## RUNOFF WATER DISCUSSED

The City Council of Wheeler met in regular session Monday evening, March 18. The water problem in the east edge of town, leasing of sewer grounds, seal coating streets, swimming pool and employees were the topics of discussion.

Mr. and Mrs. Joe Weatherly, Mr. and Mrs. Dick DeArment and Dr. Larry Barbour met with the council to discuss the water problem in the east edge of Wheeler. The recent rain in excess of 2" showed the problem to be getting increasingly worse on Reynolds, Stanley and Seventh streets. A solution to the problem was presented by Joe Weatherly which was later discussed by the council. The council voted to contact the people involved and determine what could be done to correct the problem.

The council voted to give a two-year lease to R. J.

Smith on the sewer property.

The paved streets are needing seal coating to protect them from the weather. It was decided to contact the engineering firm and have bids taken for the project.

Larry Tracy, manager of the swimming pool for the past two years, was rehired for the summer. Tracy is the local band director.

The council opened applications for the two job openings in the city work force. After reviewing the qualifications, Glen Gaines and Calvin Sechrist were employed to fill the vacancies. Gaines is an experienced maintainer operator which is presently needed by the city.

## KING'S KOMMENTS

Put leaves, grass clippings, table scraps and other waste material to work for you by building a compost pile.

"A compost pile is an excellent source of plant nutrients and is relatively easy to keep weed-free and odorless." It can provide valuable organic matter for use in vegetable gardens and flowers beds and for topdressing lawns.

To start a compost pit or pile, lay down two inches of soil in an area receiving

sunlight and sufficient air. Follow with two to six inches of waste material topped by one to two inches of manure or one or two cups of commercial fertilizer per square yard. Repeat this process to prevent a layered effect. Use a wire fence or lumber or other material to contain the compost pile.

Shape the top of the pile like a dish to facilitate wetting. Keep the material moist but not soggy. Turn the pile every five to six

weeks to hasten decomposition of the material.

Two compost piles, one for present use and the other to allow for decomposition, which requires four to eight months.

Fewer and fewer dogs are infected with rabies each year, but still a major threat to our health.

Now the threat comes mainly from wildlife. Over 80 per cent of the rabies cases reported in the United States during July and August 1973 involved wildlife. And the disease is most prevalent in hot weather.

Of 261 rabies cases confirmed by the Texas State Department of Health in 1973, 200 involved wildlife. Skunks were the animals most frequently found infected with the disease. Bats, foxes, raccoons, ring-tails and coyotes accounted for most of the other wildlife cases. The Texas Health Department confirmed 15 cases in horses, one in sheep and 23 in cattle last year as well as five in dogs and 17 in cats.

The disease is usually transmitted by the bite or lick of a rabid animal since

the virus is carried in the infected animal's saliva. Once in the body, the virus infiltrates the nerve fibers and attacks the nervous system, resulting in death if no treatment is given.

When infected with rabies, wildlife are a threat in areas of human habitation as well as in their native habitat. An infected wild animal may

### Pork Referendum and Producer Board Election

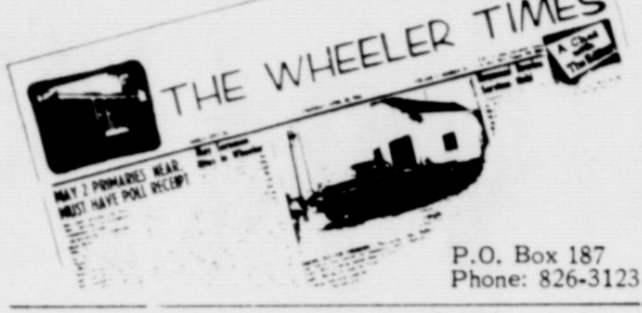
