MEADOWS, STRIBLING SHOW THE CHAMPION, RESERVE CHAMPIONS

STEVE DOLLAR IS WINNER OF SHOWMANSHIP AWARD AT SHOW

Eddie Meadows from the Biscoe FFA Chapter showed the Grand Champion Barrow in the 1968 Wheeler County Pig Show at Wheeler March 2. Vanpool-Burton Ford Motor Company paid Eddie seventy-five cents a pound for his 200 pound crossbred barrow for a grand total of \$150.

Buddy Stribling of the Mobeetie FFA Chapter took Reserve Champion honors with his 200 pound Hampshire gilt selling it to H & H Milling Company of Wheeler for \$50 a pound.

Spirited bidding at the auction following the show resulted in buyers paying nearly two

thousand dollars for twenty pigs. The prices received by the 4-H & FFA members participating averaged a little over forty-four cents a pound and an average price per head of nearly ninety-five dollars. Ten blue ribbons, 9 reds and 7 white ribbons were awarded the 27 contestants.

FHA Finances Home Improvement

More than 72 rural people in Wheeler County have new or vastly improved homes as a result of \$144,180 in insured loan funds advanced through Farmer's Home Administration in the past two years, John L. Manning local County Supervisor of the supervised credit agency reported today.

Approximately \$67,760 was advanced in 1967. The rural housing program was greatly expanded in 1965 when, as part of President Lyndon B. Johnson's effort to strengthen rural America, the financing of the loans was switched from federal to private sources. Practically all of the rural housing loan funds now come from private sources on an insured basis.

The construction took place as part of this credit program provided 1,084 man-days of employment for carpenters, plumbers, electricians and masons.

In addition, the housing funds circulating through the county gave the local economy a \$1,092,260 boost.

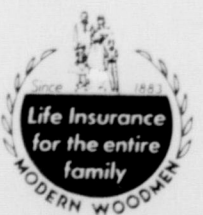

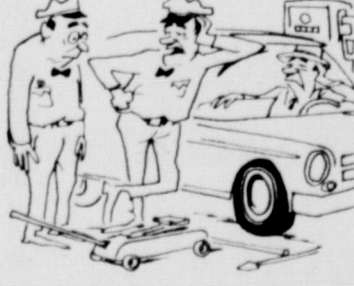

Small farmers are demonstrating increasing interest in developing grazing associations to increase their livestock production.

John L. Manning, County supervisor for the Farmers Home Administration, said this week:

"This relatively new loan program," Manning said, "makes it possible for family farmers and ranchers to acquire needed grazing land that they could not individually afford. It often provides their only opportunity to remain in family farming on a profitable basis."

He explained that a group of family farmers may form a nonprofit association, find desirable acreage, and, if qualified, obtain a loan for not more than 40 years at a 5 percent interest rate insured by the Farmers Home Administration.

In a recent case, five dairymen, each in need of additional pasture land, found a 279 acre farm for sale. Though none could finance its purchase individually, they organized an association and arranged a loan. Now they are developing the open land for grazing.

Manning noted that the entire community benefits from such associations because its members have increased their purchasing power which strengthens the local economy. Though the membership of an association may change, the land remains in control of family farmers and on local tax rolls.
