

# **MUSTANGS AND CYCLONES** IN BIG GAME FOR BOTH

It was figured at the first of the year that the Memphis Cyclones would be at or near the top of the district standings when the Mustangs were faced with their trip to Hall County but who would have thought that the Wheeler Mustangs would be astride the top rung?

Baffling the so called experts, the Mustangs are now enjoying the enviable spot of being tied for the lead with a 3-0 record but don't face a very enviable task when they take the field Friday night against the Memphis Cyclones.

The upcoming battle between the Mustanas and Cyclones will be a big contest for both clubs with both having big stakes in the game.

After absorbing a 14-0 blanking at the hands of the Clarendon Bronchos last week, it will probably be an angry bunch of Cyclones that will hit the gridiron to try and put the Mustangs down in the standings with them.



# Across the Fence

above average and the price is good. Some folks are looking for milo prices to go even higher. it's anybody's guess!

The clippings from the observation plot tell quite a story. Old World Bluestem is leading the pack. The drouth hardiness of this 'new one'' is now well established. Ermelo lovegrass is second in yield. That new Klein grass 75 they're all raving about from Childress on south, made only about 1/2 the total forage that Ermelo Weeping Lovegrass made.

DON'T NEGLECT SMALL GRAINS! Small grains are sometimes neglected when it comes to fertilization. However, for good grazing and high grain yields, an adequate supply of plant nutrients is essential.

Nitrogen is the key element in small grain production although phosphorus and ptash are often needed. Of course, to find out hkw much of the different elements to apply, a soil test is the answer.

We would like to offer several pointers for producer to consider in fertilizing small grains: 1. Fallow soils may con-

tain enough nitrogen to get the crop started. 2. For soils low in nitrogen, apply 30 to 60 pounds of the material per acre at or near planting. Apply the higher rate if the crop is to

be grazed. 3. For soils low in phosphorus, apply a minimum of 15 pounds of the material per acre at planting to increase early growth. Higher

rates, as much as 120 pounds of phosphorus per acre, may be needed if the material is broadcast on low phosphorus soils and

early grazing is desired. 4. Apply 40 to 80 pounds of potash per acre on soils low in this particular ele-

5. The amount of nitrogen to topdress is determined by grazing management. Rates may range from 30 to 120 pounds per acre. Where higher rates are needed, divide the applications and apply them to "grazed out" areas.

We caution against using too much nitrogen with the planting seed. When planting wheat and barley, no more than 15 pounds of nitrogen and potash per acre should be applied with the seed. With oats, this amount can be doubled.

Higher rates of phosphorus may be applied, depending on the source of the material. As much as 120 pounds of superphosphate has been used. However, if ammonium phosphate is used, the rate of phosphorus should be limited by the nitrogen it contains.

Small grain acerage may increase in Wheeler County this year due to higher cattle prices. To get top production from these plantings, adequate fertilization is a must and a good investment.

A lot of folks are wondering what effect all the pasture improvement work is having on our local economy. One big indicator is the sales of fertilizer in Wheeler County. In only 8 years, we have come close to doubling fertilizer useage in Wheeler County; and we used 14 times as much fertilizer in 1972 as we did in 1958. Over 5,000 tons of fertilizer was used, for example in 1972 as compared to a little over 3,500 tons in 1958. About 1/2 of this was in liquid form and about a half in dry form. This is an increase of over \$150,000 worth of fertilizer. Neighboring Collingsworth County only put out half as much fertilizer as we did.

The screwworm fly is back at work! Colder weather can't come soon enough for most Wheeler County livestock producers. A change to cold weather would be a big help in slowing screwworm outbreaks across the state.

But until a hard freeze comes -- and it may be more than a month away, checking animals and treating all wounds is still as important

Approved screwworm remedies are available as dusts, smears and aerosols. Coumaphos and ronnel water aprays are also effective in protecting wounds against screwworm invasion and in keiling worms in infested wounds.

The importance of checkna animals regularly cannot be overemphasized. Each and every type of wounds should be treated because on drop of blood will attract a screwworm fly. All punctures such as those made by ear tags of biting insects such as ticks should be treated.

If at all possible, livestock producers should not perform any surgical operations on animals until after cold weather arrives. Castrating, dehorning and other similar operations are an open invitation for the screwworm fly.

Since horn flies, ticks and lice are attacking livestock in some locations, use the coumaphos or ronnel spray when treating animals for those pests since either will also provide protection against screwworms.

As long as screwworm flies are active, livestock producers must keep their guard up. This is no time to relax and wait for cold weather. It will come in due






