City Council Meets Monday

The June meeting of the Wheeler City Council was held at the City Hall Monday evening, June 17. Meeting with the council was Thurman Rives, Watson Burgess, Melvin Kunkle of Pampa, Richard Wallace and Kent Sims.

Thurman Rives reported to the council on the Fire Department's inspection of the garage recently completed. A list of items to be taken care of was presented. The garage is for the storing of fire trucks and equipment.

Rives reported the Fire Department's intention to send three firemen to Fire School July 24-26 at A & M. The council and Rives went over the cost of the school.

Watson Burgess and Melvin Kunkle of Southwestern Public Service met with the council to discuss the rate increase being sought by SPS. After discussing the need, it was pointed out that SPS has not had an increase in 7 years and during the company's history has actually lowered rates 14 times since 1942. The council voted to grant the 9.17 rate increase.

Richard Wallace of Baldwin and Rucker Accounting firm met with the council to go over the City Audit which was just completed by the firm. The budget prepared by the firm is to be considered at a meeting of the council Thursday evening at 7:30.

The bills were reviewed and passed for payment and the meeting adjourned.

Powell Injured In Combine Accident

Bud Powell of Mobeetie lost his arm in a combine accident Monday afternoon.

Powell, 60, was combining east of Mobeetie when the accident occurred. He jumped in his pickup and started to Wheeler. He lost control of the pickup and wrecked it. Zane Francis drove by, picked him up and brought him to Parkview Hospital.

After being treated, Powell was transferred to St. Anthony's Hospital. The arm was severed above the elbow.

Annual Farm Tour Tues., July 9

The agricultural sub-committee of the Wheeler County Program Building Committee will sponsor an agricultural tour and meeting on Tuesday, July 9.

The tour will include lovegrass seed production, hay production, and grazing management on the James R. Reneaux farm.

Following the tour the Shamrock Chamber of Commerce, Wheeler Chamber of Commerce, and the Wheeler County Farm Bureau will host a barbeque in the Shamrock High School Cafeteria.

The meeting will be held in the Shamrock High School Auditorium. The speakers for the meeting will be three Area Specialist of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service from Amarillo. Dr. Frank Petr, Agronomist, will discuss lovegrass management for grazing and hay production. In conjunction with Dr. Petr's presentation, Dr. Cal Parratt, Area Beef Cattle Specialist, will discuss supplemental feeding of beef cattle on lovegrass. Dr. Gene Cope, Area Extension Veterinarian will talk about the effects of vibriosis on a beef herd and also about grazing alfalfa.

## STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN, Tex. — Constitutional Convention delegates are entering the make-or-break last laps of their work. Delegates last week completed first-draft approval of the proposed new state charter after final agreement on the delayed judicial article. President Price Daniel Jr. said he hopes all articles will be pushed through the third-reading stage by the end of June. After that, the document will go to the convention's "Submission and Transition Committee," which will wrap up all

proposals in package form and return them to delegates. At this stage, the document and related separate-submission items (like right-to-work) must be approved by a two-thirds majority (121 votes) to be submitted to voters. The Submission and Transition Committee will serve as a kind of conference committee, seeking compromises which can rally approval of the necessary majority of delegates. After months of stormy debate and close votes, the convention began to receive praise from many quarters

for its efforts to improve the 1876 constitution. Kind words were still being withheld by the governor, however. Aides to Gov. Dolph Briscoe said he would "find it very difficult" to support the revision in its present form, because recommended changes infringe on gubernatorial powers in areas of veto and calling special legislative sessions.

**TRADING STAMP LIMIT?** — The State Finance Commission may ban use of trading stamps and other inducements by savings and loan associations to help attract deposits. The panel's savings and loan section is scheduled to rule on the long-standing issue June 22. Opponents argue the regulation would curtail advertising by savings and loan associations, would not benefit consumers and would be meaningless to federally-chartered institutions. An earlier version of the

proposed regulation included an exemption for associations competing with other financial institutions which offer stamps and other premiums. Savings and loan associations are divided on the issue. Several consumer groups have indicated they will offer testimony in opposition to the proposal.

