

# VALLEY HIGH PATRIOTS NEXT ON LIST FOR THE MUSTANGS

When the district realignment was completed last spring, the newly consolidated school combining Turkey and Quitaque with the new name of Valley High was put into District 2-A and the Patriots will come to Nicholson Field Friday night.

The young and inexperienced Patriots were thrashed by the Clarendon Bronchos last week 55-0 but their losses have not diminished their desire and no team can

take them too lightly as this is the type club that can slip up on somebody.

The experience the Patriots have come from the boys that played at Turkey last year and there are only five seniors on the squad with 18 members of the squad being freshmen and sophomores.

The Patriots have used both the wishbone T and the shotgun spread formations in their games to date which poses problems for teams in preparing defenses for the two contrasting formations.

The Patriots do have good speed with Jerry Green, tailback, leading their attack.

Because of their inexperience, the Patriots have taken to the air in their games to date and this could cause serious problems to the Mustangs as their pass defense has been porous through their first five games.

"We expect Valley to throw a lot against us because we sure haven't looked any good on pass defense this year and they do a good job of throwing," Coach Jim Bateman said this week.

"The win over Wellington really helped our kids and we probably did our best job of the year on offense but we still need to improve on defense and especially on pass defense," Bateman said.

The Mustangs came out of the rough game with Wellington in good shape and will welcome playing a club that is about the same size.

In grading the films, the Mustangs coaching staff noted that Rick Healey was in on 19 tackles in an impressive performance against the Skyrockets.

"Our blocking was much better against Wellington, especially our lead blocking in the backfield, and Gary had his best night for us and Lewis did a good job of running coming off of his injury against Silverton and our entire team showed improvement offensively," Bateman said.

Dale Helton at nose guard and Rusty Cole, playing cornerback, were praised by the coaches for their continued good play at their respective positions.

A win by the Mustangs Friday night would give them a 3-0 record in district play and still a share of the lead with either Memphis or Clarendon who get together in what has been billed as the deciding game for the championship at Memphis.

## MUSTANGS DEFUSE SKYROCKETS FRIDAY NIGHT 29-20

David Britt led their best overall effort of the year, the Mustangs laid it on the Wellington Skyrockets last Friday night at Nicholson Field and remained three way tie for the 2-A lead.

Following by eight at the first quarter, the Mustangs bounced back in the second period and used a touchdown by Lewis Britt to take a thin 9-8 lead into the dressing room.

Stevens' 27 yard boot with 11 seconds to go and it probably gave the Mustangs the lift they needed as they came back to the half time intermission and tacked on two more touchdowns to give them a 29-0 lead.

The visiting Skyrockets led the Mustangs into a tight situation the first quarter when Wheeler had the lead drive 64 yards for a touchdown on their second possession after Bobby Stevens had returned Stevens from his 5 yard line out of the Rocket 36.

Following third and 16 from the Wellington 48, the Skyrockets went to the airways the first time with Randy Hodges putting the ball in the end zone.

It appeared to be a sure

interception or breakup by the Mustangs resulted in a 28 yard completion to Shrubs at the Mustang 26.

From the 14, Shrubs took a pitch around his left end and fumbled before picking the pigskin up and going over at the flag. Jay Thomas followed the same route for the two point conversion and the Rockets took an 8-0 lead with 1:36 to play in the first quarter.

Seemingly the Mustangs haven't been on the receiving end of too many breaks in the '72 campaign but got a big one on the scoring series after the kickoff.

Staying on the ground and using what has been good to them for years, the power I offense, the host Mustangs steadily drove downfield on the running of Gary Fischer and Britt with a 9 yard gainer by Kent Ware on a trap thrown in for a first down at the Wellington 12.

Three plays later, Britt was jarred loose from the ball but J.C. Brooks was in the right place at the right time and curled around the pigskin at the 2 and the Mustangs had a first and goal.

Britt stuck it in from the 1 on second down but the Mustangs failed on a running play for the tying points.

Time was running out in the half when the locals took over at their 47 to set the stage for the go ahead field goal.

