55MPH SPEED LIMIT TAKES EFFECT SUNDAY, JANUARY 20 IN TEXAS

The Texas Highway Com-
mission today set a statewide
maximum speed limit of 55
miles per hour, effective at
12:01 a.m., Sunday, Janu-
ary 20.

The action was taken in
keeping with the law passed
by the recent special ses-
sion of the Texas Legisla-
ture, empowering the Com-
mission to set lower speed
limits to comply with federal
energy saving actions.

Under the terms of the
Emergency Highway Energy
Conservation Act signed by
the President January 2, a
state not establishing a 55
m.p.h. maximum speed limit
would not receive its share
of federal highway construc-
tion funds.

Federal taxes on items re-
lated to the operation of motor
vehicles - notably a four-cen-
ts-per-gallon levy on gaso-
line - go into the Federal
Highway Trust Fund. These
funds are apportioned back
to the state for the federal
government's share of high-
way construction.

Texas' share amounts to
some \$240 million annually
which would be withheld if
the lower speed limit were
not set by early March.

Today's action is subject
to review within eight days
by Governor Dolph Briscoe.
The lower speed limits will
apply to all highways in the
state, including highways
under the control of the Tex-
as Turnpike Authority, cities
and counties. First Add,
55 m.p.h. Speed Limits Set,
Austin x x x counties.

New speed limit signs re-
placing the old 70-m.p.h.
maximum speed limit on the
State's major highways, will
be in place by the effective
date. The Highway Depart-
ment will begin immediately
the task of making and post-
ing the new signs.

Community Loans Are Available

Small rural communities
will soon have increased fed-
eral support to update or de-
velop needed facilities, accor-
ding to announcement to-
day by Mr. J. Lynn Futch,
Director of the U. S. Depart-
ment of Agriculture's Farm-
ers Home Administration pro-
grams in Texas.

State Director Futch said
FHA can make credit avail-
able to small rural towns for
a wide range of community
facilities such as industrial
parks, streets, fire fighting
equipment, ambulance ser-
vices, community centers and
even for community recrea-
tion.

The new program author-
ized under provisions of the
1972 Rural Development Act,
supplements the Farmer Home
Administration's water and
waste disposal loan program.

"We are constantly striv-
ing to improve the quality of
life in our state's small towns
and outlying communities,"
Mr. Futch said. "Our water
and sewer loan program has
financed over 763 systems
with more than \$134 million
and benefited 532,000 rural
people since the start of the
program. Now we are in po-
sition to assist with more di-
verse projects."

Most of the loans are ex-
pected to be made to public
bodies such as towns up to
10,000 population, counties
and some special purpose
districts, Mr. Futch said.
Some assistance may go to
nonprofit corporations, pro-
vided they prepare plans for
adequate repayment.

Mr. Futch pointed out that
priority will be given to mun-
icipal borrowers in commu-
nities smaller than 5,500 peo-
ple to improve a deteriorating
water supply or to enlarge or
modify a water system or an
inadequate sewer system.
Proposed plans must be con-
sistent with areawide develop-
ment plans.

Adult Education Classes Available

Sweetwater area adults
who have not completed school
who are interested in an
Adult Education Class are
to contact the Superintendent
of Schools, either by
phone or personally at the
Sweetwater School. If any
persons interested in this
program contact should be
made by Jan. 25. There
are a certain number to have
this class. Classes are free -
no charges will be made for
books or tuition.

Instruction will be pro-
vided by certified teachers in
the subjects: Reading, Writ-
ing, Spelling, English Gram-
mar, Literature, Math, His-
tory, Government, Health, Ec-
onomics and Job Opportun-
ities. Most classes are held
two nights a week but indi-
vidualized courses of study can
be arranged for those persons
who cannot attend classes
regularly.

These classes are pro-
vided as a joint effort of the
Adult Learning Center in
Elk City, Sweetwater Public
Schools and the Federal Gov-
ernment for the advancement
of education in Beckham Cou-
nty and the adjoining areas
of surrounding counties.

The Adult Education Cl-
asses and the Adult Learn-
ing Center is an Official CED
Testing Center for persons
in western Oklahoma. Any
Oklahoma resident who is
18 years or older, who has
not completed high school
and who has been out of school
for one year may be eli-
gible to earn a Highschool
Equivalency Certificate.
This certificate can be used
to enter most colleges and
to open doors to better jobs.

CHATS WITH GLORIA

Today I did a little research on my own, and I thought I would share it with you. I've always heard that instant tea is more expensive to use than tea leaves. So I bought a large jar (3 oz.) of instant tea and a (8 oz.) box of tea leaves, and counted how many half gallons of tea each would make. The instant tea made 23 pitchers of tea at 4¢ a pitcher. The tea leaves made 35 pitchers of tea at 2¢ a pitcher. Therefore, for the convenience of instant tea you are paying twice as much money.

Another thing I have wondered about as I bought eggs is whether it is worth it to buy large eggs. I did a little research and found that if there is more than 7¢ difference, the medium eggs are a better buy. If there is less than a 7¢ difference, the large eggs are a better value. Did you know shell eggs kept at room temperature (70 to 80 degrees F.) will lose more quality in one day than in one week under refrigeration? At refrigeration temperature eggs retain their inherent high-quality for several weeks.

Buy fresh, clean, sound shelled eggs from refrigerated display cases and refrigerate them promptly at home. The carton in which eggs are purchased is an excellent refrigerator container. It keeps the eggs covered and holds them in the best position - with large ends up. This helps keep the yolks centered.

Since food preparation may require quite a bit of fuel, wise homemakers are learning methods to make the most of what's used. For instance when cooking on top of the range, use moderate to low heat.

Avoiding high heat not only conserves fuel, it also keeps pots and pans in better condition. Many of today's cooking utensil manufacturers recommend low to medium heat, only.

Also fully utilize all heat energy - including what's stored during the cooking process. To do this, simply turn off the heat a few minutes early. Stored-up heat in the oven or on the range top continues the cooking process for a few minutes.

In addition, make maximum use of the oven. Instead of just baking one thing, prepare several foods at once. For example, baked pot-

atoes, meat loaf and vegetable casserole can be prepared in the oven at the same temperature. Thus, only one heat source is used to prepare a meal.

When you want to remove lint or particles of dust from a garment, instead of using a clothes brush, use a dry sponge to brush the garment. You will be amazed at the speedy job it does. You can carry a small sponge in your purse to help keep your dark clothes neat.

Dredge fruit and nuts in some of the flour mixture before adding them to the cake batter. It will prevent them from sinking to the bottom.

There are definite economic advantages to the crop producer using the manure fertilization system. Initial cost, of course, and also the economies of the methods of application. No special equipment is required: the material is deep plowed into the field and application can be made at the time of working fields prior to planting (the farther in advance of planting the better). Thus, fertilization occurs as a course of normal operation, with standard plowing equipment, resulting in fewer man hours required and, particularly important in light of the energy crisis, less fuel consumption. The table below lists the nutrient content of manure sampled from 23 feedlots on the Texas High Plains, giving the range, average percentages and average pounds of nutrients present in ten tons:
