MOBEETIE OLD SETTLERS GATHER SEPTEMBER 3

Annual picnic and Settlers Reunion will be held on Labor Day at the old jail under the arbor. Events will begin at 10 a.m. and a free barbecue will be served at noon. Calvin Stuart of Mobeetie said everyone is expected to attend the festival. A recent meeting of the Historical Development Committee of Old Mobeetie decided to restore the old town as it was between 1876 to 1900. A committee spokesman said the town is to be restored to its original site. The street will run north-south from the courthouse square, where the old jail still stands. The street will run north to the Main Street, where the original flag pole was hauled into Ft. Mobeetie to further the cause of

the restoration of the old town, the committee for the Daughters of the Mobeetie Pioneers is asking for donations of white elephants and arts and crafts to be sold from their booth and for donations of cakes for an auction. The G.W. Seay estate has donated to the Old Mobeetie Restoration Association 13 lots in the old town directly opposite the old jail, but more donations of lots in the old town still are needed. The old jail has been donated to the association by the American Legion of Mobeetie. Speakers at the picnic will be Robert Finney of Pampa and Kent Sims of Wheeler. Wheeler County Sheriff Bus Dorman and his string quartet will provide entertainment. The next Historical Development committee meeting will be held at 5 P.M. on Sept. 10 at the Church of Christ building.

