## **Statement** of **Non-Discrimination**

"Greenbelt Electric Cooperative, Inc. has filed with the Federal Government a Compliance Assurance in which it assures the Rural Electrification Administration that it will comply fully with all requirements of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Rules and Regulations of the Department of Agriculture issued thereunder, to the end that no person in the United States shall, on the ground of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination in the conduct of its program and the operation of its facilities. Such complaint must be filed not later than 90 days after the alleged discrimination, or by such later date to which the Secretary of Agriculture or the Rural Electrification Administration extends the time for filing. Identity of complainants will be kept confidential except to the extent necessary to carry out the purposes of the Rules and Regulations.'

# CAPITAL STATE Highlights ^^°Sidelights

AUSTIN. Tex. - Secretary of State Mark White, Jr., disturbed over low voter participation in recent elections, is planning a massive, coordinated getout-the-vote campaign for the general election

White indicated he will seek to harmonize efforts of business, labor organizations. educational groups, the news media and lobbying interests to improve the turnout.

As chief Texas election officer. White is studying election systems used in other states, and he has outlined preliminary plans for a bi-partisan fall drive to stir the voters to action.

He has asked State Sen. O.H. (Ike) Harris, Dallas Republican, to assist with the initial contacts with groups whose assistance will be sought.

Only 30 per cent of eligible Texans took part in the May 4 primaries, and far fewer voted in the June 1 runoff.

White hopes to get a new registration push going and to encourage businesses to devote part of their promotional budgets to "innovative" get-out-thevote appeals. Labor, which traditionally conducts its own campaigns to get union members to the polls, will also be asked to join in the overall effort.

"People must be made aware of the danger of ignoring the political system," said White.

He said he may even recommend a system of sales or property tax credits for practicing voters.

REVISION "INSUR-ANCE" SOUGHT - Sen. Grant Jones of Abilene wants legislative powers to amend the constitution extended -- just in case the voters reject proposals of the Constitutional Convention.

Jones has offered a proposal which would give the legislature power to submit to voters constitutional revision proposals on an article-byarticle basis.

The Abilene lawmaker argues the legislature has gained expert knowledge of the constitution while sitting as a revision commission.

DIVIDENDS DUE -Allstate Insurance Company

TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION will pay \$4 million in dividends to auto policy holders whose policies expired between last October 3 and May 31, 1974.

The company bowed to State Insurance Board the suspended dividends.

An attorney for the company said a court battle over the issue might have lasted for years. Distribution of the dividends will be made "as soon as mechanically possible."



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

hoppers hatch from these eggs the following spring. These young gras shoppers feed in the hatching areas for several days before beginning to desperse to fields pastures and gardens. Apply ing control measures while the population is still fairly concentrated will reduce later damage to crops and

Grasshoppers are relatively easy to control when they are young but become inceeasingly difficult to control as they reach maturity. They are best controlled in their hatching areas before they begin to migrate over larger areas. Frequently, spot treatment of the hatching areas will prevent later wide spread damage.

Several insecticides give effective control of young grasshoppers. Crop growers and ranchers should read the label instructions on the chemical container before applying any insecticide to pastures or crops and observe strictly the prescribed harvest, grazing or slaughter intervals listed on the label.

\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\* Treat Cattle for Grub Con rol.

Now is an opportune time to treat cattle for cattle grub control. The adult heel flies have laid their eggs and the young cattle grub larve are n the animals. The cattle grub larvae are more effectively controlled with a grubcide treatment when they are small. Therefore good control should be the result of immediate treatment.

Cattle grubs damage cattle in a variety of ways. Cattle infested with grubs can have a reduction in milk production that can cause a reduction of weight gain in calves. Cattle infested with grubs are mare restless and excitable than "grub-free" cattle. As the grubs emerge in the back of cattle in late fall and penetrate the hide, the value of the hide for leather is depreciated.

There are several cattle grubicides and methods of application that can be used with good success for cattle grub control. Grubicides may be administered to animals as dips, sprays, pour-an materials, mineral formulations or feed mixes. The grubicides suggested for cattle grub control are cou-
