the highway. The patch had developed in the area of an old hay stack; it had been brought in Kansas approximately 10 years ago and the crop had been over the years and the seed in the hay.

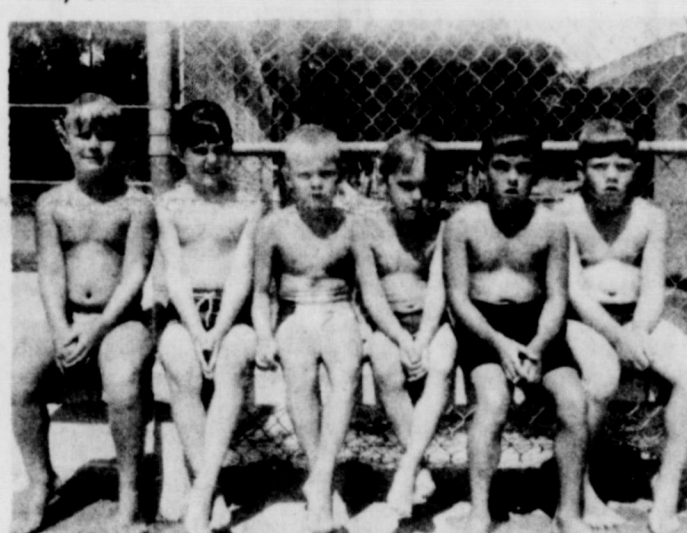
### Swimming Lessons Completed Tues.

Swimming lessons began Monday, June 17 at the local pool and were completed

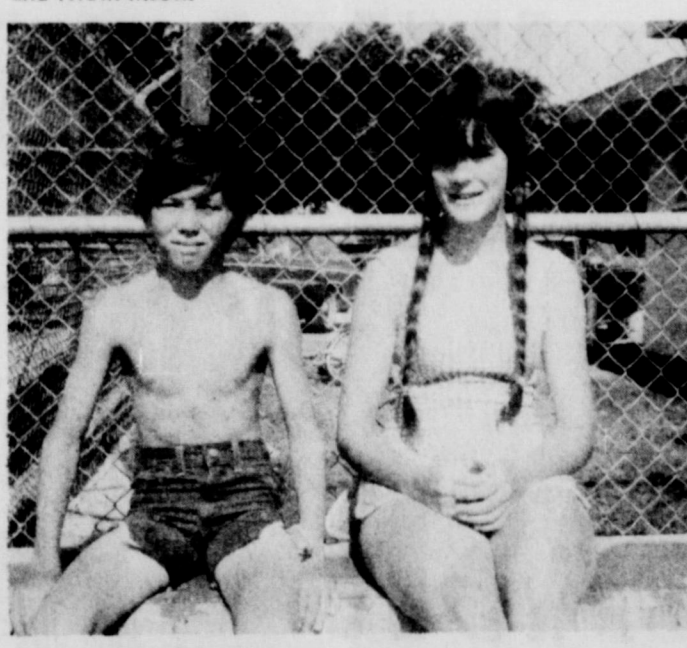

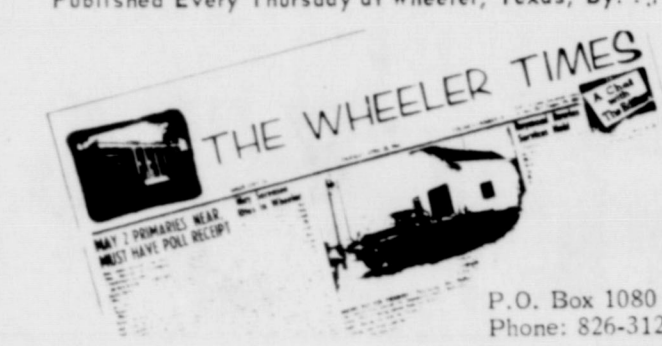

# KING'S KOMMENTS

With increased production and harvesting costs for hay this year, producers in Wheeler County should do everything possible to make certain their hay is of high quality.

