





HOMESTEAD **EXEMPTIONS MAY** LOWER PROPERTY **TAXES**

A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. For example, if your home is, valued at \$50,000. and your receive a \$5,000. general homestead exemption your home will be taxed as if it were worth \$45,000.

You qualify for a homestead exemption if you owned your home on January 1st and used it as your primary residence on that date. Mobile Homes are included.

Additional exemptions are available to homeowners who are disabled or age 65 and over. Those who receive the over-65 exemption also qualify for a ceiling on their school tax. Wheeler County and both hospital districts offer optional homestead exemptions.

If you received a homestead exemption on your home last year you need not reapply for 1996 unless you turned 65 or became disabled before January 1st. File a new application for 1996 if you've moved to a different home.

The last day to file is April 30, 1996. Forms are., available at the Appraisal District office, courthouse square,







Extension Update By Joan Gray, CEA-HE

> **GETTING RID OF SUGAR** CALORIES

Every one-fourth cup of sugar, brown or white, adds close to 200 empty calories to your recipes. You can adapt many recipes by cutting the amount of sugar called for by 24 percent to 50 percent. 

From The Minister's Desk: The New Testament records that

"And moved with compassion, He stretched out His hand, and touched him, and said to him,"I am willing; be cleasned. "And immediately the leprosy left him and he was cleasned.(verses 40 -42)

Did you notice that this text says that Jesus "--stretched out His hand, and touched--"the leper ? Why did Jesus touch him? Jesus could have healed this leper and not touched him. Co. Agent Advises: Test Soil Before Fertilizing

Service has launched the 1996 Soil Test Campaign. Homeowners should consider some things before buying fertilizer for the coming season. Hundreds of tons of fertilizer are applied on Texas lawns every year without knowing what kind and how much is needed for their individual lawns. Just as too much water creates problems for a lawn, too much fertilizer also can be damaging. If a lawn received more nutrients (fertilizer) than it can use, the excess may run off and contaminate surface water or ground water. Each lawn is made up of thousands of grass plants. Some soils have enough natural fertility to keep your lawn growing well, others don't. Plants use water and the nutrients they get from the air and soil to manufacture their own food. This process is dependent on a steady supply of nutrients, primarily from the soil itself. One key to a lush, green lawn is timely application of the right fertilizer.

"Soil Test now to insure a healthy lawn this spring" said Soil Chemist Dr. Tony Provin who directs the Texas A&M Soil, Water and Forage Testing Lab in College Station. "Odds are that it will need some fertilizer, but probably less than you think. Find out for sure with a Soil Test. With the everincreasing environmental awareness of contamination of our natural re-

The Extension Service is encouraging homeowners to pick up a new SOIL TEST kit from county extension offices. The kit contains simple directions, a plastic bag for the soil sample, and information card and prepaid mailer. The \$13.00 cost covers the soil analysis, preparation of the report and postage. "For about the cost of one bag of fertilizer, you can get information that could save you money on fertilizer expense," said Provin. Allow five working days to receive your

personal soil test lab results. "The report tells you what nutrients are already in your soil and which formula of fertilizer, if any, to use, and how much," said Don King, County Agent. "The report both recommends how much fertilizer to apply at first, as well as the rest of the year. Use your SOIL TEST report when you buy fertilizer. The recommendations are based on individual results rather than geographic areas.

Part B Enrollment A number of calls have been received from people who have read about the annual open enrollment period for Medicare Part B and wonder if they will be subject to the premium penalty if they enroll after their first chance to do so at age 65. The answer is generally yes, but there is an


exception. The three-month general open enrollment period from January to March 31 is for people 65 or over who do not have Part B Medicare coverage, which supplements Medicare Part A Hospital Insurance with doctor bill coverage. This period is to give you a second chance if you did not enroll when you were first eligible or you dropped your coverage. Most delayed enrollees pay a 10 percent surcharge for each year they could have enrolled but did not.

However, there is a special enrollment period if you or your spouse is working. You may be able to delay enrollment in Part B without paying a premium penalty or waiting for a general enrollment period. You can enroll in Part B during the eight-month special enrollment period if you have group health plan coverage from that current employment at the time you first became eligible for Medicare. This special enrollment period begins with the month employment ends or the month your group health plan coverage ends, which ever comes first. Part B coverage, also called

"medical insurance," helps pay for doctors' care, outpatient hospital visits, and other medical services. People are offered the option of signing up for Part B at the same time they are automatically enrolled in Medicare's Part A. (hospital insurance) prograom. The basic monthly premium is \$42.50 People who want to sign up for

Part B Medicare coverage should call a Social Security office or the toll-free number 1-800-772-1213.
