TRASH COLLECTION IS SMOOTH OPERATION FOR NEW SERVICE

Monday, March 4, was the first day for Wheeler residents to use the new trash collecting service which will eventually eliminate burning in Wheeler. The stopping of burning trash is necessary to comply with federal regulations effective July 1.

Sheldon Ellis of Customized Service Co., Inc. of Amarillo reported the trash pick-up Monday morning in Wheeler ran smoothly with the work completed by noon.

Those having questions concerning the trash hauling, may call the city office

at 826-3222. If the question can not be answered at that time, it will be referred to Mr. Ellis and the call returned.

Mr. Ellis leased the City Dump and it will be fenced and locked; however those having extra trash they would like to carry to the dump may do so free of charge until April 1. After the dump is fenced, the hours and cost for use of the dump will be posted at the gate.

Trash is to be bagged in 32 gallon plastic bags and placed on the front lawns Monday morning by 9:00.

Children need three or more cups of milk each day. Teenagers should drink four or more and even us old folks should drink two or more glasses of milk every day. There are other ways to fill this need besides milk. The following are alternates for 1 cup of milk: 1 1/2 ounces of Cheddar cheese, 15 ounces of cream cheese, 11 ounces of cottage cheese (use more if desired), 1 2/3 cups of ice cream, 3 cups of milk sherbet, in food prepared with milk, each serving can provide: 1/2 - 1 cup milk in cream soups, 1/4 to 1/2 cup of milk in scalloped or creamed vegetables, fish, eggs, or meat. 1/4 to 2/3 cups of milk in desserts such as puddings, custards, and cream pies.
Last but certainly not least

here in West Texas is the meat group. Each day we need two or more servings of protein food. Included are beef, veal, pork, lamb, poultry, fish, eggs, dry beans dry peas, and nuts. It is best to eat plant and animal proteins for more complete proteins. Don't forget peanut butter, especially with our high meat protein.