High rates of fertilization and harvesting at an early stage of growth are the main factors for producing high quality hay.

Fertilizer is a major cost for producing high quality hay. Due to increased costs and limited supplies of fertilizer, each producer should make a special effort to utilize fertilizer efficiently by harvesting hay at the correct stage of growth.

As hay crops begin to mature, quality begins to decline. Most hay crops should be harvested before seed heads begin to form.

Costs for fuel, equipment, wire, twine and other inputs have also increased considerably during the past year, thus raising harvest expenses. In addition, many of these items are in limited supply. This makes it all the more important to harvest high quality hay.

All you ever wanted to know about plant diseases is contained in the new "Texas Plant Disease Handbook." The handbook has been prepared by plant pathologists for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and contains disease descriptions and approved chemical control recommendations for all major crops and ornamentals.

Sections of the handbook are tabbed for easy reference and include cereal crops, fiber and oil crops, forages, sugar crops, vegetables, fruits, nuts, flowers, shrubs, lawn and turf, and trees. The handbook also features a complete section on chemical disease control, with a listing of chemicals approved by the Environmental Protection Agency.

Home notes that the handbook, which is in the form of a loose-leaf binder, will be updated periodically. At present a section on resistant varieties is being developed. Information on the handbook is available from the Extension Plant Pathology Section, Plant Science Building, Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas 77843.

A copy is on hand in the County Extension office if you would like to see a copy.

Recently-enacted federal legislation raised the minimum wage for farm workers who are covered from the present \$1.30 to \$1.60 an hour, effective May 1.

The minimum wage will increase to \$1.80 on Jan. 1, 1975; to \$2.00 on Jan. 1, 1976; to \$2.20 on January 1, 1977; and to \$2.30 on January 1, 1978.

The differential in minimum wage for agriculture and non-agriculture is wiped out by 1978.

The newly-enacted amendments to the Fair Labor standards Act do not change the exemption of agriculture from overtime requirement of the '500 man-day' test for coverage of agricultural employers.

Each farmer should examine his records to determine whether he hired as much as 500 man-days of agricultural labor in any quarter of 1973. If so, the farmer is obligated to pay at least the minimum wage to all labor in 1974.

Covered farm employers need to keep the new minimum wage requirements in mind in recruiting workers for this summer. Also effective May 1, certain domestic service workers were covered by the minimum wage law for the first time. In general, such a worker is covered if employed for a total of more than eight hours in a work week, even if the employment occurs in more than one household.

However, domestic workers are not covered if employed on a casual basis for babysitting or companionship services for individuals who, because of age of infirmity, are unable to care for themselves.

The minimum rate for newly covered domestic workers is \$1.90 an hour. It will increase to \$2.00 on January 1, 1977.

For non-agricultural employees covered before 1966, the minimum wage increased from the present \$1.60 to \$2.00 on hour on May 1.

Next January 1, it will go up to \$2.10, and a year later, to \$2.30.

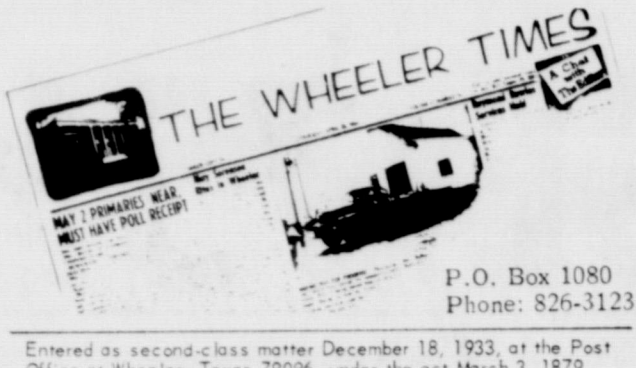

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# KING'S KOMMENTS

With increased production and harvesting costs for hay this year, producers in Wheeler County should do everything possible to make certain their hay is of high quality. High rates of fertilization and harvesting at an early stage of growth are the main factors for producing high quality hay.