**WASTE HEARINGS SET** — Texas Water Quality Board has scheduled 12 public hearings over the state to explore problems concerning disposal of industrial solid wastes, a controversial issue. The first hearing will be held July 11 in Fort Worth with the final one in Austin October 24. Other hearings are slated for Dallas July 12, Port Arthur July 25, Beaumont July 26, Houston August 6-7, Corpus Christi August 22-23, Brownsville August 30, El Paso September 20, Midland September 26, Amarillo Sep-

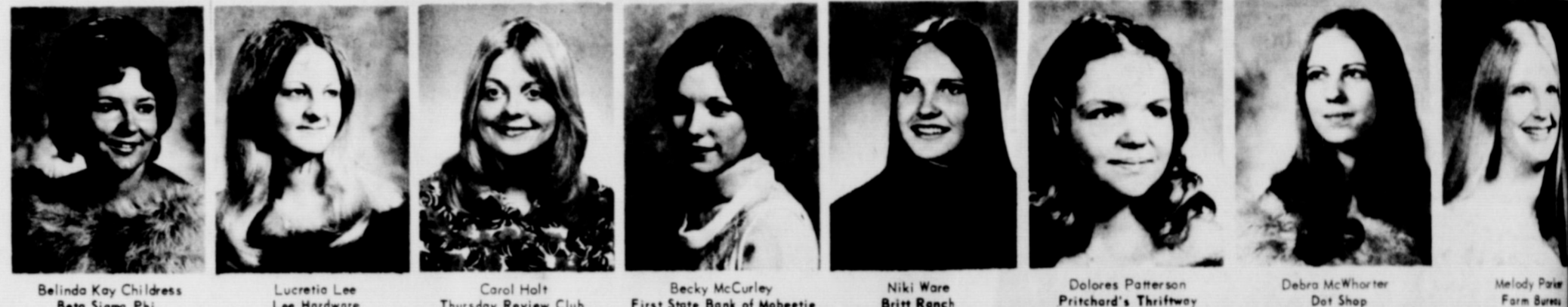
tember 27 and Longview October 2. Legislative committee probes of TWQB, with special attention to procedures in processing applications for waste disposal sites are scheduled to begin after the Constitutional Convention adjourns.

**COURTS SPEAK** — A Houston ironworker who entered a Fort Worth hospital with a cut throat fainted, felloff the operating table and suffered a brain concussion and loss of teeth is entitled to \$72,000 damages, the State Supreme Court ruled. The high court held Houston ironworker should get workmen's compensation benefits due to inhalation lead and zinc fumes. The Court of Criminal Appeals held that policeman who sees a driver making a movement before stopping is not justifying searching the traffic offender's car.

