energy saving directives. On January 2, the President signed into law the Emergency Highway Energy Conservation Act. Under it, a state not setting a maximum 55 m.p.h. speed limit could have its share of federal high way funds withheld. In Texas, that would have amounted to a loss of about \$240 million per year. Soil Conservation

#### Data Available To Area Farmers

Farmers concerned with using the best available acreage to increase their cropland can get valuable data from a soil survey, Edward E. Thomas, state conservationist for the U. S. Soil Conservation Service, said to-

"Soil survey field work has been completed for Wheeler County," Thomas said. "And the data is available to anyone making land use decisions."

"With a soil survey map, you can read the land like a book," said Thomas. "Some soils are ideal for a particular crop. Others are better off in another crop, or left in grass, trees, or as wetland. And on some soils, the owner can choose between

pasture, trees, or crops. The point is that a great deal of soil information is available to farmers and other land users. Even where surveys are not yet completed, the Soil Conservation Service--working through local conservation districtsoften can provide at least partial soils data to anyone considering a change in land

use." Thomas added, "Although farmers are the biggest group of users, soil survey information is also very helpful to engineers and urban land use planners who need to know about drainage patterns, depth to bedrock, foundation hazards, or other uses being planned for them. A number of cities

in Texas have made changes in their land use plans after checking a soil map--and as a result, they saved a great deal of money in construction costs."


