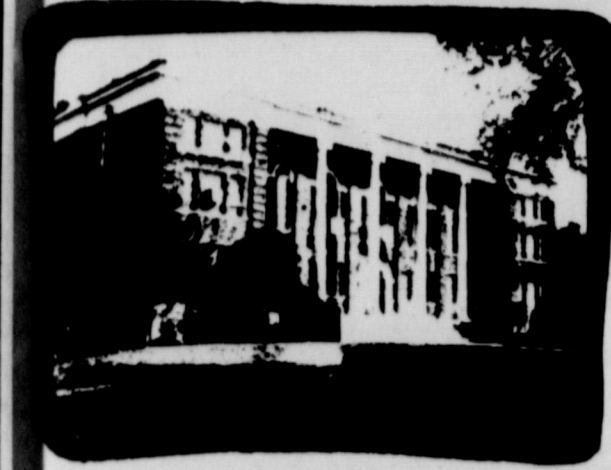

55mph SPEED LIMIT NOW IN EFFECT ON TEXAS HIWAY

If you see a vehicle going more than 55 miles per hour on a Texas highway after 12:01 a.m. Sunday (January 20) either is a police, fire or other emergency vehicle — or it is breaking the speed limit.

The new statewide 55 m.p.h. maximum speed limit goes into effect at one minute after midnight for all classes of vehicles.

Contrary to some circulated reports, there are no exemptions. The research firms in South Texas did ask at a public hearing to be exempted from the lower speed limits. However, the request was rejected on by the Highway Commission.

Soil Conservation Data Available To Area Farmers

Farmers concerned with using the best available acreage to increase their crop-land can get valuable data from a soil survey, Edward E. Thomas, state conservationist for the U. S. Soil Conservation Service, said today.

"Soil survey field work has been completed for Wheeler County," Thomas said. "And the data is available to anyone making land use decisions."

"With a soil survey map, you can read the land like a book," said Thomas. "Some soils are ideal for a particular crop. Others are better off in another crop, or left in grass, trees, or as wetland. And on some soils, the owner can choose between pasture, trees, or crops."

"The point is that a great deal of soil information is available to farmers and other land users. Even where surveys are not yet completed, the Soil Conservation Service—working through local conservation districts—often can provide at least partial soils data to anyone considering a change in land use."

Thomas added, "Although farmers are the biggest group of users, soil survey information is also very helpful to engineers and urban land use planners who need to know about drainage patterns, depth to bedrock, foundation hazards, or other uses being planned for them. A number of cities in Texas have made changes in their land use plans after checking a soil map—and as a result, they saved a great deal of money in construction costs."

Local soil survey maps and information can be obtained from the nearest Soil Conservation Service office.

Adult Education Classes Available

Wheeler area adults who have not completed high school who are interested in an adult education class are to contact the Wheeler County Supt. office here in Wheeler, Texas.

Classes are free—no charge will be made for books or tuition. Any person who is 18 years or older, who has not completed high school and has been out of school one year may be eligible to earn a high school equivalency certificate. The certificate can be used to enter most colleges and to open doors to better jobs.

Beginning Education classes as well as classes for those almost ready for the G.E.D. were held last fall. 35 adults enrolled and 12 of these are ready to take the G.E.D..

Classes begin February 5th at 7:00 p.m.. Classes are held twice weekly for 8 weeks.

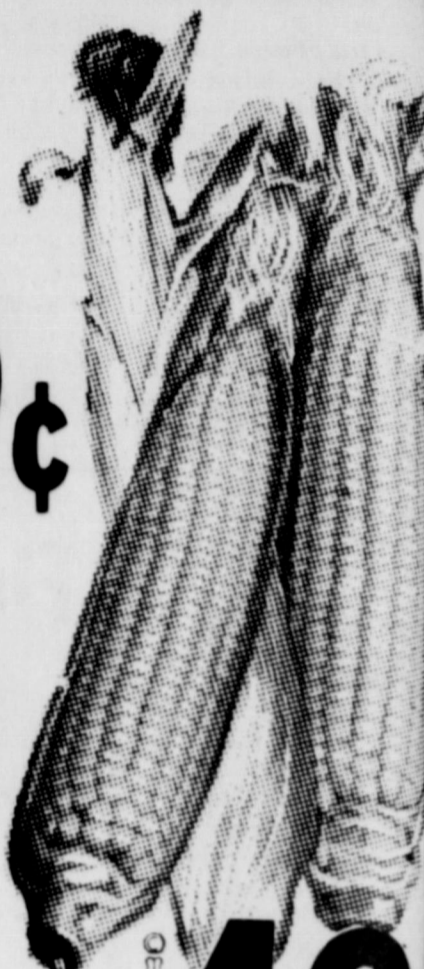

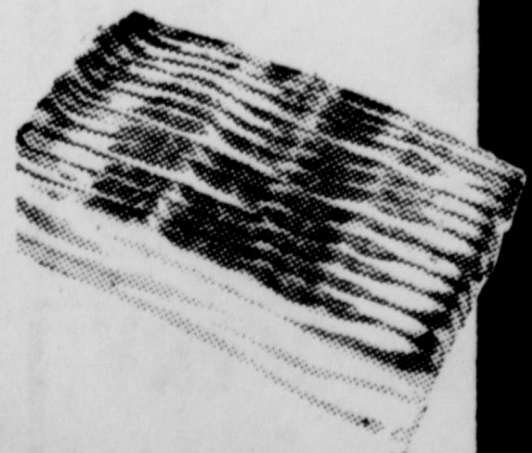