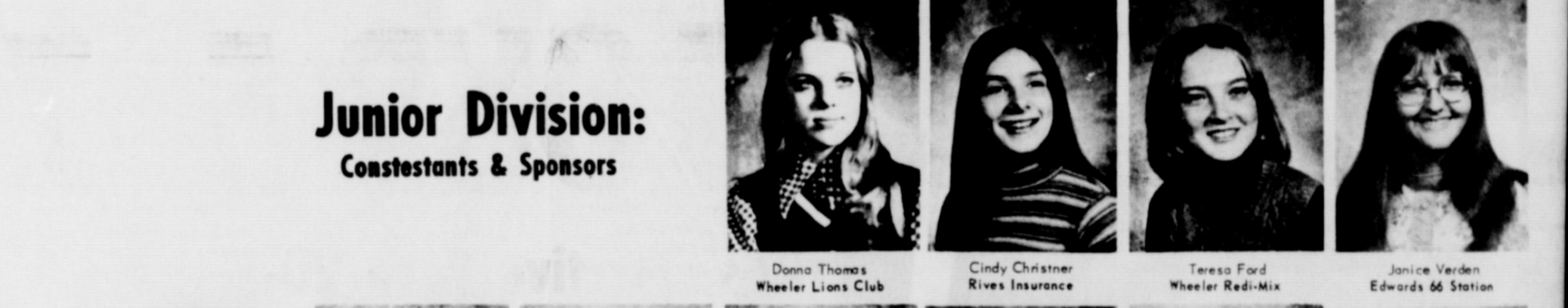

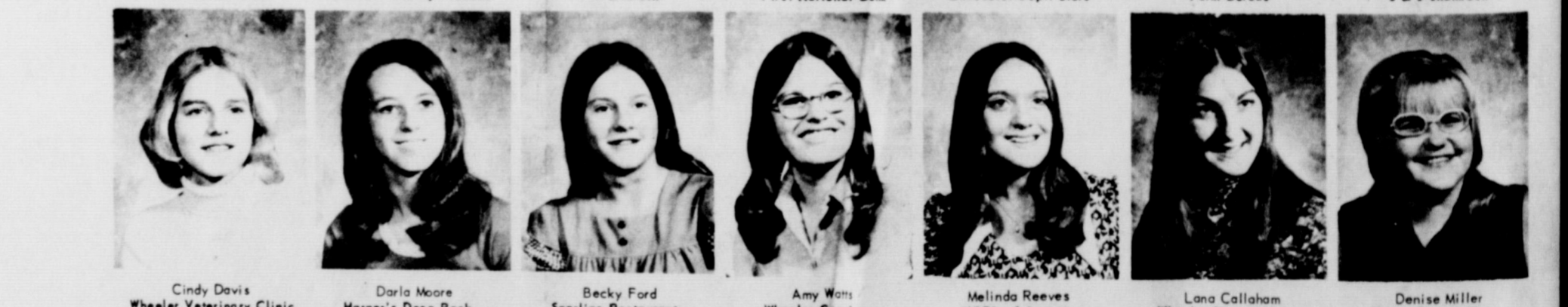

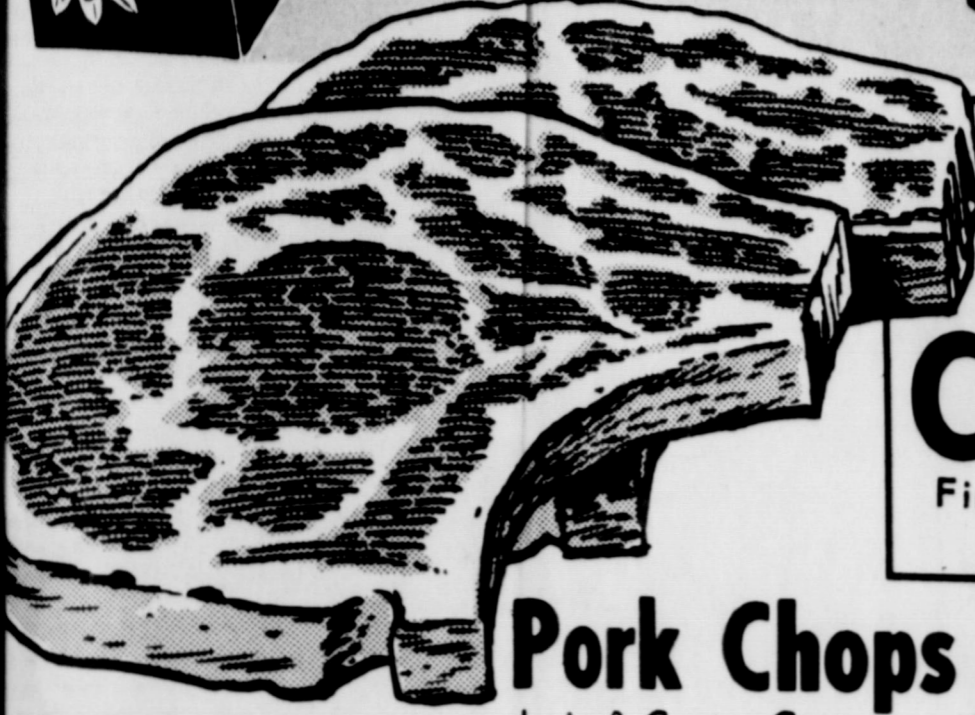

# KING'S KOMMENTS

By Don King - CEA

**What All of us Need to Know  
and are Learning About the  
Farmer.**

Many of us are from one  
to three generations removed  
from the farm and only the  
faded memories of that  
life remain with us. Terms  
like "Mother Nature" and  
"the balance of nature" ap-  
pear to our finer senses be-  
cause they suggest perman-  
ency and wholeness.  
We feel that life would be  
less complex if we could  
backpedal to those "good-  
old-days" when life was  
free and easy and the prob-  
lems were few.

