The Lees have operated the business for the past 40 years with Mrs. Lee serving as manager for the past 21 years. The store closed at 6:00 p.m. Wednesday, March 20.

Mrs. Lee would like to slow down a little, but she wouldn't call it retired; the sale of the City Drug was the first step in that direction. She appreciates her customers of the past years and will miss greeting them each morning.

The City Drug presently serves as the bus stop for Continental Trailways. Arrangements for this service have not been announced. Hyland Weaver of Hyland's Pharmacy stated he will miss Lilliam; they have worked together and the purchase of the business was not to eliminate competition, but to make it possible for Lillian to "slow down". The business has been for sale for a period of time.

Mr. Brazil was a World War II Veteran and member of the Masonic Lodge.







Fewer and fewer dogs are infected with rabies each year, but still a major threat to our health.

Now the threat comes mainly from wildlife. Over 80 per cent of the rabies cases reported in the United States dring July and August 1973 involved wildlife. And the disease is most prevalent in hot, weather.

Of 261 rabies cases confirmed by the Texas State Department of Health in 1973, 200 involved wildlife. Skunks were the animals most frequently found infested with the disease. Bats, foxes, raccoons, ringtails and coyotes accounted for most of the other wildlife cases. The Texas Health Department confirmed 15 cases in horses, one in sheep and 23 in cattle last year as well as five in dogs and 17 in cats. The disease is usually


