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
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Spanish Class To Begin

Those in the surrounding area who are interested in studying the language may call Mrs. Porter's number, 826-3182, Wheeler.







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

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
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Mary Davis, Mustangette coach, presented the Best All-Around for the girls and the winner of the award was Janice Verden, a junior who played post forward.

disease problems and higher yields, all with much less work.

The cages can be canstructed from concrete reinforcing wire, hog wire or any other sturdy wire mesh that has open in gs of at least four to six inches and is three and -a-half to five feet wide. Cut and bend the mesh material into cylinders 16 to 20 inches in diameter, fasten the ends together and snip off the bottom rung so the cages can be pushed into the ground about six inches deep for support.

When using cages for growing tomatoes, space the plants about two-anda-half feet apart in the row and allow four to five feet between rows.

For home gardens plant a vining or semi vining type tomato variety such as Homestead, Rutgers, Walter, Porter or the small fruited Red Cherry.

After tomato plants have been set out in the garden, place a wire cage over each plant and make sure it is well anchored in to the ground. The plant will grow up through the cage and the wire mesh will support it. No suckering, pruning or training will be necessary. Ripe fruit can be picked through the cage openings. Ground rot and fruit cracking are often reduced with cage grown tomatoes. Cost of the cages will

vary from 30 to 50 certs each, but they can be stored and used year after year. Certain other crops such as cucumbers and pole beans can also be grown using the wire cage method.



home garden will go a long way toward insuring high yields of fresh, nutritous and tasty vegetables. Mulches can be composed of many materials, including straw, leaves, hay, sawdust, wood shavings, compost, paper and plastic sheeting. If organic mulches such as hay or compost are used, apply mulches such as black plastic or paper before planting but after fertilizing and watering. Do not use

mulches on dry or cold soils. Properly used mulches have many benefits. They

will conserve moisture by reducing the evaporation rate from the soil. They also provide for a more uniform soil temperature which will result in more rapid and healthy plant growth.

One of the most important advantages of mulching is that it helps control most weeds. This reduces the time and labor involved in weeding the garden plot. However, use care to make sure that the mulch material you use is itself weed free.

Another important advantage of mulching is that it will reduce losses caused from fruit rot. A conciderable amount of good food is lost because fruit, such as tomatoes and cucumbers are allowed to come in contact with the bare ground.

Materials such as cedar chips and wood chips add to the beauty of the landscape along with serving as a mulch. Mulches also mprove the soil by pro-