As hard working indus-  
trious people, we made our  
mystical journey by the  
thousands to the not too  
distant past this year.

Vegetable seed and trans-  
plant sales soared along  
with ornamentals. Garden  
tools were taken out of  
storage or purchased new  
and we as traditional con-  
sumers were off to beat  
high food prices by plant-  
ing our own garden.

Now we are confused.  
Have we been victims of  
self-deception or has Mother  
Nature played a dirty trick  
on us? The beans died in  
infancy from damping-off  
fungi in the soil and cut-  
worms were taking two rows  
at a time through the toma-  
toes until we learned how  
to protect them with milk  
cartons. Now that they are  
fruiting blossom-end,  
it is taking its toll and some  
of the first fruit to ripen  
had a soil rot. The county  
Extension agents office has  
taken on a greater sense of  
importance because of our  
need for problem identifi-  
cation and problem control.

Word about the balance  
of nature apparently failed  
to get to the insects, dis-  
ease organisms and weeds  
and we are beginning to  
have serious doubts about  
the benevolence of "Mother  
Nature". Perhaps the far-  
mer has a point when he  
harps on the risks of pro-  
duction and asks more  
money for his product than  
we think he deserves.

We have benefited by re-  
acquainting ourselves with  
production, agriculture, and  
learning not to take our food-  
basket for granted. What we

did produce was tasty and  
wholesome even though we  
dare not count the cost of  
our producing it. There is  
a sense of accomplishment  
in working with the compo-  
nents of nature and producing  
a beneficial product. That's  
why the farmer persists when  
the odds seem to be stacked  
against him.

**TREATING CAT TLE FOR  
GRUB CONTROL**

Cattlemen who are faced  
with grub infestations in  
their stock ought to be con-  
sidering control measures  
now.

In the High Plains region,  
heel flies have laid their  
eggs on cattle and the grub  
larvae have penetrated the  
skin, beginning their migra-  
tion through the body. Since  
these larvae are more effec-  
tively controlled when they  
are small, cattlemen should  
be stepping up their treat-  
ments now.

Cattle grubs damage the  
animals in a number of ways.  
Cattle infested with grubs  
may produce less milk which  
in turn results in less weight  
gain of calves. The affect-  
ed animals are more restless  
and excitable, generally caus-  
ing a breakdown in the nor-  
mal health of the cattle. Grubs  
usually reach the back of the  
animal in late summer,  
fall or winter, forming breath-  
ing holes through the skin  
and developing a "cyst" just  
under the skin. This penetra-  
tion damages the hide and  
depreciates the value of the  
animal on the market.

Although cattle grubs can  
be killed after they reach  
the animal's back, earlier  
control is best, particularly  
in beef cattle.

Systemic insecticides,  
which are administered as

spray, dips, pour-ons or  
feed or mineral additives,  
are distributed through the  
animal's body by the circula-  
tory system, destroying the  
grubs by contact action.

Grubicides suggested for  
control are coumaphos (Co-  
Rall), crufomate (Ruelene),  
prolate, trichlorfon (Negu-  
von), famphur (Warbox), Fen-  
thion (Tiguvon) and ronnel.  
All of these grubicides are  
animal systemics.

Treating for grub control  
and drenching the animals  
should not be done on the  
same day. Sick animals or  
those under stress should  
not be treated.

The label on treatment  
containers should be check-  
ed carefully before applica-  
tion for instructions on  
treating various cattle breeds.  
Precautions and directions  
should be adhered to strict-  
ly.