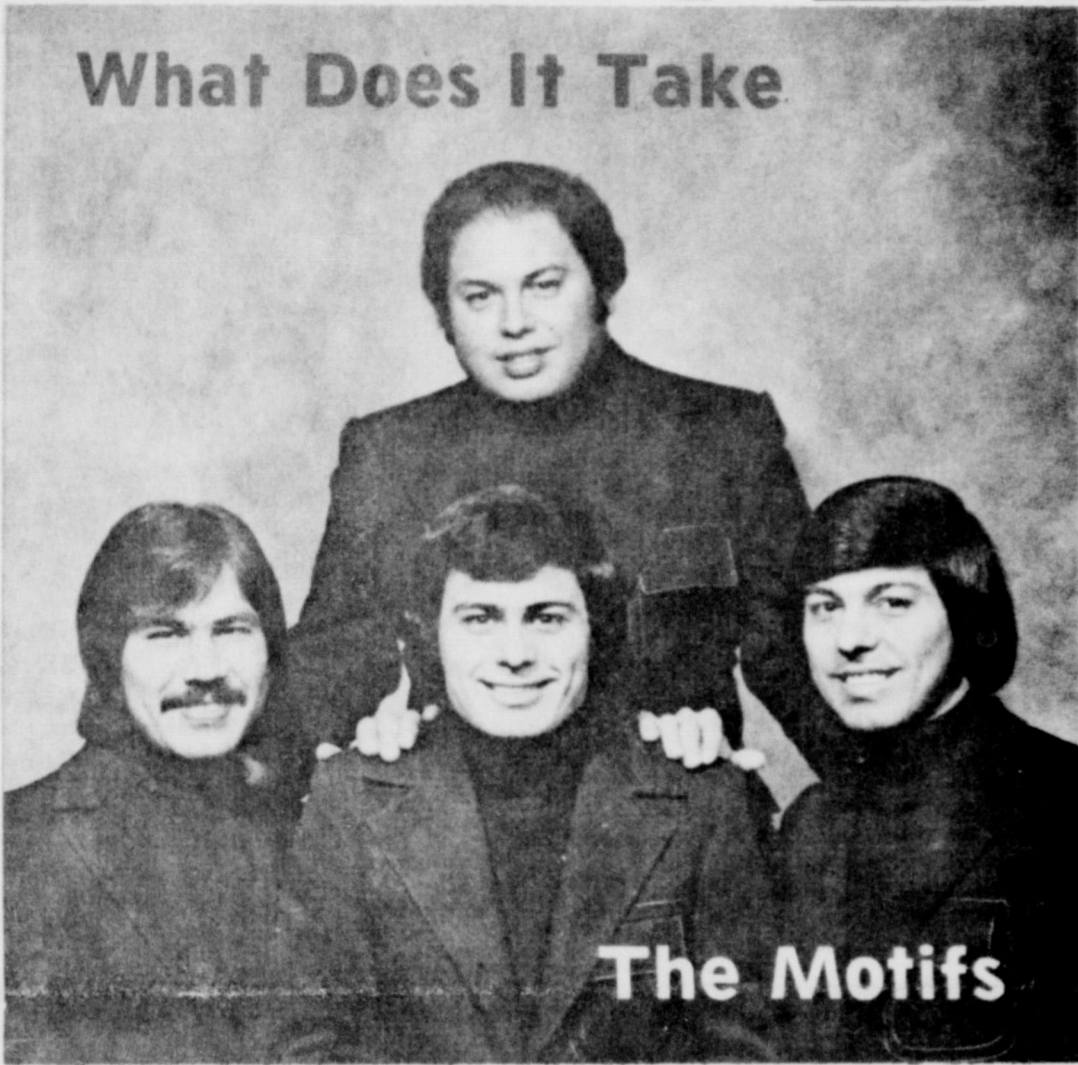
MUSTANGS TO SCRIMMAGE GROOM THURSDAY AT NICHOLSON FIELD

The regular meeting of the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce was held Tuesday evening. Two types of Christmas decoration for the City were on display; a representative of the company selling the commercial decorations was present to discuss the cost and financing of the display. Jeff Bell, representing the Minnesota Co. had toured Wheeler and selected 16 possible locations over town for the pole mounted decorations. The type decorations he proposed would not be bulky and would be easier to maintain and install than previously owned ornaments.

The project is also to be brought before the City Council to check the possibility of their cooperation in the project. 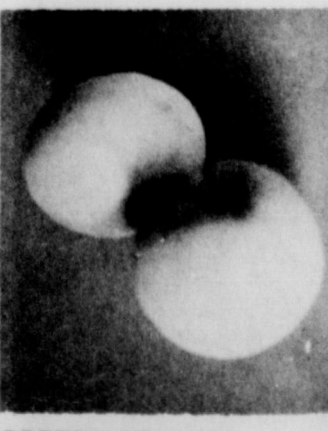

According to the records of the local Draft Board, some 18-year old men have failed to register. Paul Topper, member of the Draft Board, reports young men may now register at the District Clerk's office in Wheeler in addition to the usual places. A young man approaching the age of 18 has 60 days in which to register with the draft board. He may register 30 days prior to his birthday or 30 days after his birthday. Failure to do so will result in a penalty. Even though the induction into service has been terminated, registration is still required. Those 18-year-olds, who have not registered, are urged to do so immediately.

