

tenance operations. A few plants thoughtfully selected for their interesting and changing form, texture and color may eliminate many hours of cleaning beds and clipping hedges.

Be sure to consider future space requirements of a plant in relation to its proposed planting area. If the plant is going to require constant pruning to keep it in bounds, it would be better select another plant.

Eliminate unnecessary borders along drives and walks which tend to emphasize rather than hide these It is better to allow the lawn to meet the walk or

To enjoy your garden rather than be a slave to it, have only one or two well-kept annual beds rather than numerous beds which require constant work to keep attractive.

In selecting plants, consider the soil and climatic conditions in this area. It is much easier to select plants suited to a given area than to attempt to modify the soil and environment to suit a given plant.

Native and adapted plants will provide more pleasure and enjoyment for the amount of care expended than any exotic plant.





Misplaced Thermostat, Haywire Heating. A misplaced thermostat can drive a home's bills haywire. If it's in a cold or drafty location, it can keep the furnace running while the rest of the house overheats.

Or near a heat source, a thermostat can continue to read warm even if you are chilled.

The best spot for a thermostat is on an inside wall - away from appliances like lamps, radios and televisions, which give off heat.

A thermostat can only sense temperature in its immediate area.

So when relocating one, find a spot with temperature representative of the entire

Then place thermostat three to four feet above the floor. This way little hands can't reach it - yet it's low enough to be unaffected by hot air which collects near the ceiling.

Proper thermostat placement should result in more accurate readings of indoor




