

COACH JIM BATEMAN RESIGNS; MOVING TO UVALDE HIGH SCHOOL

Coach Jim Bateman, athletic director and head football coach for the Wheeler Mustangs, announced this week that he was resigning

his position and accepting a job as assistant football coach at Uvalde High School. Coach Bateman came to

Wheeler from Breckenridge and after serving one year as assistant to Jake Cottrell, was elevated to the athletic director and head

football coach positions. In the four years that Bateman was the head mentor of the Mustangs, Wheeler compiled a 21-18-1

record and the Mustangs were in the thick of the district race three of those years.

"It was a hard decision to make to leave Wheeler and all of the fine people that we have been associated with but this good opportunity came along and I felt that I should take it", Coach Bateman said.

Bateman went on to say, "I couldn't ask for a bunch of young men to give any

more effort than these in Wheeler gave me for my four years as head coach and the Mustangs and their fans will always be tops with me and my family." Uvalde is the state champion in Class AAA in 1972 and was defeated in the zone playoff in 1973 by the eventual champion, Cuero.

tenance operations. A few plants thoughtfully selected for their interesting and changing form, texture and color may eliminate many hours of cleaning beds and clipping hedges. Be sure to consider future space requirements of a plant in relation to its proposed planting area. If the plant is going to require constant pruning to keep it in bounds, it would be better select another plant.

Eliminate unnecessary borders along drives and walks which tend to emphasize rather than hide these elements in the landscape. It is better to allow the lawn to meet the walk or drive.

To enjoy your garden rather than be a slave to it, have only one or two well-kept annual beds rather than numerous beds which require constant work to keep attractive. In selecting plants, consider the soil and climatic conditions in this area. It is much easier to select plants suited to a given area than to attempt to modify the soil and environment to suit a given plant. Native and adopted plants will provide more pleasure and enjoyment for the amount of care expended than any exotic plant.

KING'S KOMMENTS

By Joe Don King
County Extension Agent

Weeds are as much of a problem in home vegetable gardens as they are in large fields.

Besides harboring diseases and insects, weeds compete with crops for water, sunlight, soil nutrients and air.

The best method of eliminating them is still with the hoe. Hoeing is not only inexpensive but is accurate and effective as well.

The time to get rid of weeds is when they are small. The larger they get, the more damage they can do to vegetable crops.

Weeds around the base of plants should be hand pulled rather than hoed.

For those whose hands won't fit the hoe, here is a few alternatives; Mulches provide a mechanical barrier to weed emergence and keep light away from seedlings.

Herbicides have limited use, and their use must be highly selective in a mixed vegetable garden where different tolerance levels to the various weed-killers. If herbicides are used, be sure to consider the plants surrounding the area you intend to treat, follow application instructions carefully, and use the correct amounts of the chemical.

This information is supplied by Sam Cotner, Extension Vegetable Specialist.

Most farmers and ranchers neglect to use one of their most important management tools, farm and ranch business records.

After a couple of days of frustration at income tax time each year, many farmers resolve to keep better records the next year. However, after their tax forms are out, records are once again forgotten.

Good records aid the farm manager in locating strong and weak points in his operation. Proper analysis of the records provides the basis for profitable decisions which will help the farm manager reach his goals.

Good farm records will show which enterprises should be produced, while one enterprise might be making \$10,000, a second one might be losing \$2,000.

Being certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Texas Pork Producers Association, 2422 Tabo, Sherman, Texas 75090, proposes a referendum election on May 14, 1974 under provision of Article 55c, Vernon's Civil Statutes, on the proposition of whether or not the pork producers in the State of Texas shall assess themselves a maximum amount of 10 cents per head on all slaughter animals to be collected at the point of first processing or sale and to elect members of a 15 member commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment to be used for research, predator control, disease and insect control, education, and promotion designed to encourage the production, marketing, and use of pork.

The referendum and election will be held by mail ballot which will be provided to all eligible voters not later than 15 days prior to the election. Ballots must be mailed to the polling place at Sherman, Texas, before midnight on the date of the election.

Any person within this state engaged in the business of producing, or causing to be produced, slaughter hogs for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners, farmers and their tenants or sharecroppers, if such person should be required to pay an assessment proposed.

Any person qualified to vote at the referendum may place his name in nomination for membership on the proposed commodity producers board in application to the above organization signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum. Such applications must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date.

Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot prior to April 30, 1974 may obtain one at his local County Agent's Office.

CHATS WITH GLORIA

 It's just about time to start thinking about gardening. Our extension Office has lots of bulletins on various gardening techniques. Several people I have talked to plan to raise large gardens, and preserve food for the coming year. Do you know what kind of fertilizer to put on your garden? It really depends on your soil type and condition. Perhaps our bulletins could answer some of your questions.
 "Home" comes from the

 a home's bills haywire. If it's in a cold or drafty location, it can keep the furnace running while the rest of the house overheats.
 Or near a heat source, a thermostat can continue to read warm even if you are chilled.
 The best spot for a thermostat is on an inside wall away from appliances like lamps, radios and televisions, which give off heat.
 A thermostat can only sense temperature in its immediate area.
 So when relocating one, find a spot with temperature representative of the entire house.
 Then place thermostat three to four feet above the floor. This way little hands can't reach it - yet it's low enough to be unaffected by hot air which collects near the ceiling.
 Proper thermostat placement should result in more accurate readings of indoor temperatures.

This is a tasty dish to serve one of these cool spring evenings. If you plan to serve several people you might want to double the recipe.
 5 slices bacon diced
 1/2 cup minced onion
 1/4 cup vinegar
 3 tablespoons sugar
 1/2 tsp crushed oregano
 1/2 teaspoon black pepper
 1/2 cup grated cheese
 1 tsp mustard
 2 tablespoons chopped green pepper
 1/2 cup diced celery
 3 cups cooked potatoes
 2 hard-cooked eggs, chopped
 Fry bacon until crisp. Add onion to bacon and fat and cook until lightly browned. Add vinegar, sugar, salt, oregano, pepper and mustard; boil 2 minutes. Pour hot mixture over mixture of potatoes, bacon, celery, green pepper and hard cooked eggs. Toss lightly. Turn into greased baking dish; top with cheese. Bake at 375 degrees about 15 minutes, or until cheese bubbles.