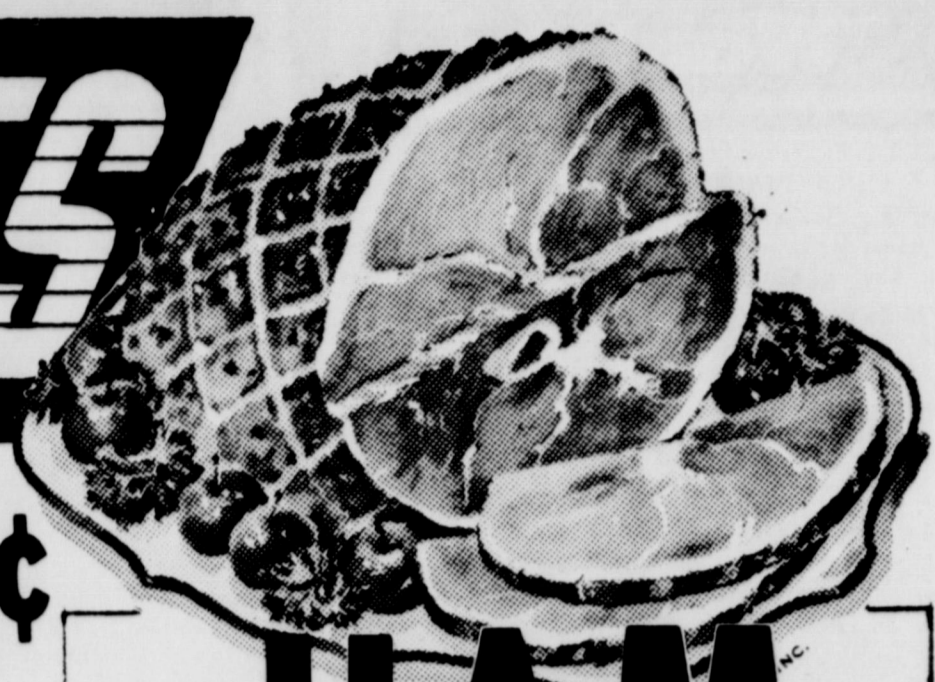

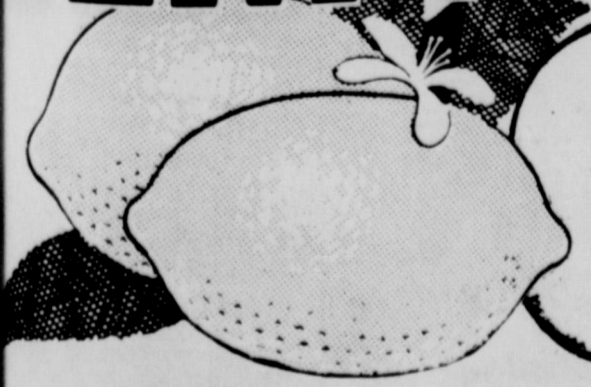

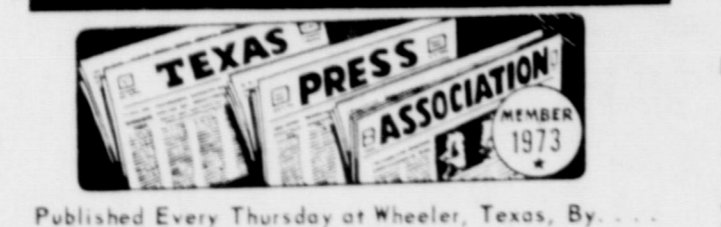

CHATS WITH GLORIA

If there's one thing Wheeler County has, it's good cooks! Mrs. Sandra Morgan of Shamrock would like to share with you one of her favorite recipes for this season of the year.

Wild Plum Cake
1 cup shortening
2 cups sugar
2 cups plum pulp
3 cups flour
3 teaspoons soda
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon allspice
1 cup pecans
1 cup raisins

Mix shortening, sugar, and plum pulp. Sift flour, spices salt and soda together and add to first mixture. Fold in pecans and raisins. Bake in 3 greased cake pans. Cook at 325 for 30 minutes when inserted tooth pick comes out clean.

Mrs. Morgan uses her prune cake frosting on this plum cake, and it is delicious.

Sour Cream Filling
2 eggs well beaten
1/2 cup sour cream
1 cup cooked prunes
1 cup sugar
2 tablespoons margarine
pinch of salt

Cook together in double boiler until thick, add teaspoon vanilla and 1/2 cup nuts, mix well.

Mrs. Morgan says she makes out the pulp of one quart jar of plums and runs it through a sieve to remove the seeds. She uses pulp and juice about the consistency of plum or apple butter.

Select well-netted melons. Netting is a normal growth characteristic for most varieties. D - for depression. Choose a melon with a depression at the stem end. This depressed scar - where the melon joined the vine - means it was left on the vine until practically mature. Softness at the blossom end doesn't necessarily indicate ripeness or sweetness - several other customers may have tried this "technique" before you bruised it.

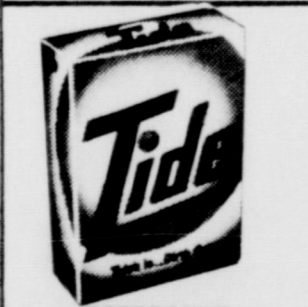