# VETERANS ADMINISTRA- TION

A number of changes are  
to be made in the educational  
assistance programs admin-  
istered by the Veterans Ad-  
ministration for eligible vet-  
erans and their dependents  
and survivors. Following  
are some of the changes  
which will be put into eff-  
ect prior to the beginning  
of the 1974 fall semester,  
according to Arthur Wells,  
Veterans Service Officer  
for Wheeler County.

Educational assistance  
programs are currently ad-  
ministered by the VA for  
veterans who served honor-  
ably during the Vietnam Era  
and the Cold War period,  
which dates back to Feb-  
ruary 1, 1955. Monetary  
benefits are also available  
to the wives and children  
of living veterans who are

shown to be 100% disabled  
because of service-related  
diseases or injuries, or the  
widows and children of  
veterans or servicemen  
deaths were the result of  
military duty.

Eligible veterans and  
dependents who attend col-  
lege or university will  
receive an advancement  
at the time of registra-  
tion, providing the nec-  
essary paperwork is com-  
pleted in sufficient time.  
The advance payment, con-  
sisting of the amount due for  
full month plus that regis-  
tration, can be paid and  
sent to the school.  
The eligible person must  
receive the check at the  
time of registration, thus  
the funds necessary for  
tuition and fees reach the  
school.

Beginning with the  
fall semester, the VA  
places Veterans Representa-  
tives on the campus of the  
larger colleges and uni-  
versities. These representa-  
tives will be available to  
assist veterans and other  
eligible persons who en-  
counter problems con-  
cerning benefit payments,  
other matters pertaining  
to the educational assist-  
ance programs administered  
by the Veterans Adminis-  
tration. Those enrolled in  
this fall should contact  
campus VA representatives  
if assistance is required  
during the school term.

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# JEHOVAH'S WITNESSES

The Watchtower Bible and  
Tract Society has revealed  
plans for 85 district conven-  
tions of Jehovah's Witnesses  
in the United States and  
Canada in 1974.

Orville Caruthers, presid-  
ing minister of the Shamrock  
congregation of Jehovah's  
Witnesses, said there will  
be 74 assemblies for Eng-  
lish-speaking delegates and  
eleven meetings in Spanish,  
French and Italian.

Caruthers said approxi-  
mately 75 delegates will re-  
present the Shamrock con-  
gregation at the convention  
scheduled for Oklahoma City,  
Oklahoma, July 4th through  
7th.

He added that 9,000 dele-  
gates are expected to attend  
the Oklahoma City conven-  
tion.

"Hundreds of thousands  
of persons are looking for-  
ward with eager anticipation  
to the series of 'Divine Pur-  
pose' District Assemblies of  
Jehovah's Witnesses this  
summer," Caruthers said.

"The combined attendance  
is expected to reach nearly  
one-million persons this year.  
Young and old, family groups  
and even the infirm will be  
there," he said.

The highlight of the con-  
vention program will be the  
public discourse on the sub-  
ject "Human Plans Failing,  
as God's Purpose Succeeds."

A baptism service will  
also be featured. Last  
year, 55,775 were baptized  
in the United States as Jeh-  
ovah's Witnesses. This re-  
presents 10 percent of the  
total U.S. membership in  
only one year.

"In fact," he said, "they  
registered a five per cent  
increase during the  
last twelve months and 11,  
334 persons were baptized  
in these countries."

Caruthers said there are  
now 31,850 congregations of  
Jehovah's Witnesses  
around the world.

"At a time when church  
attendance is declining and  
clergymen express concern  
about a lack of interest in  
religion, Jehovah's Witness-  
es are expanding as never  
before," Caruthers said.

In explaining his reasons  
why the growth is taking  
place, Caruthers said the  
Witnesses' adherence to  
Bible principles on such  
things as morals conduct  
and behavior set them apart  
from many religions in a time  
of change in "life style" and  
moral attitudes.

"We believe in imitating  
Jesus Christ and his life  
style and practicing religion  
based firmly on God's Word,"  
Caruthers concluded.
