

55MPH SPEED LIMIT TAKES EFFECT SUDNDAY, JANUARY 20 IN TEXAS

The Texas Highway Commission today set a statewide maximum speed limit of 55 miles per hour, effective at 12:01 a.m., Sunday, January 20.

The action was taken in keeping with the law passed by the recent special session of the Texas Legislature, empowering the Commission to set lower speed limits to comply with federal energy saving actions.

Under the terms of the Emergency Highway Energy Conservation Act signed by the President January 2, a state not establishing a 55 m.p.h. maximum speed limit would not receive its share of federal highway construction funds.

Federal taxes on items related to the operation of motor vehicles - notably a fourcents-per-gallon levy on gasoline - go into the Federal Highway Trust Fund. These funds are apportioned back to the state for the federal government's share of highway construction.

Texas' share amounts to some \$240 million annually which would be withheld if the lower speed limit were not set by early March.

Today's action is subject to review within eight days by Governor Dolph Briscoe. The lower speed limits will apply to all highways in the state, including highways under the control of the Jexas Tumpike Authority, cities and counties. First Add, 55 m.p.h. Speed Limits Set, Austin x x x counties.

New speed limit signs replacing the old 70-m.p.h. maximum speed limit on the State's major highways, will be in place by the effective date. The Highway Department will begin immediately the task of making and posting the new signs.

Adult Education Classes Available

Sweetwater area adults who have not completed school who are interested in an Adult Education Class are to contact the Superintendent of Schools, either by phone or personally at the Sweetwater School. If any persons interested in this program contact should be made by Jan. 25. There are a certain number to have this class. Classes are free - no charges will be made for books or tuition.

Instruction will be provided by certified teachers in the subjects: Reading, Writing, Spelling, English Gram mar, Literature, Math, History, Government, Health, Economics and Job Opportunities. Most classes are held two nights a week but individualized corses of study can be arranged for those persons who cannot attend classes regulary.

These classes are provided as a joint effort of the Adult Learning Center in Elk City, Sweetwater Public Schools and the Federal Goverment for the advancement of education in Beckham County and the adjoining areas of surrounding counties.

The Adult Education Classes and the Adult Learning Center is an Official CED Testing Center for persons in western Oklahoma. Any Oklahoma resident who is 18 years or older, who has not completed high school and who has been out of school for one year may be eligible to earn a Highschool Equivalency Certificate. This certificate can be used to enter most colleges and to open doors to better jobs. Tell your friends about