Fertilizer is a major cost for producing high quality hay. Due to increased costs and limited supplies of fertilizer, each producer should make a special effort to utilize fertilizer efficiently by harvesting hay at the correct stage of growth.

As hay crops begin to mature, quality begins to decline. Most hay crops should be harvested before seed heads begin to form. Costs for fuel, equipment, wire, twine and other inputs have also increased considerably during the past year, thus raising harvest expenses. In addition, many of these items are in limited supply. This makes it all the more important to harvest high quality hay.

All you ever wanted to know about plant diseases is contained in the new "Texas Plant Disease Handbook." The handbook has been prepared by plant pathologists for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and contains disease descriptions and approved chemical control recommendations for all major crops and ornamentals.

Sections of the handbook are tabbed for easy reference and include cereal crops, fiber and oil crops, forages, sugar crops, vegetables, fruits, nuts, flowers, shrubs, lawn and turf, and trees. The handbook also features a complete section on chemical disease control, with a listing of chemicals approved by the Environmental Protection Agency.

Horne notes that the handbook, which is in the form of a looseleaf binder, will be updated periodically. At present a section on resistant varieties is being developed. Information on the handbook is available from the Extension Plant Pathology Section, Plant Science Building, Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas 77843.

A copy is on hand in the County Extension office if you would like to see a copy.

Recently-enacted federal legislation raised the minimum wage for farm workers who are covered from the present \$1.30 to \$1.60 an hour, effective May 1.

The minimum wage will increase to \$1.80 on Jan. 1, 1975; to \$2.00 on Jan. 1, 1976; to \$2.20 on January 1, 1977; and to \$2.30 on January 1, 1978.

The differential in minimum wage for agriculture and non-agriculture is wiped out by 1978.

The newly-enacted amendments to the Fair Labor standards Act to not change the exemption of agriculture from overtime requirement of the '500 man-day' test for coverage of agricultural employees.

Each farmer should examine his records to determine whether he hired as much as 500 man-days of agricultural labor in any quarter of 1973. If so, the farmer is obligated to pay at least the minimum wage to all labor in 1974.

Covered farm employees need to keep the new minimum wage requirements in mind in recruiting workers for this summer.

Also effective May 1, certain domestic service workers were covered by the minimum wage law for the first time. In general, such a worker is covered if employed for a total of more than eight hours in a work week, even if the employment occurs in more than one household.

However, domestic workers are not covered if employed on a casual basis for babysitting or companionship services for individuals who, because of age of infirmity, are unable to care for themselves.

The minimum rate for newly covered domestic workers is \$1.90 an hour. It will increase to \$2.00 on January 1, 1977.

For non-agricultural employees covered before 1966, the minimum wage increased from the present \$1.60 to \$2.00 an hour on May 1. Next January 1, it will go up to \$2.10, and a year later, to \$2.30.

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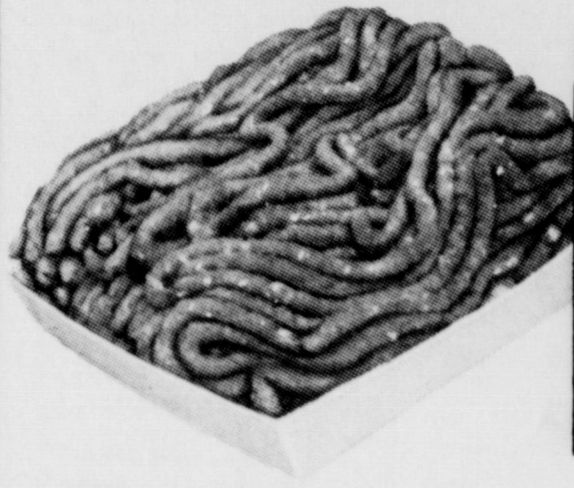