Stevens got 8 at left guard on the counter play before Fischer passed incomplete but the Skyrockets were guilty of roughing the passer and the fine moved the ball to the Wellington 30.

Stevens sped around his left end on the option to the 20 and another first down with just 36 seconds left on the clock.

An incomplete pass and a loss of 1 on a running play followed before Fischer tacked 9 yards to his game total of 132 yards rushing to the Skyrocket 12.

The Mustangs called time and decided to go for the field goal and Stevens kick hit the crossbar and bounced over to put the happy Mustangs on top.

Wellington was forced to kick after the second half kickoff and the Mustangs set up shop at the Wellington 46.

It took the Mustangs just six plays to tally their second touchdown with Fischer going around his right end from 25 yards out and tight roping the sideline to the end zone after getting big clearing blocks by Larry Rives and J.C. Brooks.

Stevens toe was good on the extra point try and they were up by eight.

On the ensuing kickoff, Randy Hanks blasted Nall loose from the ball at the Wellington 25 and Rick Healey pounced on it but the Mustangs couldn't cash in on the break and lost the ball on downs at the 30.

Shrubs lost one and then broke at his left guard and with the Mustang linebackers taken to the outside, he found himself free and there was no catching him and he danced into the end zone 71 yards later.

Thomas attempted to tie the game on a sweep to the Mustangs right side but Rives would have none of it and nailed him on the line of scrimmage.

The Mustangs retaliated with a 6 play, 63 yard drive that saw Fischer clear his left end on a keeper behind the lead blocking of Ware and Britt from the Wellington 44.

Cutting back to his right at about the 35, Fischer sidestepped a couple of Skyrockets and angled into the end zone with 3:01 still

to go in the third quarter. Stevens booted the Mustangs to a 23-14 margin.

Outside of the scoring dash by Shrubs, Wellington could do no running of consequence against the scrappy Mustangs and had to punt following the Mustangs third TD.

Gaining the Skyrocket 42, the Mustangs were shoved back to the Wheeler 45 by a personal foul penalty before Stevens broke loose on the counter at left guard and dashed to

the Wellington 17 where Shrubs overtook him.

Ware found a big hole at right guard and was into the end zone without a hand laid on him to put the final points on the board for the Mustangs after Stevens kick sailed wide to the right.

Wellington had to score two touchdowns now to tie or go ahead of the Mustangs in the final eight minutes and did get one on a 64 yard scoring pass from Hodges to Shrubs.

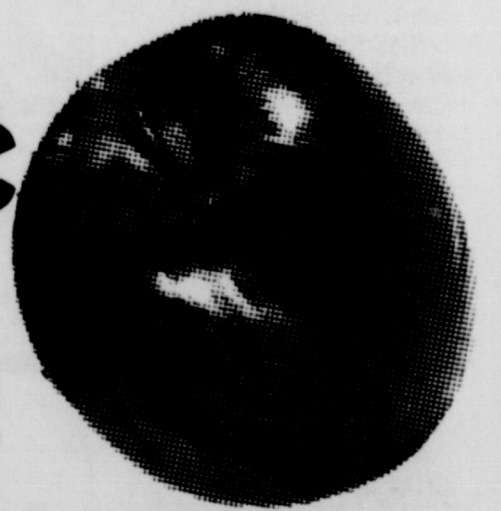

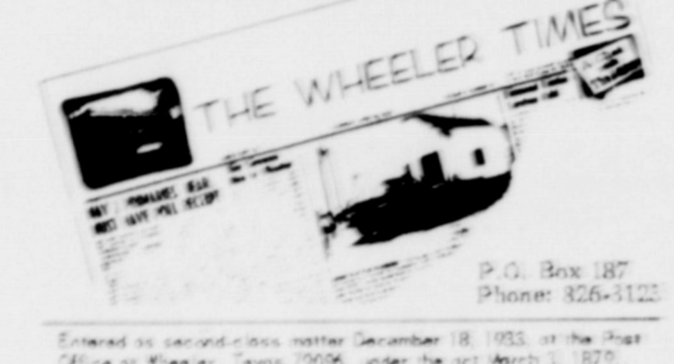
